REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

This is a story of the day labourers of Jesus' time. The 'early birds' contracted for the just wage of one denarius and did the hard work over the course of a long day. They were outraged when latecomers also received a denarius.

This little parable circulated in the Christian community of the first century because there was great antagonism between the Jews who became followers of Jesus and the non-Jews, the 'Gentiles'. Jewish Christians looked at their long history of hardship preparing for the coming of the Messiah. And, now, here were these Gentiles who had done nothing by comparison, and God appeared to be granting them whatever it took to enjoy the 'daily bread' of the Kingdom of God.

Jewish Christians had to be shocked out of their idea that God's grace could not be lavished on those outside the boundaries of the Chosen People.

We could pause to pray to be taken by happy surprise by those billions of people outside the Church who, by the grace of God, will share with us 'the Bread of Life', given for the salvation of all the world.

St. Brigid's Parish – 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A)

Introduction: In the Gospels a common pattern is to emphasise how deliberate was Jesus as he set his face towards Jerusalem. This was the time when he focused his energies on forming his disciples. This will be the emphasis of our next few weeks: the cost of discipleship.

1st Reading: Isaiah 55:6-9

We hear the prophet Isaiah with a challenging reflection to seek the Lord while he is near. God's ways are not our ways, but we are called to listen to him.

2nd Reading: Philippians 1: 20-24, 27

We begin a four week selection from St. Paul's letter to the Christian community at Philippi. Paul is now in prison in Rome, yet he is delighted that this does not stop his preaching the Gospel.

Gospel: Matthew 20: 2-16

We hear a parable which is deliberately designed to shock. The listeners find the developing story most unfair – in human terms. The punch line is that God is not unjust in being generous to everybody.

<u>Prayers of Intercession</u>: Heeding the word of God in today's Isaiah reading, we "seek the Lord while he may be found." We "call him while he is near." We trust that God is generous in mercy, attentive to the cries of the poor, the defender of justice on earth.

1. We pray, conscious that God is near at hand, to listen to our hopes and even our fears. With Jesus we say "Father, into your hands we commend our spirit".

(pause) We pray to the Lord.

2. We pray for a true sense of justice amongst our world leaders that they may treat all equally and not give way to the demands of big business.

(pause) We pray to the Lord.

3. We pray for those who work with families, particularly the staff of CatholicCare. May they be guided and strengthened by the Holy Spirit in their work. May their efforts bring peace and happiness to the families who seek their assistance.

(pause) We pray to the Lord.

A reading from the letter of St. Paul to the Philippians.

For me to live is Christ.

Christ will be glorified in my body, whether by my life or by my death. Life to me, of course, is Christ, but then death would bring me something more; but then again, if living in this body means doing work which is having good results – I do not know what I should choose. I am caught in this dilemma: I want to be gone and be with Christ, which would be very much the better, but for me to stay alive in this body is a more urgent need for your sake. Avoid anything in your everyday lives that would be unworthy of the gospel of Christ.

Gospel

Matthew 20.1

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew.

Why are you jealous because I am generous?

Jesus said to his disciples: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a landowner going out at daybreak to hire workers for his vineyard. He made an agreement with the workers for one denarius a day, and sent them to his vineyard. Going out at about the third hour he saw others standing idle in the market place and said to them, "You go to my vineyard too and I will give you a fair wage." So they went. At about the sixth hour and again at about the ninth hour, he went out and did the same. Then at about the eleventh hour he went out and found more men standing round, and he said to them, "Why have you been standing here idle all day?" "Because no one has hired us" they answered. He said to them, "You go into my vineyard too." In the evening, the owner of the vineyard said to his bailiff, "Call the workers and pay them their wages, starting with the last arrivals and ending with the first." So those who were hired at about the eleventh hour came forward and received one denarius each. When the first came, they expected to get more, but they too received one denarius each. They took it, but grumbled at the landowner. "The men who came last" they said "have done only one hour, and you have treated them the same as us, though we have done a heavy day's work in all the heat." He answered one of them and said, "My friend, I am not being unjust to you; did we not agree on one denarius? Take your earnings and go. I choose to pay the last-comer as much as I pay you. Have I no right to do what I like with my own? Why be envious because I am generous?" Thus the last will be first, and the first, last.'
