<u>THE PLENARY</u> Last weekend (10/11 November) we didn't have so many stay after 8.00 Mass, but we had a great number of people stay after the 10.00 Mass to watch the DVD clip of Archbishop Mark Coleridge, as he spoke to us about synodality, a concept that is new to most of us. We are being urged to become a synodal Church, which means that we are urged to shift from a place or attitude in which the ordained were seen to have the full wisdom of the Holy Spirit, in relation to what God would like for the Church, to a place where the laity is consulted and the wisdom of the laity, inspired by the Holy Spirit, is taken seriously when considering the direction of the Church. The term synodal or synodality describes a Church journeying together, listening to the Holy Spirit and open to whatever it is that the Holy Spirit is saying. There is no predetermined direction. Synod is a Greek term; *Syn* meaning together and *hodos* meaning walking this way together So, its not about someone leading, telling us where to go, we are doing it together. It's a journey – we are finding our way together. You may find some articles Fr Noel Connelly MSC, on the synodal sense of the Plenary, to be of interest. They are in the Gathering Space.

This week we will watch the DVD session with **Fr Richard Lennan**, a systematic theologian, as he speaks about Tradition, traditioning and traditions. We can become caught up in believing that the Church does not or should never change. Fr Lennan explores for us, the central and vital place of Tradition, with a capital T in relation to tradition, which emerges in support of Tradition, but which can change and at times should change. The Richard Lennan session is for **25 minutes**. We will start straight after 8.00 and 10.00 Masses, again with the opportunity for a cuppa and conversation in the gathering Space afterwards. Last week's discussion was enthusiastic, and hopeful and made us more curious, which is important. The Holy Spirit raises up in us the wonder of what could be.

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<u>A SPIRITUALITY OF AGEING</u> In our society which values and promotes youth, the Church has something to say about the important place of every person, including the youth and including older people, regardless of age. In fact the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick and Elderly is a prophetic sacrament, calling people to recognize the faith of those who have lived long and perhaps suffered much. It is in our vulnerability that we make room for God. Ageing can be a time of challenge and a time of rejoicing. We offer anyone, ageing or not, the opportunity to join us for this reflection morning, facilitated by Sr Kerin Caldwell sgs. # Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

### First Reading Dn 12:1-3

When that time comes your own people will be spared.

'At that time Michael will stand up, the great prince who mounts guard over your people. There is going to be a time of great distress, unparalleled since nations first came into existence. When that time comes, your own people will be spared, all those whose names are found written in the Book. Of those who lie sleeping in the dust of the earth many will awake, some to everlasting life, some to shame and everlasting disgrace. The learned will shine as brightly as the vault of heaven, and those who have instructed many in virtue, as bright as stars for all eternity.'

By a single offering he has achieved the eternal perfection of those who are sanctified.

All the priests stand at their duties every day, offering over and over again the same sacrifices which are quite incapable of taking sins away. Christ, on the other hand, has offered one single sacrifice for sins, and then taken his place for ever, at the right hand of God, where he is now waiting until his enemies are made into a footstool for him. By virtue of that one single offering, he has achieved the eternal perfection of all whom he is sanctifying. When all sins have been forgiven, there can be no more sin offerings.

### Gospel Mk 13:24-32

He shall gather his elect from the four winds.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'In those days, after the time of distress, the sun will be darkened, the moon will lose its brightness, the stars will come falling from heaven and the powers in the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in the clouds with great power and glory; then too he will send the angels to gather his chosen from the four winds, from the ends of the world to the ends of heaven.

'Take the fig tree as a parable: as soon as its twigs grow supple and its leaves come out, you know that summer is near. So with you, when you see these things happening: know that he is near, at the very gates. I tell you solemnly, before this generation has passed away all these things will have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'But as for that day or hour, nobody knows it, neither the angels of heaven, nor the Son; no one but the Father.'

Although this is not the last Sunday of the liturgical year, the major theme found in the readings is the end of time. The events that will usher in and will take place during this time are described in apocalyptic terms. The struggles of life will culminate in a massive cosmic confrontation between the forces of good and those of evil. This last battle will be universal in scope, just like the first primordial conflict between chaos and God.

In some way, all of today's readings state that good will finally prevail over evil. In the last days Michael, the angelic warrior of God, will rise up. In the epistle, Christ is pictured seated triumphantly at the right hand of God with his enemies under his foot, a sign of conquest. Finally, in the gospel, the Son of Man, the mysterious figure from apocalyptic literature, comes in the clouds with great power and glory. All of these images are apocalyptic; each of them is quite hopeful.

We read these stories at the close of the liturgical year, because we are coming to the conclusion of our yearly telling of the story of salvation. However, apocalyptic images are timely whenever we find ourselves in the throes of the battle with evil and it appears that we will succumb. These forms will remind us that good will be able to withstand evil. From this we will conclude that we need only trust in God.

Please note that the scripture is that of the Jerusalem Bible translation, whereas here at St. Mary's we read from the New Revised Standard Version lectionary which uses inclusive language. So what you hear may be slightly different from what you may read.
