Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

A Greek word for an actor is *hypokrites*, and Jesus often uses it in a disparaging way. How often have we heard the sad, sometimes angry, remark by someone let down by a person they trusted: 'It was all a big act'. Eventually, the true character of the dishonest or manipulative person is revealed. All the acting in the world will not forever suppress what is bound to overflow from the heart.

This takes us to the Sermon on the Mount where Jesus pronounces a blessing on 'the pure in heart, for they will see God'. This does not describe those who are ritually or sexually pure, but those who, at the core of their being, are not actors. There is no duplicity or camouflage, no lie or deception clouding the heart. Because of this, Jesus says they are well prepared to see God because they do not have the great plank of acting in their eye.

Of course, we already see God in the person of Jesus of Nazareth, so that we can pray with the clear-sighted Richard, Bishop of Chichester in 1253: 'O most merciful redeemer, friend and brother, may I know thee more clearly, love thee more dearly and follow thee more nearly, day by day.'

We could pause for a moment and resolve to make that prayer with a pure heart. Then, when we grace-fully share Christ's resurrection life in Heavenly Glory, in the embrace of Divine Love we shall truly see the Triune God face-to-face!

Message from Fr. Steven Rigo regarding the Conviction of Cardinal George Pell

Since last Tuesday, after hearing and reading about the conviction of Cardinal George Pell for charges of historic sexual abuse, I have felt quite devastated because it further shatters the credibility of the Church and reinforces the pain and harm done to many vulnerable people. Personally, I have had concerns with many aspects of the Cardinal's leadership, especially in his roles as Archbishop of Melbourne and Sydney, but I had never considered the possibility that he would abuse his power in an explicitly sexual way with minors.

There have been two trials on the same matter; in the first trial the jury could not reach a unanimous decision; the second trial reached the verdict that has now been made public. Despite this, Cardinal Pell maintains his innocence against the convictions. Several commentators have written about the implausibility of his committing these offences in the Cathedral sacristy, and that we need to await the outcomes of an Appeal against the conviction as we allow the judicial processes to continue as with any person awaiting appeal. Whatever the outcome of that in the future, we need to accept the fact that a jury unanimously found him to be guilty of all the charges, based on what seems to be convincing evidence to which the public does not have access. Clearly, many other people are convinced about his guilt. It makes me realise the complexities with which the judicial system needs to grapple – nothing is simply black and white.

Many priests, religious and lay people around the world working on behalf of the Catholic Church have been found guilty of sexual abuse of minors and vulnerable people over the last three decades. Many of the leaders in the Church have mismanaged the issue of paedophilia over the years by misguidedly moving personnel from one parish to another, or one school to another. This has severely eroded the credibility and integrity of the Church everywhere. I am sure that many Catholics have left the Church in disgust or have even lost their faith in God whom they have come to know through the Church. That particularly distresses me because we, who have been mandated to minister God's life-giving love, have in these ways shamefully and actively turned people away from God. As such, I wish to acknowledge the courage of victims and survivors of clergy sexual abuse who have come forward, facing humiliation, unbelief and denigration for exposing and bringing into the light the shameful behaviour of official representatives of the Church.

What makes this conviction of Cardinal George Pell even more destructive for us is that he has been the Catholic Church's leader of our Diocese and our country and had risen to a most prominent position of leadership in the universal Church. The personal influence he has had on the Church throughout the world over the last twenty-five years has been enormous. He has also been the one who established a process of dealing with the victims and perpetrators of sexual abuse. The value of that process, its intensifying the hurt upon the victims and survivors, and its motivations, are all debatable, but when he was Archbishop of Melbourne, he certainly seemed to be determined to put into place a process to deal with the massive problem of the abuse of vulnerable people by clergy. All this, I find it confusing to reconcile.

In stating all of this about the conviction and impending sentencing of Cardinal Pell, I wish to acknowledge the hurt, disappointment and disillusionment that has been felt by people and Catholics in particular at this time and let you know that I am also deeply hurt and confused. This distressing event also presents an opportunity and a challenge for the Church to take seriously the obligation to put into place radical structural changes to ensure that clericalism and everything else that enabled such abuse of power may be eliminated from the functioning of the Church. My hope is that this event adds to the submissions people have made to the Plenary Council for the bishops of Australia for their agenda to determine what changes are necessary to become the Church God calls us to be at this time. May we put into place better processes of support in responding to complaints and accompanying people who have been hurt to deal better with their painful reality and offer better pathways for their healing. More locally and immediately, I would like to assure you, our parishioners, that our leadership team of priests, pastoral associates, principals and staff will always work to protect our children. The safe-guarding of our children and vulnerable people is a priority of our pastoral and educational ministries. I would personally like to thank you for your commitment to the Church and our parish community in these challenging and humiliating times. May this fire us up to become the Church we should be together. I am happy to discuss this further with anyone who seeks further clarification, support or access to support services. With gratitude for your support and your faith in our parish community,
