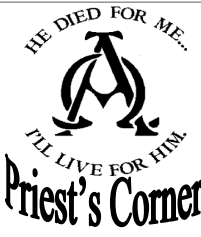
Gospel (JB) Mark 6:1-6 A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

Jesus went to his home town and his disciples accompanied him. With the coming of the sabbath he began teaching in the synagogue and most of them were astonished when they heard him. They said, 'Where did the man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been granted him, and these miracles that are worked through him? This is the carpenter, surely, the son of Mary, the brother of James and Joset and Jude and Simon? His sisters, too, are they not here with us?' And they would not accept him. And Jesus said to them, 'A prophet is only despised in his own country among his own relations and in his own house'; and he could work no miracle there, though he cured a few sick people by laying his hands on them. He was amazed at their lack of faith.

HOMILY FOR THE FOURTEENTH SUNDAY IN THE ORDINARY TIME YEAR B

The first reading of the book of the Prophet Ezekiel (ez 2:2-5) presented us with the theme of rejection within the context of the call of Ezekiel as a prophet. The people of Israel through their misdeeds had rejected God. The Lord who referred to them as rebels said to Ezekiel, “I am sending you up to the Israelites, to the rebels who have turned against me. Till now they and their ancestors have been in revolt against me.” The rejection of God also leads to the rejection of God’s messenger – the prophet. But the Lord instructed Ezekiel to remain steadfast in proclaiming the terms of the covenant between Him and the people of Israel. The truth needs to be said whether it is convenient or not and, we ought to prudently stand up for what is right whether people agree with us or not.

Proclaiming the Good news among those who are hostile to it can be like a thorn in the flesh (second reading; 2Cor12:7-10). St Paul may have had a health condition that was terminal or a speech impediment which he referred to as a thorn in the flesh. However, in spite of the limitations the ‘thorn in the flesh’ might have imposed on him, he refused to be defined by his weaknesses. On the contrary, he allowed the grace of Christ to radiate through him as his ambassador. He wrote thus, “So I shall be very happy to make my weaknesses my special boast so that the power of Christ may stay over me, and that is why I am quite content with my weaknesses, and with insults, hardships, persecutions, and the agonies I go through for Christ's sake. For it is when I am weak that I am strong.” Yes indeed, when we are weak, the grace of Christ makes us strong. Here, we think of inspirational speaker like Nick Vujicic who was born limbless and yet he is living a happy and inspiring life.

In the Gospel, (Mark 6:1-6), Jesus visited his home town of Nazareth with his disciples. As his custom was, he went to the Synagogue to pray and teach on the Sabbath day. This might have been the first time his country people had seen him since he started his public ministry. His country people could not come to terms that one of their own, who grew among them and walked their streets was the Chosen One of God. There is an English adage that familiarity breeds contempt! We read in the Gospel that they “were astonished when they heard him” preach and they said, “‘Where did the man get all this? What is this wisdom that has been granted him, and these miracles that are worked through him? This is the carpenter, surely, the son of Mary, the brother of James and Joset and Jude and Simon? His sisters, too, are they not here with us?’ And they would not accept him.”

At times, our prejudices blind us from the truth. Let us ponder a while on the Nazarenes assessment of Jesus; they acknowledged that he was wise and performed miracles. These discernible gifts of Jesus should have led them to a deeper search about who Jesus was, and they would have come to the realisation that he was descended from the line of David, and had been anointed by the Holy Spirit, and hence the promised Messiah. It is worth noting that sometimes people look down on themselves and might take over the talking points others use to denigrate them. For instance, when Nathaniel was informed by Philip that they have found the messiah spoken about by Moses and that he was Jesus from Nazareth, Nathaniel guessed if anything good can come from Nazareth? (Jn 1:45). In the Gospel of today, the Nazarenes themselves are in disbelief that something good like a prophet or messiah could be one of themselves.

Jesus was amazed at their lack of faith and hence, did not perform a lot of miracles among them. Miracles for Jesus was not merely empty shows for self-aggrandizement but living signs that should lift up people’s hearts to glorify God and to acknowledge him as the Messiah.

The brothers and sisters of Jesus mentioned in the Gospel of today might be Jesus cousins or relations. Among the Semitic people like people from Asian and African continents, cousins and relations may be referred to as one’s brothers and sisters. Mark 15:40 gives us a hint that Mary the mother of James and Joset was different from Mary the mother of Jesus. In the above stated verse, Mark mention Mary the mother of James and Joset as one of the women that watched the death of Jesus on the cross from a distance. If the afore mentioned Mary was the mother of Jesus, then it would have been superfluous for Mark to refer to her as the mother of someone else, rather than the mother of person (Jesus) who was dying on the cross. Hence, those mentioned as siblings of Jesus have their parents.
