THE PLENARY This Sunday, after the 8.00am and 10.00am Masses we will show the Broken Bay Institute e-Conference on The Plenary. The presenter, **Dr. Gemma Tulud Cruz** was born and raised in the Philippines. She did her doctoral studies in theology in the Netherlands and taught for several years in the United States before moving to Australia in 2011. She works at Australian Catholic University as a Senior Lecturer in Theology at its Melbourne campus. Gemma's research expertise is in migration theologies. She is the author of Pilgrims in the Wilderness: An Intercultural Theology of Migration (2010) and Toward a Theology of Migration: Social Justice and Religious Experience (2014) and a number of essays on other research interests such as transnationalism, women's issues, and mission. Dr Cruz topic, for the e-Conference is **Synodality, Community and the Margins**. The session runs for approximately 20 minutes.

Feedback suggests that there may be interest in having a further time together to further explore the talks given by Archbishop Coleridge, Fr Richard Lenenhan and Dr Gemma Cruz. There will be an opportunity provided on Tuesday the 11th of December, in the Gathering Space from 10.00 until 12.30.Fr Steven will give a brief synopsis of the three talks and we can view the remaining talks: Mrs Lana Turvey-Collins, Plenary Council Facilitator Topic: Synodality in Practice-Preparing for the Australian Plenary Council and Professor Massimo Faggio-li, Professor of Historical Theology, Villanova University, Philadelphia, USA and Conjoint Professor, BBI-The Australian Institute of Theological Education speaks on Structures of Synodality: Insights from Pope Francis. We will explore and discuss together, then, whatever points or questions arise from the sessions viewed. Perhaps we could stay on to share lunch. Bring a small plate to share.

'Are you the king of the Jews?' Pilate asked. Jesus replied, 'Do you ask this of your own accord, or have others spoken to you about me?' Pilate answered. 'Am I a Jew? It is your own people and the chief priests who have handed you over to me: what have you done?' Jesus replied, 'Mine is not a kingdom of this world; if my kingdom were of this world, my men would have fought to prevent my being surrendered to the Jews. But my kingdom is not of this kind.' 'So you are a king then?' said Pilate. 'It is you who say it' answered Jesus. 'Yes, I am a king. I was born for this, I came into the world for this: to bear witness to the truth: and all who are on the side of truth listen to my voice.'

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Reflection by Greg Sunter

This week marks the end of the liturgical year. Next week, with the first week of Advent, we begin the new liturgical cycle. It is fitting that the Church concludes the liturgical year with the celebration of Christ the King. The conversation between Jesus and Pilate displays a lot of word play on the part of Jesus and quite a lot of confusion on the part of Pilate. The stems from different confusion perceptions of what it means to be a king. For Pilate, part of the most powerful political and military rule in the ancient world, the idea of a king was a threat. Claiming kingship was claiming authority and power that would inevitably lead to challenging the authority and power of Rome and, more directly, its representative in Palestine - Pilate. Jesus, of course, had a completely different idea about ushering in a kingdom. He does indeed declare that he is a king and that is what leads us to today's feast of Christ the King. However, his intention is not to claim a position of power and authority. When we think back to Jesus' teachings about the kingdom of God, we recall that he declares the people of highest status - the first - in the kingdom to be the lowliest of this world. It is the poor, the sick, the outcast, the children and the widows who will hold the highest places in the kingdom of God. In a kingdom like that, what does it mean to declare oneself king? The confusion about what it means to be a king that is captured in this interaction between Jesus and Pilate is the same confusion that we saw among the disciples as they came to terms with exactly what it means to be the Messiah.
