NORTH EAST LINK PROJECT

Dear Parishioners,

Just some news that might be of interest to you.

On Monday 22 July, Ananda and I were asked to bless the tunnel boring machines and the statue of St. Barbara just before the works of boring the tunnels were

commenced. The tradition of blessing a statue of St. Barbara at the start of tunnel construction is rooted in the Catholic belief that she is the patron saint of miners, tunnel workers, and those working with artillery. According to legend, St. Barbara was a 3rdcentury martyr who was imprisoned in a tower by her father, which later led to her association with those working underground. Before beginning a tunnel project, a statue of St. Barbara is often blessed and placed at the construction site as a way to invoke her



protection over the workers and to ensure the safe completion of the project. This ritual reflects a deep cultural and spiritual practice within communities that rely on tunnelling for infrastructure or mining. There was also a smoking ceremony conducted by Uncle Ringo and some speeches from chief engineers.

Though it was a rostered day off for workers, there were about 80 to 100 workers present. I found it interesting that in our increasingly secular society, a priest was asked to conduct a religious ceremony.

SOCIAL JUSTICE SUNDAY.

Today is Social Justice Sunday - The theme for the Social Justice Statement for 2024-2025 is, Truth and Peace: A Gospel Word in a Violent World.

In the 2024 – 2025 Social Justice Statement, "Truth and Peace: A Gospel Word in a Violent World", Australia's Bishops scrutinise the signs of our own troubled times, observe the violence around us, and ask why it is so. They also ask what is needed if there is to be peace.

In a world full of pessimism, they put their faith and hope in the possibility of peace.

Using scripture and the guidance of Pope St. John XXIII's Pacem in Terris and Pope Francis' Fratelli Tutti, we learn that peace is possible if we put our trust in Christ who is the way, the truth and the life and the Prince of Peace. It is from him that we learn about the architecture of peace. From him, we learn a commitment to the culture of encounter, the value of dialogue at all levels and the importance of seeing everyone as our sister, our brother.

Dear Parishioners of St Marys,

It is with great pleasure that we can advise you that the loan for the Gathering Space has been paid off! This achievement has only been possible due to the wonderful support of you, the Parishioners, over the past 15 years.

Lectionary Art and Reflection by Jenny Close: Jesus often affronted traditionalists by breaking the rules. Here he reprimands the Pharisees for replacing heartfelt devotion with soulless laws. It is possible to be faithful to traditional laws and yet have a wicked heart – so often our laws have emerged from human traditions rather than 'the commandment of God'. The greatest commandments are to love God and love our neighbour. The first commandment

is most frequently expressed in the love and care that we show towards others – 'to care for orphans and widows' as the letter of James suggests in the second reading. Certainly care for persons rather than rules is foremost in the values of God's reign as witnessed by the ultimate sacrifice of Jesus.

Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

First Reading Dt 4:1-2, 6-8

You may add nothing to the word which I speak to you – keep the commands of the Lord.

Moses said to the people: 'Now, Israel, take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life and may enter and take possession of the land that the Lord the God of your fathers is giving you. You must add nothing to what I command you, and take nothing from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God just as I lay them down for you. Keep them, observe them, and they will demonstrate to the peoples your wisdom and understanding. When they come to know of all these laws they will exclaim, "No other people is as wise and prudent as this great nation." And indeed, what great nation is there that has its gods so near as the Lord our God is to us whenever we call to him? And what great nation is there that has laws and customs to match this whole Law that I put before you today?'

Be doers of the word.

It is all that is good, everything that is perfect, which is given us from above; it comes down from the Father of all light; with him there is no such thing as alteration, no shadow of a change. By his own choice he made us his children by the message of the truth so that we should be a sort of first-fruits of all that he had created.

Accept and submit to the word which has been planted in you and can save your souls. But you must do what the word tells you, and not just listen to it and deceive yourselves.

Pure, unspoilt religion, in the eyes of God our Father is this: coming to the help of orphans and widows when they need it, and keeping oneself uncontaminated by the world.

Gospel Acclamation Jas 1:18

Alleluia, alleluia!

- The Father gave us birth by his message of truth,
- that we might be as the first fruits of his creation.

Alleluia!

Gospel Mk 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

You forget the commandments of God and hold on to human tradition.

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture:

This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me. The worship they offer me is worthless,

- the doctrines they teach are only human regulations.
- You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.'

He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these evil things come from within and make a man unclean.'

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

Many religious leaders have thought that some foods or some people are such a threat to the holiness of their followers that contact with 'unclean', 'defiling' foods or people must be avoided. Our Lord was totally opposed to the idea that holiness was something secured or gained by being quarantined or separated from any-thing or any-person.

On the contrary, he could touch a leper or have a meal with a prostitute. Rather than defilement flowing from the leper or prostitute to Jesus, his life flowed into them repairing their broken humanity, healing them bodymindspirit, holistically, making *them* holy.

The fact is that God, embodied in Jesus Christ, is contagious. The contagion of Divine Life is meant to flow into the inner depths of personality, into the heart. When this occurs, the Divine Life in the human person causes 'holiness'.

We have to strive to put ourselves in the way of this contagion. We become holy when we allow ourselves to be touched by our Lord Jesus Christ. How do we do this?

By hearing of His life in the Gospel, by being nourished by His life in Holy Communion, by being touched by the plight of those in whom He is to be found. St James in the second reading describes some who are particularly vulnerable in a patriarchal society with no social security system: the widows and orphans. No doubt, we can identify equivalent groups in our own society and overseas.

We could take a moment to pray that we might be more conscious of the Holy Spirit germinating something in our hearts, making us holy from the inside out, that our holiness be authenticated by good works so that we may be holy as the Lord our God is holy.
