REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate

In the regions where Jesus was an itinerant preacher, three or four flocks could be kept in a communal sheepfold for safety. In the morning, the shepherds would come and, as each called out, the sheep attuned to the sound of his voice would follow to life-giving pasture. We are surrounded by hundreds of voices clamouring for our attention. We are bombarded by messages, social media incessantly chattering. Jesus invites us to get attuned to his voice, listening for the distinctive sound of it so that, even if it is faintly heard in a cacophony, we immediately turn toward it so that we can follow it in a life-giving direction.

How do we get attuned to that voice? By reading the gospels. A Chinese student once told me that the Chinese character for gospel is 'happy sounds'. I like the plural. Jesus' gospel voice is not a monotone but a polyphony sounding in different ways in different situations.

As disciples, we have to get onto the same wavelength as that voice so that we can echo it in our own lives. We become reverberations of Christ's voice in many different situations, helping him to lead others to life giving pastures.

We could take a moment to pray for better listening so that we might recognise the gospel voice of Jesus Christ, especially at the moment of death. Then we may hear the one voice we need and long for: 'Today you will be with me in paradise.'



St. Brigid's Parish – Fourth Sunday of Easter (Year B)

<u>Introduction</u>: On this Good Shepherd Sunday, on which we also pray for Vocations, we are gathered as one flock to listen to Christ who guides and protects us. May our hearts be receptive to his presence and his teaching.

1st Reading: Acts 4:8-12

We hear Peter once again speaking to the early Christian community, who reminds the people that the power of healing comes through Jesus of Nazareth.

2nd Reading: 1 John 3:1-2

We hear the word that John addresses to his followers to encourage them to live as Gods children.

Gospel: John 10:11-18

This is the well known passage on the theme of the Good Shepherd. Such a Shepherd is one who lays down his life for his sheep.

<u>Prayer of Intercession</u>: Just as the sheep trust in the shepherd for all that they need we trust in God the Father for all our needs as we bring our petitions today.

1. For the shepherds of our Church, our Holy Father Pope Francis, our Bishops and priests and for all who lead us in the ways of faith, hope and love.

4. For our young people, that they will open to hear the call of the Good Shepherd to lay down their lives in love and service of God and neighbour.

(pause) We pray to the Lord.

Lord hear our prayer.

5. For the members, staff and wider community attached to the Gisborne Golf Club who have suffered a great loss this week with the destruction of their clubhouse. For the emergency service workers who did a magnificent job to bring the fire under control and stop it spreading further. We are grateful for the services of all who help at the incident and thoughts are with all of those in our community at this time.

(pause) We pray to the Lord.

Lord hear our prayer.

6. We pray for ourselves and the needs of all in our parish community. We pray for those who are sick – especially those on our parish prayer list – and for all who care for them. For those who have died, especially those who gave their lives in service in war (Anzac), and for the priests who have served our parish and Archdiocese. For those whose anniversaries occur at this time, especially *Maria Concetta Garzia*, *Annette Morton & Joseph Perera*. (pause) We pray to the Lord.

The hired man, since he is not the shepherd and the sheep do not belong to him, abandons the sheep and runs away as soon as he sees a wolf coming, and then the wolf attacks and scatters the sheep; this is because he is only a hired man and has no concern for the sheep.
