### David Letterman's interview with Malala Yousafzai



"They tried to bury us but they didn't know we were seeds." Malala 2012

Malala Yousafzai is a Pakistani education advocate who, at the age of 17, became the youngest person to win the Nobel Peace Prize after surviving an assassination attempt by the Taliban. Born on July 12, 1997, Yousafzai became an advocate for girls' education when she herself was still a child, which resulted in the Taliban issuing a

death threat against her. On October 9, 2012, a gunman shot Malala when she was traveling home from school. She survived and has continued to speak out on the importance of education. In 2013, she gave a speech to the United Nations and in 2014, she won the Nobel Peace Prize.

In congratulating
Yousafzai, Pakistani Prime
Minister Nawaz Sharif
said: "She is (the) pride of
Pakistan, she has made
her countrymen proud.
Her achievement is unparalleled and unequalled.
Girls and boys of the
world should take lead
from her struggle and
commitment."

Former U.N. Secretary-

General Ban Ki-moon described Malala as "a brave and gentle advocate of peace who, through the simple act of going to school, became a global teacher."

Malala, turning 21 years of age next month, now attends Oxford University, where she is studying Philosophy, Politics and Economics.

Early this year, the former US talk show host, David Letterman, interviewed Malala for his Netflix program "My Next Guest Needs No Introduction".

Malala's interview revealed a courageous, wise and humble woman who encourages us all to make a difference.

### **Soul Sisters**

Soul Sisters, has been meeting since 2010. The group meets to support each other and to grapple with the issues that affect contemporary women in the church and society; challenging accepted norms and working towards a culture of inclusivity where all are respected and valued.

Soul Sisters conducted a series, a couple of years ago, entitled Women of Faith in Australia and where we invited a Muslim woman, a Jewish Rabbinet, and a Buddhist Nun to speak with us of their own experiences, over three sessions.

Our aim is to provide opportunities to explore our relationships with those whom we might otherwise believe are so different from us. Conscious of Jesus' relationship with those who are most marginalized in society we seek to grow, along with other interested parishioners, in our understanding and wisdom so that we build peace and justice.

The place; the voice of women is of particular interest to us, given that women have tended to be marginalised in the Catholic Church. Given that the Australian Bishops have called for Australians to contribute to a consultation, with Plenary 2020, we hope the events we provide will not only stimulate our thinking as members of the human race, but also as Catholics, so that when we do provide our input to the Bishops, we might consider the most marginalized in our society and the most marginalized in our Church.
