The Full Spiritual Exercises of St Ignatius, Loyola

My name is Steve Nash. I am one of the RE Learning Consultants in the Eastern Region of Melbourne.

Alongside my work, I am in a process/course to become a spiritual director. As part of the course there is a practical element which involves doing the Exercises of St Ignatius with two people. Hence, I am looking for two people who would like to go through the process of the exercises with me.

There will be a cost only in order to help allay the cost of the supervisor (\$25.00 per session but if that is too much we can work something out). I am looking for people who are interested in doing the exercises but people I don't have any formal professional contact with: so teachers or staff in schools that I work in would be OK, REL's would not. The Spiritual Exercises are a compilation of meditations, prayers, and contemplative practices developed by St. Ignatius Loyola to help people deepen their relationship with God. For centuries the Exercises were most commonly given as a "long retreat" of about 30 days in solitude and silence. In recent years, there has been a renewed emphasis on the Spiritual Exercises as a program for laypeople. The most common way of going through the Exercises now is a "retreat in daily life," which involves program of daily prayer and meetings with a spiritual director. The Exercises have also been adapted in many other ways to meet the needs of modern people.

The Full Spiritual Exercises of Saint Ignatius is a Retreat in Daily Life over 30-35 weeks. The prayer for the Exercises asks an hour of you each day and a 45 minute visit to your spiritual director once a week (which could be in person or online). As your spiritual director, I am in a process of formation as a Giver of the full Spiritual Exercises in the Heart Wisdom Program at Kardia Formation P/L, Melbourne, AUSTRALIA, and therefore I will be supervised. That simply means I will discuss the process with a supervising spiritual director.

Summary of Parish Pastoral Council Meeting, Tuesday, 5th of April 2022—Our meeting commenced with an opening prayer led by Jacinta, involving reflection upon the cross, and how it symbolises new beginnings arising from chaos. Following this, Mark provided an update on the most recent School Advisory Council meeting, which occurred on the 3rd of March. The main points were; the prep and year 6 buddy picnic which occurred recently, the whole school Ash Wednesday service went ahead, fire carriers were commissioned, and the school audit which occurred on the 30th of March. We then discussed some interviews that Jacinta has conducted of individuals who do not attend mass, following our Partnered Parishes PPC Formation Day we were presented with similar interviews. It is important to note that the purpose of this is to listen, and understand different peoples perspectives, rather than solely trying to get them to attend mass. Jacinta and Fr Steve have sent a letter to all three schools of the Partnered Parishes so that teachers can contribute anonymously to this initiative. After this, we discussed the Safeguarding of Children and Young people initiative, with another meeting to be held, to ensure all groups are informed of the requirements. Furthermore, different ways of informing the community of this initiative were discussed, like a regular message within the Parish newsletter. Steve Hodgson then provided some information regarding the finance committee, with a letter being released to inform members of the community about the Parish's financial situation. Jacinta discussed the Prep Parent Connection Nights which occurred recently, which proved a great opportunity for parents to meet one another and facilitate conversation. Fr Steve briefed the group of the recent meeting with both Eltham and Montmorency Parishes, regarding the merging of our Parishes. Both seemed open to join, and there will be later discussions regarding the potential merge. The Partnered Parishes Plenary met with the Archdiocese counselor, and discussed potential initiatives to acknowledge victims of sexual abuse within the church. The meeting ended with discussion regarding the PPC at both Sacred Heart and St Thomas moving ahead.

As part of its election statement, the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference said the country had an obligation to take more refugees from Afghanistan because of the support shown to Australian military forces.

"The situation in Afghanistan demands a special intake of at least 20,000 additional places," the statement says.

"We have a moral duty towards those who supported Australian military forces as interpreters or in other capacities."

The statement also calls for a special intake of Ukrainian refugees, saying they require "similar mercy".

"Refugees and asylum-seekers fleeing persecution, violence or life-threatening poverty, and people who have been displaced by climate change, are our sisters and brothers."

The bishops called for a wider reassessment of refugee policies, saying the people fleeing violence or persecution have a "moral claim on our assistance, whether they fit legal definitions of a refugee or not".

The experience of the divine is mediated through the familiar things of this world: Jesus shows them the marks of crucifixion on his body and he breathes the Holy Spirit into them. This is a sensual experience. Thomas, however, is being too concrete and at first he refuses to move beyond the sensual so Jesus allows him a visual and tactile experience, but a leap of intuitive faith is expected of Thomas in the end.

Second Sunday of Easter, Year C

First Reading Acts 5:12-16

The numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily.

The faithful all used to meet by common consent in the Portico of Solomon. No one else ever dared to join them, but the people were loud in their praise and the numbers of men and women who came to believe in the Lord increased steadily. So many signs and wonders were worked among the people at the hands of the apostles that the sick were even taken out into the streets and laid on beds and sleeping-mats in the hope that at least the shadow of Peter might fall across some of them as he went past. People even came crowding in from the towns round about Jerusalem, bringing with them their sick and those tormented by unclean spirits, and all of them were cured.

I was on the island of Patmos for having preached God's word and witnessed for Jesus; it was the Lord's day and the Spirit possessed me, and I heard a voice behind me, shouting like a trumpet, 'Write down all that you see in a book.' I turned round to see who had spoken to me, and when I turned I saw seven golden lamp-stands and, surrounded by them, a figure like a Son of man, dressed in a long robe tied at the waist with a golden girdle.

When I saw him, I fell in a dead faint at his feet, but he touched me with his right hand and said, 'Do not be afraid; it is I, the First and the Last; I am the Living One. I was dead and now I am to live for ever and ever, and I hold the keys of death and of the underworld. Now write down all that you see of present happenings and things that are still to come.'

Gospel Jn 20:19-31

After eight days Jesus came in and stood among them.


In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.

'As the Father sent me, so am I sending you.' After saying this he breathed on them and said: 'Receive the Holy Spirit. For those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven; for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord', he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here: look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.



Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

Doubt and questioning are a normal and proper part of being human. We should allow for this within the community of the Church. A point may come where a person may no longer remain in the Church with any integrity. But a dismissive, excluding Church is not the Church of this gospel story.

Within the companionship of the Church a doubter may hear the words: 'Peace be with you.' What sort of peace? It is that inner assurance that, in the midst of all the tribulations and the turmoil and the myriad precursor deaths which we suffer on all sorts of levels, the Conqueror of Death wants to be with us.

How can the Risen Lord be with us? In Holy Communion, and in those counted as least in the world. According to Matthew 25, He *is* those without the necessities of life: food, shelter, medical care, comfort in distress.

We could pause for a moment to savour that Peace which comes from faith in the Conqueror of Death and in his Real Presence in Holy Communion and in those in dire need.
