REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

The Ten Commandments are badly named. Rather, they are the Ten Responses which should characterise a liberated people, freed from slavery by 'the Lord, your God'.

By the time Jesus came on the scene, the Temple in Jerusalem was no longer a fit dwelling place for a God who desires to free people from oppression and exploitation. To the contrary, Jesus saw the Temple ideology as placing undue burdens and shackles on people.

His anger at this erupted in dramatic street theatre. His overturning of the tables of the money-changers signalled the overturning of the Temple system.

What Our Lord revealed to uncomprehending authorities was that His body was the true sanctuary. The body of Jesus of Nazareth is the dwelling place of God, the habitation of the Lord God who liberates people. In short, God's sanctuary is not a place, but a person.

We could take a moment to pray, using the Ten Responses to review and guide our reflection and practice as we move towards Easter. This will help us to celebrate the enigmatic saying: 'Destroy this temple and in three days I will raise it again.'.

St. Brigid's Parish – Third Sunday of Lent (Year B)

<u>Introduction</u>: On this Third Sunday of Lent we are called to reflect on the centrality of the cross in our Christian tradition. This Lent is a reminder that the Paschal Mystery is our hope of life with Christ.

1st **Reading**: Exodus 20:1-3, 7-8, 12-17

We hear the account of the Law given to Moses on Mount Sinai. The Ten Commandments are a practical application of our love for God and one another, particularly in the Jewish community of the time.

2nd Reading: 1 Corinthians 1:22-25

In Paul's day the Christian message of the cross and how the hope in the death and resurrection of Jesus seemed madness, to those unfamiliar with the Gospel message.

Gospel Reading: John 2:13-25

We hear John's account of the behaviour of Jesus in the temple at the time of the celebration of the Passover in Jerusalem. It became a time for prophecy.

<u>Prayer of Intercession</u>: Christ is the power and wisdom of God. We come before his presence praying for the peoples of the world and the Church.

1. We pray as we are gathered under the image of the cross of Jesus Christ, that we may accept his invitation to take up the cross daily and follow him.

(pause) We pray to the Lord.

Lord hear our prayer.

- 2. We pray for all followers of Christ: may we follow his example of self-sacrifice in both our words and our deeds. (pause) We pray to the Lord. Lord hear our prayer.
- 3. We pray for all peoples of all nations, particularly those in turmoil; may they listen to the words of their God imprinted in their hearts and so bring the world to greater justice and peace.

(pause) We pray to the Lord.

Lord hear our prayer.

4. We pray for all who are too set in their own assumptions: may they be guided by Christ in greater openness to the truth.

(pause) We pray to the Lord.

Lord hear our prayer.

5. We pray for ourselves and all in our parish community. We pray for those who are sick – especially those on our parish prayer list - and for all who care for them. For the faithful departed: for those who have died recently and for those whose anniversaries occur at this time, especially *Anthony Hede, Joan Robertson, Joanne Clifford, Maxine O'Connell, Don Michael and John & Fiona Kilgariff*, may they open their hearts to the one who opens for them the gates of eternal life.

(pause) We pray to the Lord

Lord hear our prayer.

Celebrant: Merciful God, into your hands we entrust our prayers of petition. Receive us in our thirst for your gracious love. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen

The Living Word

Third Sunday of Lent, Year B

3 March 2024

First Reading

Exodus 20:1-17

(or shorter form Ex 20:1-3, 7-8, 12-17)

A reading from the book of Exodus.

The Law was given through Moses.

God spoke all these words. He said, 'I am the Lord your God who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery.

'You shall have no gods except me.

'You shall not make yourself a carved image or any likeness of anything in heaven or on earth beneath or in the waters under the earth; you shall not bow down to them or serve them. For I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God and I punish the father's fault in the sons, the grandsons, and the great-grandsons of those who hate me; but I show kindness to thousands of those who love me and keep my commandments.

'You shall not utter the name of the Lord your God to misuse it, for the Lord will not leave unpunished the man who utters his name to misuse it.

'Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy. For six days you shall labour and do all your work, but the seventh day is a sabbath for the Lord your God. You shall do no work on that day, neither you nor your son nor your daughter nor your servants, men or women, not your animals nor the stranger who lives with you. For in six days the Lord made the heavens and the earth and the sea and all that these hold, but on the seventh day he rested; that is why the Lord has blessed the sabbath day and made it sacred.

'Honour your father and your mother so that you may have a long life in the land that the Lord your God has given to you.

1 Corinthians 1:22-25

A reading from the first letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians.

We are preaching a crucified Christ, a scandal to many, but to those who have been called, the wisdom of God. While the Jews demand miracles and the Greeks look for wisdom, here are we preaching a crucified Christ; to the Jews an obstacle that they cannot get over, to the pagans madness, but to those who have been called, whether they are Jews or Greeks, a Christ who is the power and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

Gospel

John 2:13-25

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John.

Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up. Just before the Jewish Passover Jesus went up to Jerusalem, and in the Temple he found people selling cattle and sheep and pigeons, and the money changers sitting at their counters there. Making a whip out of some cord, he drove them all out of the Temple, cattle and sheep as well, scattered the money changers' coins, knocked their tables over and said to the pigeon-sellers, 'Take all this out of here and stop turning my Father's house into a market.' Then his disciples remembered the words of scripture: Zeal for your house will devour me. The Jews intervened and said, 'What sign can you show us to justify what you have done?' Jesus answered, 'Destroy this sanctuary, and in three days I will raise it up.' The Jews replied, 'It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary: are you going to raise it up in three days?' But he was speaking of the sanctuary that was his body, and when Jesus rose from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this, and they believed the scripture and the words he had said. During his stay in Jerusalem for the Passover many believed in his name when they saw the signs that he gave,

but Jesus knew them all and did not trust himself to them;

he never needed evidence about any man; he could tell

what a man had in him. The Gospel of the Lord.



People from all around Australia attended the National Catholic Social Services Conference.

Bishop Vincent Long Van Nguyen OFM Conv, Bishop of Parramatta, recognised for his deep commitment to social justice, delivered a keynote emphasising unity, human dignity, and service.

He stressed the need for solidarity in the face of growing individualism, especially highlighted by the COVID-19 pandemic, which exposed our interdependence.

Bishop Long invoked Pope Francis' insights, suggesting the pandemic offers a "Noah moment" to rediscover our connections— to God, each other, and creation, underlining the lesson that "no one is saved alone."

He urged a shift towards prioritising the common good and acknowledged the Catholic Social Services Australia's (CSSA) advocacy efforts against income inequality.

His message was a call to action for community support and dignity for all, aiming for a society where everyone can lead fulfilling lives.

In his closing remarks, Bishop Long invoked the words of Jesus, urging attendees to be the "light of the world" that shines on the darkness around us. He encouraged a faithful and creative discipleship, even in an increasingly post-Christian society.

This sentiment of the common good was echoed by panellists from various Christian

denominations tasked with exploring "Our Common DNA."

Many of the speakers at this Conference work in Social Justice Services and highlighted that Australia has a rich tradition of it being Church Groups who have and do reach out and provide social justice support and service to many people in their time of need.
