A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

He leased his vineyard to other farmers.

Gospel Matthew 21: 33-43

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people: 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. "They will respect my son," he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:

It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone.

This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see?

'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'

HOMILY FOR TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR A

The first reading from the book of Prophet Isaiah (Is 5:1-7), presented us with a poem about someone who loved his vineyard and did the best he could for the vineyard to yield sweet grapes. It read, "My friend has a vineyard on a fertile hillside. He dug the soil, cleared it of stones, and planted choice vines in it. In the middle he built a tower, he dug a press there too. He expected it to yield grapes, but sour grapes were all that it gave." In ancient Israel, vineyards had hedges full of thorns around them to ward off intruders. The tower served both as a security post and as lodging for the workers. The grapes were processed in the wine press. In this poem, the vineyard referred to the people of Israel and the vineyard owner is God Himself.

It was God who called the Jewish patriarch Abraham from the Chaldean city of Ur and made covenants with him and all his descendants. In all the exiles the people of Israel had been, the Lord ensured that they came back to the land of Israel. In this poem as applied to the people of Israel, the Lord was disappointed that despite all He had done for the people of Israel, there were still oppressions, injustices, betrayal, murder and idolatry among them.

The Gospel continued with the theme of the vineyard and drew from the first reading. In the Gospel story, a land owner planted a vineyard, fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower. He then leased it to tenants and went abroad. He expected the tenants to make either a monetary payment to him after the sale of the yearly harvest or to give him a percentage of the yearly produce. At the end of the harvest season, he sent his servants twice to collect from the tenants his returns. The tenants maltreated the servants and caused the death of some of them. He eventually sent his son who was his heir, hoping that the tenants would respect him, but contrary to his expectation, the tenants caused the death of the son to usurp the business for themselves.

In this Gospel parable, the vineyard and its occupants referred to the people of Israel and the owner of the vineyard was God and the servants sent to collect the returns were the prophets. Some of them were maltreated and killed. The son that was sent by the land owner in the parable was Jesus Christ. Within the context of the New Testament, the vineyard and the occupants would refer to the church and her members that have been reborn by water and the Holy Spirit through baptism. We should offer our lives then as a living sacrifice to God. Each time we are in serious sin, we are crucifying Jesus again! Jesus is the stone that was rejected by the builders, that became the key stone. Through his life, suffering, death and resurrection, we have been redeemed. From the first reading and the Gospel of today, we can deduce that God cares about us. The planting of the vineyard on a fertile soil is symbolic of God caring for us. God expects us to reciprocate his love by living good lives. He gives us a second chance when we misbehave. The sending of two sets of servants and the son is opportunity for repentance. The readings also point to God's justice. Bad behaviours can lead to negative consequences. At times, we have said or heard others say of someone that he/ she has fallen from grace to grass or what a wasted life? Such comments are made when we think that someone has ruined a golden opportunity to make a difference in the community and in the world. Let us not through bad choices, ruin the salvation that has been made possible for us by the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

Today, the theme of vineyard that runs through the first reading, the psalms and the Gospel, leads us to the theme of family, meal and faith being championed by the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne. Today, the archdiocese is asking us to use family meals as a way of sowing the seeds of faith in our children and grandchildren. I know this will be more difficult for grandparents if their children no longer practise the faith. However, meal times are opportunity to have a conversation: "Food is inextricably linked to our faith and sustenance to the soul. Indeed, all traditional cultures including our own have placed great significance on the deeper meaning of eating together. As the two disciples on the road to Emmaus discovered, when we welcome Christ to our table – as we do with a simple grace before our meal – we participate in something more profound than just eating. When we unite eating with praise and thanksgiving, we more closely unite the present with eternity. In a way, we begin to draw the aroma of heaven into our homes. And although a family meal is no substitute for the Eucharist, the two tables are in a sense linked" (Life, Marriage and Family Sunday Booklet).

May the Lord Bless you all on this Life, Marriage and Family Sunday.

ANTI-EUTHANASIA UPDATE 5.10.17

All members of the Victorian parliament have now received their own copy of the Andrews government's proposed assisted suicide legislation, formally named The Voluntary Assisted Dying Bill 2017, so none of them can any longer say that they don't know what's in the Bill. Any members of parliament to whom you expressed concerns or with whom you sought an appointment to discuss those concerns, but who fobbed you off because they had not seen the proposed legislation, could now, quite rightly, be approached again should you decide to do so. However, my experience with Mr. Paul Edbrooke, MLA for Frankston, is that he will neither reply to your letter nor grant you an appointment, as he made up his mind to support the Bill some time ago. I hope by next week to have the names and contacts for those parliamentarians who are known to be undecided on the matter, and who would be well worthwhile for us to "lobby" as the saying goes.
