New Testament Commentary by Mary Coloe PBVM

Wake Up!

The vestments change, the Gospel changes as the Church moves into a new cycle recalling and celebrating God's coming to our world in Jesus. This year we will hear the earliest written Gospel, that of Mark, written around the year 70 CE. These were years of conflict for the early Christians. The Emperor Nero had begun to persecute Christians in the year 64 and they were considered to be practising a new and superstitious cult. In Palestine things were no better for there had been a Jewish uprising against Rome in 66 that led to the destruction of Jerusalem. Mark's community was under threat and beside all these external factors, Jesus had not returned to them as they were expecting. For forty years they had kept faith but as time passed the waiting became harder.

The Gospel speaks into this situation. Be alert. Stay awake. The Master *will* return. Mark uses popular images associated with the end of time according to first century Jewish imagination. There was an expectation that the Messiah would return before the end; that the Messiah would lead a war against the Kingdom of evil; this moral struggle would be felt by the whole cosmos with earthquakes and famine. Mark also points to the reality that Christians were experiencing; no longer welcome within Judaism because they were saying the Messiah had come in Jesus; being brought to trial before Roman courts for not worshipping Caesar. This was the life and death struggle for Mark's community.

Living now, so many centuries distant from the Gospel events, Mark's words take on a special urgency. Complacency and routine can replace alertness and watchfulness. After such a long time perhaps we run the risk of failing to recognise the Master. Last week's Gospel revealed this difficulty. 'When did we see you hungry and thirsty, sick or naked?' We might say in response, 'Of course we would have welcomed you – but we didn't know it was you.' This is the alertness that we are called to; to recognise God's coming in the most unlikely ways. As the carols ring out around the shopping centres, watch out, be alert. You never know the time when God will come to you.

The reading from Paul to the Corinthians shifts from warning to thanksgiving but continues the same theme of 'while we wait for the revealing of Christ'. The Corinthians were a fascinating community in the early Church. They had been brought to Christianity by Paul in the 50's, about twenty years after the Easter event. A number were Jews ready to accept that Jesus is their long-awaited Messiah; a number were non-Jews, gentiles more familiar with worship in the Greek and Roman tradition. It seems they were a community with much enthusiasm for the Christian message, but in their enthusiasm, they made many errors. This is what prompts Paul to write to them, to answer some of the questions they had brought to him, and to let them know about some of the things that were happening in their community that Paul was not happy about. So this letter is part of an ongoing dialogue between Paul and his community.

The part we read today is the standard way to begin a letter in those times. Following his initial greeting Paul praises the community for the multiple ways that God's grace is obvious in their lives. He also mentions how gifted the community is, and how these many gifts will sustain the community while they wait. This theme will recur later in the letter as it seems that the multiple gifts are in fact causing multiple problems. Some fail to recognise that the gifts come from God and are for the building up of the community, not for the self-advancement of the individual.

As we draw near to Christmas, and are beginning to think about the gifts we want to give, and perhaps the ones we want to receive, it might be a good time to consider the deeper gifts we have, the gifts within our lives and how we are allowing these to flourish and to put them to use for others, our family, our communities, our co-workers. I had a poster once that said something like: who we are is God's gift to us; what we make of ourselves is our gift to God.

Scripture Commentary by Dianne Bergant CSS

The reading is a composite of a communal lament (63:16-17,19) and a historical recital (64:2-7). The people feel abandoned even by their ancestors Abraham and Jacob/Israel, and so they cry out. They blame God for allowing them to stray from the path of righteousness (v.17), but they also pray that God will intervene now to re-establish a relationship with them (v.19). Attention then shifts to the account of God's mighty deeds of the past (64:3). The people hope that God will work similar wonders for them. The reading itself does not contain an explicit message of hope. However, having admitted their own culpability and praised God's past favours, they seem confident that God will manifest divine power again.

This communal lament contains several images of God: attentive shepherd and imperial ruler, military captain (Lord of Hosts), and cultivator of vines. What apt images to characterise the relationship between God and the people! Though God is very powerful, like an imperial ruler or a military leader, the care that God provides compares to that of an attentive shepherd or a patient vine dresser. The final plea for help mentions one who sits at God's right hand, traditionally considered the place of honour. This may have originally been a reference to the king, the one who was responsible for the safety and prosperity of the nation. Gradually it was applied to the longed-for royal messiah.

After greeting the Christians with customary expressions from Greek society (grace to you) and Hebrew tradition (peace), Paul offers a brief prayer of thanksgiving and then moves to the theological point of the passage, namely, the community's anticipation of the revelation of the Lord Jesus Christ. The Corinthian Christians were living in the 'time between'. Christ had died and risen from the dead. However, they lived in anticipation of his return. At issue was the manner of their lifestyle and the character of their commitment in the 'time between'. Paul reminds them that all of their talents and the gifts that they had from God were meant to aid them in living faithfully until the Lord's coming.

A thrice-repeated command, 'Watch!' surrounds a parable that emphasises the need to be ready at all times, because Christians do not know when the Lord will return. The Greek word for 'time' (*kairos*) refers to a special time, more than mere chronological or sequential time (*chronos*). *Kairos* is uncommon time and uncommon events occur within it. Waiting for the Lord's return is like the situation of servants who remain behind when the householder goes abroad. Each servant is given a certain authority within the household. The gatekeeper is singled out and told to be on the watch. The parable highlights the uncertainty surrounding the householder's return and the vigilance required of the servants as they wait.

Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSS

Today's readings contain several images: the faithfulness of those who suffer, even as they lament their predicament; the admonition to watch and wait; the expectation of the coming of the Day of the Lord. As trustees of the one who is coming, we live in the 'in between' time of ambiguity and hope. The placement of these readings at the beginning of Advent shapes the context for understanding the entire season. They fix our gaze on the world of human pain and then moves beyond it to the hope of a brighter future. Lamentation and expectation find fulfilment in the Day of the Lord.

Waiting is a prominent image this Sunday. Some people wait to be released from suffering, others await the second coming of Christ. Waiting saps our energies and stifles our enthusiasm. Yet wait we must, and as we wait, we wonder: 'What should I be doing?' The readings suggest that we should wait with patient expectation for the day of reconciliation and peace; we should wait in joyful hope that what is to come will come soon. While we wait, we should faithfully fulfil our responsibilities. We believe that we have a future worth waiting for, that there are promises that God will keep. And so we look expectantly to the Day of the Lord, that future day of ultimate fulfilment.

New Testament Commentary by Mary Coloe PBVM

Practise what you preach

Once again we see in today's Gospel evidence of the Jewish background of Matthew's community. The chair was a symbol of a teacher's authority. He sat while disciples gathered at his feet. We continue that symbolism today when a Bishop is consecrated and seated in his 'chair', or in Greek, 'kathedros' from which comes the word Cathedral. Universities also have this symbolism when they speak of 'the chair of philosophy, or English'. Jesus rightly speaks of the authority of the Pharisees to teach the Law of Moses. But he then cautions that they do not live out what they teach.

Jesus criticises the Pharisees for seeking after honour and power as depicted in various titles such as Rabbi, Master, Father, Teacher. There is no doubt that the Christian community had teachers and missionaries and apostles. What matters though is that these are roles of service for the good of the community and are not roles of honour giving a person a higher status than another. In the Christian community 'you are all brothers and sisters'. It is possible that Matthew's community were in danger of forgetting this and returning to older attitudes of hierarchies and honour systems.

Paul's letter to the Thessalonians provides an alternative vision of Christian leadership. This is the first letter written by Paul to a community in what is now Northern Greece. The Thessalonians were an enthusiastic group, eagerly awaiting the return of Jesus which Paul expected in his own life-time. In this section of the letter Paul describes his leadership style. Without denying his apostolic authority his image of leadership is that of a nursing mother, leading with gentleness, affection, self-giving – and paying his own way through his work. In verse 11, which is not in the lectionary, Paul balances the image of a nursing mother and likens his ministry to that of a father, exhorting and encouraging his children. These two parental images express Paul's self-understanding of how he is to be within the community. His model of leadership is based on the biblical image of God's leadership of Israel. In the Old Testament God is frequently described as a parent, as a father or mother who guides, teaches, reprimands, forgives, nurtures. This is a marked contrast to the leadership style of the scribes and the Pharisees described in today's Gospel. Paul once was a Pharisee and boasts that he was taught by one of the great teachers of that time (Acts 22:3), but in becoming a disciple of the Risen Jesus, Paul has undergone a deep personal change of heart. He no longer teaches his community as he might once have, as a Pharisee; instead he teaches the essentials of Christian faith by his own example. Earlier in this letter he said, 'You became imitators of us' (1 Thess 1:6), and he writes to the Corinthians, 'be imitators of me' (1 Cor 4:16). Christian ministry is not so much teaching by words but by example. The minister lives the faith she or he teaches.

The words of Jesus and Paul challenge all of us, whether we have an official leadership role or not. All who profess to be a Christian should be able to say – look at me! This is what Christianity is about. We may never have the learned words to offer others, but the example of our lives ought to speak our Christian belief. In the days prior to Vatican II, it was easy to pick Catholics by such externals as 'no meat on Friday.' In our multifaith society it is easy to know the religious faith of some people by what they wear, what they eat, days of celebration – but what about Christians? Do our lives proclaim the Gospel, 24/7?

Scripture Commentary by Dianne Bergant CSS

The prophet Malachi denounces the priests who defiled the priesthood and led the people astray with their faulty teaching. Their infidelity is particularly heinous because they enjoyed privileged positions within the community. With the exception of the Davidic kings, no other group in Israel could claim a special covenant relationship with God (see Num 10:13). Their lives were governed by the cultic law (see Lev 21:6), and they were the ones who interpreted the law for the people (see Dt 17:8-11). They are told that if they do not reform their lives, they will suffer the curse of God. Privileged positions within the community carry serious responsibilities, and failure to fulfil these responsibilities will meet with profound consequences.

It is difficult to classify this short psalm, because it is primarily descriptive rather than exclamatory. What is described, however, are the sentiments of someone who is devoted to the Lord. Each verse has its own character. The first verse is a self-description of humility, describing the psalmist as someone with an honest and straightforward heart. In the second verse, though God is not explicitly identified as a woman, the confidence that God inspires is compared with the peace of a child in its mother's presence. The third verse is a call to Israel to trust in the Lord. In the third verse, the psalmist turns to the people and entreats them to place their trust in this same God.

Paul uses the metaphor of a nursing mother to represent the apostolic self-giving of the missionaries and the affection they had for their converts. They wholeheartedly shared the gospel with others and magnanimously gave of their very selves, with no thought of compensation other than the satisfaction of having given themselves out of love. Though the missionaries would have been within their rights to expect hospitality from their converts, they chose to forgo this prerogative, working at their respective trades (see Acts 18:3), earning their own keep, being a financial burden to no one. They proclaimed the gospel as they saw fit. Their recompense was the religious maturity of their converts, and for this they were grateful to God.

Although Jesus acknowledges the legitimacy of the roles of the scribes and Pharisees, he criticises them for the disparity between what they teach and how they live. He counsels his hearers: Listen to them, but don't follow their example. The Pharisees developed detailed minor rules, known as the 'hedge around the law', meant to ensure obedience to the commandments. This became a heavy burden for the people, and the scribes and Pharisees did nothing to help them carry it. They were also guilty of religious ostentation and the desire for political and religious privilege. The passage concludes with a reversal of fortunes: Those who exalt themselves now will experience eschatological humiliation; those who humble themselves now will enjoy eschatological exaltation.

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Sunday, 5 Nov 2017: Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A

Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSS

Since Vatican II the responsibilities of leadership have been spread throughout the community. This has not happened simply because there are fewer priests and religious. It has occurred primarily because the Council itself insisted that by virtue of their baptism all Christians are called to discipleship, which includes active participation in the mission of the church. While those who are ordained continue in specialised forms of leadership, other people have stepped forward to assume their newly recognised responsibilities. Sometimes they have more influence in the church than do the ordained.

We derive the connection between pharisaical and hypocritical from Jesus' description of the Pharisees found in today's reading. His condemnation, along with the condemnation of the priests in the first reading, should be a warning to all who in any way exercise leadership. We must always be on our guard lest the trappings of leadership ensnare us and we fail in our responsibilities toward God and the community we serve.

There is a mode of leadership that reflects the very meaning of authority. This way of leadership authors life. It is characterised by the striking image of a nursing mother who both gives and sustains life. Those who exercise leadership in this way create a community where life is fostered, not stifled, where talents serve all of the members, and the talents of all of the members are invited to serve. Such a community not only nurtures its members, it is itself the author of life in the world.
