Hello dear Parishioners of St. Mary's, St. Thomas and Sacred Heart

Greetings of Peace and Joy of the Risen Lord

My name is Fr. Ananda Prasad Maddineni MSFS. You can call me Fr. Anand. I was born in India. After my secondary school, I joined the Minor Seminary of the Missionaries of St. Francis de Sales (MSFS or Fransalians). After completion of my Novitiate, Philosophy and Theological studies, I was Ordained to the Sacred Priesthood on 21 October 1996. As a new Priest I worked in Khammam, India as an Assistant Parish Priest and Teacher at St. Francis de Sales High School. In 1998 I was sent to West Indies as a member of the pioneering team to start our Mission in St. Lucia. From 2001 to 2006 I was Assistant Parish Priest at St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Jacksonville, Florida, USA; during this time I also pursued my Doctor of Ministry studies at Barry University, Miami, FL and graduated in 2010. From 2006-2012 I was the Parish Priest of Holy Spirit Catholic Church, Jacksonville, FL. I returned to India in 2012 and served as the Parish Priest of Holy Cross (2012-2015), Parish Priest of Mother of Compassion Church and Assistant Principal of St. Francis de Sales High School (2015-2019) and also Professor of Pastoral Theology at St. John's Regional Seminary. At my provincial's request I led the pioneering mission team to East Flores, Indonesia in 2019 and for the past 4 years I was the Mission Coordinator and the Parish Priest of St. Kornelius Parish in the Diocese of Larantuka, Indonesia.

I am very happy to come to Melbourne and to be assigned to the Partnered Parishes of St. Mary's, St. Thomas and Sacred Heart as an Assistant Parish Priest.

Looking forward to meet and work with you all in the service of the Risen Lord.

CHARITIES BEING CHARGED EXTRA WASTE FEES

Below is a condensed version of an email that St Vincent de Paul are asking its volunteers and concerned parishioners to send to their local member and to c.c. the Environment Minister, The Treasurer and Premier:

On 1 July 2023, the Victorian Government will stop supporting charity shops, and start penalising them with \$1.5 million in unfair extra cost burdens. This is a crisis situation for Victoria's charity shops, as well as the environment and those in need.

All the other State Governments in Australia provide protection for charities from waste levy costs, because they know charities don't create the waste, don't want the waste and that it is illegally dumped on them. All the other Australian states support charities as integral partners for a Circular Economy. Going it alone and imposing costs on charities will make Victoria an outcast state in penalising charities.

This is the impact of the Victorian Government's decision to hurt charities will have on those in need:

- ◆ \$1.5 million in electricity or gas bills that can't be paid by those who need help
- ◆ 428,571 meals that cannot be provided to Victorians who will go hungry
- ◆ 38,461 crisis calls from Victorians that can't be answered, including suicide calls

This is the impact of the Victorian Government's decision to hurt charities on the environment:

- ◆ 27,500 more tonnes of waste going to landfill every year

Why does the Victorian Government want to hurt the charity shop sector, especially as it provides the government in \$232 million in avoided costs, in providing food, shelter and other essential services to Victorians in need.

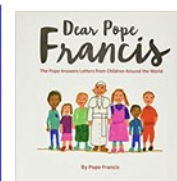
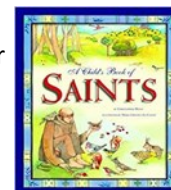

There is nothing uniform in the way that Jesus made himself seen, heard, felt, recognised etc, on these occasions. In every encounter there seems to be a unique element. In this account from Luke's Gospel, wonder and reflection are integral parts of a conversion experience.

Third Sunday of Easter, Year A

23 April 2023

First Reading Acts 2:14, 22-33

It was impossible for him to be held by the power of Hades.

On the day of Pentecost, Peter stood up with the Eleven and addressed the crowd in a loud voice: 'Men of Israel, listen to what I am going to say: Jesus the Nazarene was a man commended to you by God by the miracles and portents and signs that God worked through him when he was among you, as you all know. This man, who was put into your power by the deliberate intention and foreknowledge of God, you took and had crucified by men outside the Law. You killed him, but God raised him to life, freeing him from the pangs of Hades; for it was impossible for him to be held in its power since, as David says of him:

I saw the Lord before me always,
for with him at my right hand nothing
can shake me.

So my heart was glad
and my tongue cried out with joy:
my body, too, will rest in the hope
that you will not abandon my soul to Hades
nor allow your holy one to experience corruption.
You have made known the way of life to me,
you will fill me with gladness through your presence.

'Brothers, no one can deny that the patriarch David himself is dead and buried: his tomb is still with us. But since he was a prophet, and knew that God had sworn him an oath to make one of his descendants succeed him on the throne, what he foresaw and spoke about was the resurrection of the Christ: he is the one who was not abandoned to Hades, and whose body did not experience corruption. God raised this man Jesus to life, and all of us are witnesses to that. Now raised to the heights by God's right hand, he has received from the Father the Holy Spirit, who was promised, and what you see and hear is the outpouring of that Spirit.'

Second Reading 1 Pt 1:17-21

The ransom that was paid to free you was the blood of the Lamb, Jesus Christ.

If you are acknowledging as your Father one who has no favourites and judges everyone according to what he has done, you must be scrupulously careful as long as you are living away from your home. Remember, the ransom that was paid to free you from the useless way of life your ancestors handed down was not paid in anything corruptible, neither in

silver nor gold, but in the precious blood of a lamb without spot or stain, namely Christ; who, though known since before the world was made, has been revealed only in our time, the end of the ages, for your sake. Through him you now have faith in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory for that very reason – so that you would have faith and hope in God.

Gospel Lk 24:13-35

They recognised him at the breaking of the bread.

Two of the disciples of Jesus were on their way to a village called Emmaus, seven miles from Jerusalem, and they were talking together about all that had happened. Now as they talked this over, Jesus himself came up and walked by their side; but something prevented them from recognising him. He said to them, 'What matters are you discussing as you walk along?' They stopped short, their faces downcast.

Then one of them, called Cleopas, answered him, 'You must be the only person staying in Jerusalem who does not know the things that have been happening there these last few days.' 'What things?' he asked. 'All about Jesus of Nazareth' they answered 'who proved he was a great prophet by the things he said and did in the sight of God and of the whole people; and how our chief priests and our leaders handed him over to be sentenced to death, and had him crucified. Our own hope had been that he would be the one to set Israel free. And this is not all: two whole days have gone by since it all happened; and some women from our group have astounded us: they went to the tomb in the early morning, and when they did not find the body, they came back to tell us they had seen a vision of angels who declared he was alive. Some of our friends went to the tomb and found everything exactly as the women had reported, but of him they saw nothing.'

Then he said to them, 'You foolish men! So slow to believe the full message of the prophets! Was it not ordained that the Christ should suffer and so enter into his glory?' Then, starting with Moses and going through all the prophets, he explained to them the passages throughout the scriptures that were about himself.

When they drew near to the village to which they were going, he made as if to go on; but they pressed him to stay with them. 'It is nearly evening' they said 'and the day is almost over.' So he went in to stay with them. Now while he was with them at table, he took the bread and said the blessing; then he broke it and handed it to them. And their eyes were opened and they recognised him; but he had vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, 'Did not our hearts burn within us as he talked to us on the road and explained the scriptures to us?'

They set out that instant and returned to Jerusalem. There they found the Eleven assembled together with their companions, who said to them, 'Yes, it is true. The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon.' Then they told their story of what had happened on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of bread.



Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

This story is the story of each one of us at Mass. Each Mass is structured on the Road to Emmaus travelogue.

Two men set off on a journey of their own making. At the beginning of Mass we confess that we have gone off course.

The traveller helps the men on the road to Emmaus understand what had happened to Jesus of Nazareth by showing God's plan revealed in the Hebrew Scriptures. In the Liturgy of the Word, we hear Scriptures expounded, revealing more fully the true identity of Jesus of Nazareth. Every so often you will experience the burning sensation in your heart as something that is said hits home.

The traveller takes bread, blesses it, and gives it to them to eat. In that moment of bread-sharing, the two men recognised their travelling companion as the Risen Lord. Eat the bread consecrated at Mass, and we receive into our very being the Divine Companion for our journey through life.

We could pause for a moment to thank God for the privilege at every Mass of having our eyes opened so that we recognise Our Risen Lord Jesus Christ in the breaking of the bread.

Alleluia!
