

# Mark 1:1-8, The beginning of the Good News about Jesus Christ, the Son of God

Here we have the first written proclamation of the Gospel – the Good News of Jesus the Christ, the Son of God. Mark wastes no time in his announcement with a long introduction but instead immediately introduces John. Since the discovery of the Dead Sea Scrolls scholars now know that at this time there were some in Israel who had a strong sense that God's Kingdom was about to break into history. The community of Qumran by the Dead Sea lived with this expectation and they also practised rituals of cleansing. While there is no evidence that John was part of this group, his message and manner are similar. God's reign is coming. Prepare for it by seeking forgiveness.

Baptism, immersion in water, was a common Jewish practice as a way of purifying oneself before participating in major religious festivals. John applies this ritual to a desire for repentance as preparation for the coming Kingdom. John was remembered as a great and holy man of God. He too attracted disciples and even Jesus came to him seeking his baptism. These historical facts must have puzzled the early Christians, particularly if some of John's disciples were now part of the Jesus group. How were they to speak about John, recognising his greatness while acknowledging that Jesus was even greater? In trying to understand John's role in Jesus' story, Mark looks back to the Jewish Scriptures and uses the prophets Malachi and Isaiah to clarify that John's role is one of preparation for another greater figure who is on the way.

### 2 Peter 3:8-14

Because we are more familiar with Mark, this Sunday I want to say more about 2 Peter. This is a later letter, written some time after Peter's death in Rome and we do not know its real author. Like a number of New Testament writings it is attributed to Peter as a way of both honouring the Apostle and also perhaps to ensure the authority of this letter. The epistle seems to be written to a Christian group who were formally Gentiles, thus converts from Greco-Roman religions. It has a strong argumentative tone suggesting that the writer is contending against other teachers who were challenging Christian beliefs (2:1). Because Jesus had not returned, some Christians were beginning to lose faith. The false teachers denied the final 'coming' (Parousia) of Jesus (3:3-4) and promise so called 'freedom' (2:19) amounting to license to do as one wishes. They even denied the power of Jesus (2:1) and any sense of the need to live an ethical life (2:4). Effectively, they dismissed the entire proclamation of Jesus, past, present and future as a myth (1:16), as nonsense. Leaning towards Greek philosophy, they dismiss any concept of God's interest or involvement in the world. To counter these ideas the author of 2 Peter looks back to God's act of creation (3:5-6), then God's continuing action in the story of Israel (2:4-8) and particularly in his Son (1:16-21). In speaking of Jesus the author draws upon eye-witness testimony (1:16), then in the reading today reiterates the promise of the future coming of Jesus (the Parousia).

In many ways the situation of this community is akin to our own. Many in our own world have no sense of any divine power. They may describe themselves as sceptics, or agnostics, or atheists. God simply means nothing to them and Christian faith provides a helpful guide to ethical living, but that's all. Parents may even want their children to be taught within the Christian tradition but for reasons other than firm faith conviction.

The letter of Peter offers something that we can overlook and that is the first person testimony – 'we were witnesses' (1:16). People of faith today can still make this bold claim in the present tense, 'I am a living witness to the power of God in my life.' God's presence and power may not be expressed in clear, articulate arguments or dogmas but there can be a certainty of the heart. Something like this certainty of love is enough for two people to commit their lives to one another. It is a certainty of faith, of love that has a substance to it that defies rational analysis. This type of Christian faith has a rock-solid core to it that goes far deeper than a personal ethic.

2 Peter offers this rich expression of hope:

'You will do well to pay attention to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts.'

As we wait the dawning of our 'day-star,' may we be as bold, as daring in how we live out our faith as those early witnesses.

Scripture Commentary by Dianne Bergant CSS

The message of Deutero-Isaiah opens with the exclamation 'Comfort my people'. The passage itself seems to be a prophetic commissioning. The people are directed to act out their deliverance even before they see evidence of it. The picture sketched resembles the carefully repaired highway over which victorious kings or generals travelled in triumphant procession on their return home. There is an element of universalism here. Not only they, but all humankind will see the glory of their God. This wondrous display will be the first proof that they have finally been delivered from their suffering. The second directive is given to the people in Jerusalem itself. They are to announce that the mighty, victorious God is coming.

The psalm depicts the people awaiting a reply to a plea that they must have made elsewhere. Their confidence that God will respond rests in the conviction that they are God's own people; they are faithful people; they trust in God. There is great expectancy here. The people have done what they can to get God's attention. Now they wait confidently for God's response. Lovingkindness, truth, justice and peace are characteristics of a covenantal relationship. When they meet and embrace each other, salvation is complete. The psalmist is confident that God will re-establish the wealth of the people and that the land once barren and forsaken will yield an abundant harvest.

The reading from 2 Peter contains three distinct yet connected themes: the delay in the return of the Lord; the apocalyptic dissolution of the world; and the manner of life that is required of a faithful Christian. The author of the letter insists that, despite what seems to many to be a very long delay, the Day of the Lord will indeed come. Its timing, like that of a thief in the night, is unpredictable. Therefore, Christians should not grow weary of waiting, nor should they become careless in their waiting. The destruction described has a saving purpose. First, apocalyptic judgment will purge the world of sin, and then the righteous will dwell within the new heaven and new earth.

Just as the account of God's creative work starts, 'in the beginning' (Gen 1:1), so Mark's gospel points to a new beginning (v.1). By applying the prophetic passage to John the Baptist, the author bestows prophetic authority on one who led an austere life and delivered an exacting message. Attired like the prophet Elijah (v.6; see 2 Kgs 1:8), John proclaims a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. The scope and character of the crowds that he attracts signal the spiritual hunger of the people. John got the attention of the crowds, but he quickly turned it away from himself and toward Jesus. John's appearance, his message, and his baptism all heralded the good news of salvation.

Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSS

In the wilderness God's salvation comes to a broken people. In the midst of what is seemingly an impossible situation, hope emerges with vigour. In this context, hope is an openness to surprise, the surprise that God is in no way limited to the imaginings of human minds and the consequences of human history. This is the kind of hope that is proclaimed in the wilderness by John; it is the kind of hope that trusts that from the impossible, God can work a new creation.

There is something of a time warp in Christianity. What is future is made present. The prophetic oracle announces the future as if it is already happening. This sense of the future-present prompts new ways of living. As the future takes root in human lives, the present is transformed into a new creation and the Day of the Lord appears.

God's future comes through the wilderness into the broken city and inspires a broken-hearted people. The contrite heart is a broken heart, an emptied-out heart, a hope-filled heart. It is a heart that is unencumbered by the past and that lives currently in the passing of time and the fragility of being alive. The contrite, broken heart can be filled only by what is promised in the future. This is the paradox of Advent. In the middle of the wilderness, God works the impossible in those whose hearts are ready for the surprise of hope.

New Testament Commentary by Mary Coloe PBVM

Practise what you preach

Once again we see in today's Gospel evidence of the Jewish background of Matthew's community. The chair was a symbol of a teacher's authority. He sat while disciples gathered at his feet. We continue that symbolism today when a Bishop is consecrated and seated in his 'chair', or in Greek, 'kathedros' from which comes the word Cathedral. Universities also have this symbolism when they speak of 'the chair of philosophy, or English'. Jesus rightly speaks of the authority of the Pharisees to teach the Law of Moses. But he then cautions that they do not live out what they teach.

Jesus criticises the Pharisees for seeking after honour and power as depicted in various titles such as Rabbi, Master, Father, Teacher. There is no doubt that the Christian community had teachers and missionaries and apostles. What matters though is that these are roles of service for the good of the community and are not roles of honour giving a person a higher status than another. In the Christian community 'you are all brothers and sisters'. It is possible that Matthew's community were in danger of forgetting this and returning to older attitudes of hierarchies and honour systems.

Paul's letter to the Thessalonians provides an alternative vision of Christian leadership. This is the first letter written by Paul to a community in what is now Northern Greece. The Thessalonians were an enthusiastic

group, eagerly awaiting the return of Jesus which Paul expected in his own life-time. In this section of the letter Paul describes his leadership style. Without denying his apostolic authority his image of leadership is that of a nursing mother, leading with gentleness, affection, self-giving – and paying his own way through his work. In verse 11, which is not in the lectionary, Paul balances the image of a nursing mother and likens his ministry to that of a father, exhorting and encouraging his children. These two parental images express Paul's self-understanding of how he is to be within the community. His model of leadership is based on the biblical image of God's leadership of Israel. In the Old Testament God is frequently described as a parent, as a father or mother who guides, teaches, reprimands, forgives, nurtures. This is a marked contrast to the leadership style of the scribes and the Pharisees described in today's Gospel. Paul once was a Pharisee and boasts that he was taught by one of the great teachers of that time (Acts 22:3), but in becoming a disciple of the Risen Jesus, Paul has undergone a deep personal change of heart. He no longer teaches his community as he might once have, as a Pharisee; instead he teaches the essentials of Christian faith by his own example. Earlier in this letter he said, 'You became imitators of us' (1 Thess 1:6), and he writes to the Corinthians, 'be imitators of me' (1 Cor 4:16). Christian ministry is not so much teaching by words but by example. The minister lives the faith she or he teaches.

The words of Jesus and Paul challenge all of us, whether we have an official leadership role or not. All who profess to be a Christian should be able to say – look at me! This is what Christianity is about. We may never have the learned words to offer others, but the example of our lives ought to speak our Christian belief. In the days prior to Vatican II, it was easy to pick Catholics by such externals as 'no meat on Friday.' In our multifaith society it is easy to know the religious faith of some people by what they wear, what they eat, days of celebration – but what about Christians? Do our lives proclaim the Gospel, 24/7?

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Sunday, 5 Nov 2017: Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time - Year A

Scripture Commentary by Dianne Bergant CSS

The prophet Malachi denounces the priests who defiled the priesthood and led the people astray with their faulty teaching. Their infidelity is particularly heinous because they enjoyed privileged positions within the community. With the exception of the Davidic kings, no other group in Israel could claim a special covenant relationship with God (see Num 10:13). Their lives were governed by the cultic law (see Lev 21:6), and they were the ones who interpreted the law for the people (see Dt 17:8-11). They are told that if they do not reform their lives, they will suffer the curse of God. Privileged positions within the community carry serious responsibilities, and failure to fulfil these responsibilities will meet with profound consequences.

It is difficult to classify this short psalm, because it is primarily descriptive rather than exclamatory. What is described, however, are the sentiments of someone who is devoted to the Lord. Each verse has its own character. The first verse is a self-description of humility, describing the psalmist as someone with an honest and straightforward heart. In the second verse, though God is not explicitly identified as a woman, the confidence that God inspires is compared with the peace of a child in its mother's presence. The third verse is a call to Israel to trust in the Lord. In the third verse, the psalmist turns to the people and entreats them to place their trust in this same God.

Paul uses the metaphor of a nursing mother to represent the apostolic self-giving of the missionaries and the affection they had for their converts. They wholeheartedly shared the gospel with others and magnanimously gave of their very selves, with no thought of compensation other than the satisfaction of having given themselves out of love. Though the missionaries would have been within their rights to expect hospitality from their converts, they chose to forgo this prerogative, working at their respective trades (see Acts 18:3), earning their own keep, being a financial burden to no one. They proclaimed the gospel as they saw fit. Their recompense was the religious maturity of their converts, and for this they were grateful to God.

Although Jesus acknowledges the legitimacy of the roles of the scribes and Pharisees, he criticises them for the disparity between what they teach and how they live. He counsels his hearers: Listen to them, but don't follow their example. The Pharisees developed detailed minor rules, known as the 'hedge around the law', meant to ensure obedience to the commandments. This became a heavy burden for the people, and the scribes

and Pharisees did nothing to help them carry it. They were also guilty of religious ostentation and the desire for political and religious privilege. The passage concludes with a reversal of fortunes: Those who exalt themselves now will experience eschatological humiliation; those who humble themselves now will enjoy eschatological exaltation.

Since Vatican II the responsibilities of leadership have been spread throughout the community. This has not happened simply because there are fewer priests and religious. It has occurred primarily because the Council itself insisted that by virtue of their baptism all Christians are called to discipleship, which includes active participation in the mission of the church. While those who are ordained continue in specialised forms of leadership, other people have stepped forward to assume their newly recognised responsibilities. Sometimes they have more influence in the church than do the ordained.

We derive the connection between pharisaical and hypocritical from Jesus' description of the Pharisees found in today's reading. His condemnation, along with the condemnation of the priests in the first reading, should be a warning to all who in any way exercise leadership. We must always be on our guard lest the trappings of leadership ensnare us and we fail in our responsibilities toward God and the community we serve.

There is a mode of leadership that reflects the very meaning of authority. This way of leadership authors life. It is characterised by the striking image of a nursing mother who both gives and sustains life. Those who exercise leadership in this way create a community where life is fostered, not stifled, where talents serve all of the members, and the talents of all of the members are invited to serve. Such a community not only nurtures its members, it is itself the author of life in the world.
