COVID-19 IMPLICATIONS FOR THE CATHOLIC ARCHDIOCESE OF MELBOURNE

INFORMATION UPDATED: 23 JUNE 2022, 12.00PM

We welcome the opening up of our places of worship and opportunities for gathering but remain mindful and respectful that many in our community remain feeling cautious.

All Catholics in Melbourne continue to be dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass until further directed by the

Archbishop. We continue to carry the happy obligation to keep Sunday holy, whether we can attend Mass or not, and can do so by any kind of prayer with members of our household and parish, reading holy scripture, and encouraging one another in our faith.

Face coverings remain optional within Places of Worship, workplaces, primary schools, early childhood or retail settings.

There are no longer vaccination requirements at Places of Worship nor any requirement for organisers to check vaccination status for attendee, workers or volunteers at Places of Worship and for associated parish activities.

It should be noted that the Archdiocese and each parish must continue to have an up-to-date COVIDSafe Plan.

Sanitising hands before distribution of Holy Communion is still recommended.

Holy Water stoups may be filled, but care should be seen that the water is changed regularly.

Holy Communion may be distributed to the faithful under both species (i.e., the Sacred Host and Precious Blood).

It is an essential requirement to isolate for seven days following a COVID-19 diagnosis.

ST THOMAS FEAST DAY 3rd July

Thomas the Apostle also known as Didymus ("twin"), was one of the Twelve Apostles of Jesus according to the New Testament. Thomas is commonly known as "Doubting Thomas" because he initially doubted the resurrection of Jesus Christ.

At the Last Supper, when Jesus tells his disciples that he is about to leave them and that they know the way where he is going,

Thomas cries out, "Lord we do not know where you are going; and how can we know the way? Jesus replies "I am the way...No one goes to the Father save through me.'

Thomas who had not died with Jesus after all, was away when Jesus appeared to the rest.

'Unless I see in his hands the mark of nails, and put my finger in the place of the nails, and put my hand into his side I will not believe.'

Only Jesus could convince him, and he came specially to give him the proof he demanded: 'Bring your finger here and see my hands; and put forth your hand and place it in my side; and be not unbelieving, but believing.' Thomas needed no more and burst into great cry: 'My Lord and my God.' Thomas would not be left out again.

Jesus said to Thomas: 'have you believed because you have seen? Blessed are they who have not seen and yet believe.'

St Thomas doubt helps us more than the faith of others. Faith is above reason, but reason leads to faith, for the things men see and touch point beyond themselves.

When the feast of Saint Thomas was inserted in the Roman calendar in the 9th century, it was assigned to 21 December.

St Jerome mentioned the apostle on 3 July, the date to which the

Roman celebration was transferred in 1969, so that it would no longer interfere with Advent.

LECTIONARY ART REFLECTION BY JENNY CLOSE.

The 'Lord of the harvest' sends out disciples to spread the good news of the Kingdom in this reading from Luke's gospel. The yield of his harvest is high, but there are problems recruiting workers to bring in the crop. Perhaps this is because the work of a disciple is demanding and ultimately dangerous.

Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year C

3 July 2022

First Reading Is 66:10-14

I will send toward Jerusalem peace like a river.

Gospel Lk 10:1-12, 17-20 (or shorter form Lk 10:1-9)


Your peace will rest upon him.

The Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them out ahead of him, in pairs, to all the towns and places he himself was to visit. He said to them, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest. Start off now, but remember, I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. Carry no purse, no haversack, no sandals. Salute no one on the road. Whatever house you go into, let your first words be, "Peace to this house!" And if a man of peace lives there, your peace will go and rest on him; if not, it will come back to you. Stay in the same house, taking what food and drink they have to offer, for the labourer deserves his wages; do not move from house to house. Whenever you go into a town where they make you welcome, eat what is set before you. Cure those in it who are sick, and say, "The kingdom of God is very near to you." But whenever you enter a town and they do not make you welcome, go out into its streets and say, "We wipe off the very dust of your town that clings to our feet, and leave it with you. Yet be sure of this: the kingdom of God is very near." I tell you, that on that day it will not go as hard with Sodom as with that town.'

The seventy-two came back rejoicing. 'Lord,' they said, 'even the devils submit to us when we use your name.' He said to them, 'I watched Satan fall like lightning from heaven. Yes, I have given you power to tread underfoot serpents and scorpions and the whole strength of the enemy; nothing shall ever hurt you. Yet do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you; rejoice rather that your names are written in heaven.'

Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

Although the gospel is a report of ministerial commissioning, it contains elements of discipleship in general. Most obvious is the disciples' dependence on Jesus. They are not independent missionaries; they are followers. Furthermore, there is a communal dimension of discipleship. While there is certainly a personal relationship between Jesus and each disciple, discipleship itself is not a singular privilege that one hugs to oneself to the exclusion of others.

Disciples minister to the needs of others, whatever those needs may be and with whatever abilities the disciple may possess. There are various kinds of healing: a friendly smile, a word of gratitude, a soothing touch. We can teach the lessons of life in classrooms, playrooms, in kitchens, boardrooms. There are many ways that we can cast out the demons that hold our world by the throat; demons of poverty and oppression, demons of addiction and slavery, demons of disdain and neglect, demons of hatred and violence. If they are not cast out by us, then by whom?

The life of discipleship is not an unmixed blessing. Because disciples are marked by the sign of the cross, they must expect suffering. Because they do not live according to the standards of the world, disciples will be judged as fools. Some of them will be subjected to even greater suffering. Still, the disciple proclaims that true fulfilment is only found in God! In reality, it is the world that is upside down, not the life of discipleship. And it is the cross that sets things right.
