Reader: For all most severely affected by the virus pandemic: the homeless, the mentally ill, the unemployed, the poor, detainees, and those without support; may they become the first to have their needs met. (Pause for silent prayer) Let us pray to the Lord.

ALL: Lord, hear our prayer.

Reader: For all who have suffered church-related sexual abuse and for their families, friends and supporters; may they speak out, be heard and be believed. (*Pause for silent prayer*) Let us pray to the Lord.

ALL: Lord, hear our prayer.

Reader: We pray for the recently deceased, including:

all who have died from Coronavirus,

and for those whose anniversary of death occurs around this time: Maisie Weston, Joan Delaney, Janice Manley, Pat Kearney, Frank Walsh, Alex Leitch, Mick Shearer, Adriano Missio, Maureen McCabe, Bernie Cook, Amelia Murray, Anna Norgard; may they receive the heavenly inheritance prepared for them. (*Pause for silent prayer*) Let us pray to the Lord.
