PARTNERED PARISHES NEWS

Partnered Parishes Pastoral Council Report from 14 August, 2024

- Request to be made to school principals to publish the letter to parishioners of partnered parishes in their school newsletters and, every 2 months, a brief report on the actions of the PPPC. The letter informs parishioners about the role of the PPPC and the strengths of working in partnership. At the time of this report, all principals had agreed to the request.
- The schools will be invited to raise any matters for discussion with the PPPC to encourage working together and effective two-way communication.
- The report from the PPPC will also be published regularly in the parish newsletter.
- Service for Peace and Hope to be held at St Thomas at 7pm on 18 September. Our parish schools are involved in the preparation of this service as well as planning their own school services.
- Discussion on the importance of fostering a culture of continual growth and learning of the laity including the importance of formation and support
- Discussion regarding the proposed building of a kindergarten at St Thomas. No word yet from the Council regarding approval.
- Future Planning: Continuation of our work including assessing assets held by parishes and their valuations.
- Review of the functions of the PPPC in the light of a framework from the Archdiocese on parish renewal. Father Steven and parish representatives to attend a meeting regarding a Parish Resource Guide.
- Episcopal Visit to our partnered parishes and schools on 18 20 October. The archbishop will be visiting each parish, touring
 each school, meeting with parishioners, parish leaders, staff and young people, visiting some older people and saying Masses.

The firstfruits of hope (Rom 8:19-25)

Welcome friends, to the **Season of Creation** which starts each year on 1 September, the <u>World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation</u>, and ends on 4 October, the Feast of St Francis of Assisi, patron saint of ecology. The Season of Creation is a time to "put right" our relationship with our Creator and all creation through celebration, conversion and change of lifestyle. It is a global ecumenical celebration where we pray and act together as a Christian family for our common home.

The symbol for 2024 is **the firstfruits of hope** (Rom 8:19-25). Hope is given to us by God as a protection and guard against futility. Only through hope may we realise the gift of freedom in fullness. Freedom to act not only to achieve enjoyment and prosperity, but to reach the stage in which we are free <u>and</u> responsible. Freedom and responsibility enable us to make the world a better place. Only when we work together with creation can the firstfruits of hope emerge.

LITURGY OF THE WORD WITH COMMUNION (SUNDAYS) &

LITURGY OF THE WORD WITHOUT COMMUNION (WEEKDAYS)

With now only two priests across our three parishes there may be occasions when the celebration of the Liturgy of the Word will have to replace Mass. For Sundays and Saturday evenings there is normally a supply priest engaged to replace one or the other of us when either is on vacation. However, it may happen that a supply priest fails to turn up for a variety of reasons. On these occasions a trained member of the parish will lead a Liturgy of the Word with communion being distributed as part of the ceremony. On weekdays, when one or other of us is away on vacation, there will be the celebration of the Liturgy of the Word without communion being distributed.

Some have asked why there is no distribution of communion at weekday celebrations of the Liturgy of the Word, when at the end of the ceremony, some ministers of communion to the sick may well take hosts from the tabernacle to distribute communion to parishioners in their homes and Aged Accommodation places. We have also had people saying that if we did have Communion at these celebrations of the Liturgy of the Word, they might come to these celebrations. I would like to outline some important theological and liturgical principles about the celebration of the Liturgy of the Word when a priest is not available to celebrate Mass.

A Communion service can never substitute for Mass. If there is no Mass that can be reasonably attended by the faithful, then there is no Mass obligation. In the absence of Mass, the community is invited by the Church to pray the Liturgy of the Word or the Liturgy of the Hours. This is led by a member of the parish trained to lead these celebrations, who will also possibly read a reflection on the readings to assist those who gather to contemplate them more deeply. It is possible that the leader of these celebrations may open it to others who are gathered, to share some personal faith reflections on the readings. It is important that if this is done, it is not to be used as an opportunity by any of those who gather for prayer to engage in theological debates, but as opportunities for faith sharing. Although the Church does foresee a Liturgy of the Word with Communion (i.e., a Communion service) as a possibility on a Sunday, the

Church asks that such liturgies be rarely permitted on weekdays. The Church sees Communion services during the week when there is no priest as an extraordinary exception rather than the norm. The 2003 Vatican Instruction Redemptionis Sacramentum, in considering the integral nature of Communion to the Celebration of the Eucharist (Mass), states: "It is necessary to avoid any sort of confusion between this type of gathering [i.e. a Sunday Celebration of the Word with Holy Communion] and the celebration of the Eucharist. The diocesan Bishops, therefore, should prudently discern whether Holy Communion ought to be distributed in these gatherings..."[165.]

Even on Sundays, the Code of Canon Law recommends a simple Liturgy of the Word rather than a Communion service: "If participation in the eucharistic celebration becomes impossible because of the absence of a sacred minister or for another grave cause, it is strongly recommended that the faithful take part in a liturgy of the word if such a liturgy is celebrated in a parish church or other sacred place according to the prescripts of the diocesan bishop or that they devote themselves to prayer for a suitable time alone, as a family, or, as the occasion permits, in groups of families". (canon 1248 §2)

We see here how important it is to protect our understanding of the centrality of the Celebration of the Eucharist. Imagine how easy it would be for people to encourage a distorted understanding of Eucharist if we are to introduce the reception of Communion outside of Mass as a norm. "Likewise, especially if Holy Communion is distributed during such celebrations [i.e. Sunday Celebrations of the Word], the diocesan Bishop, to whose exclusive competence this matter pertains, must not easily grant permission for such celebrations to be held on weekdays, especially in places where it was possible or would be possible to have the celebration of Mass on the preceding or the following Sunday. Priests are therefore earnestly requested to celebrate Mass daily for the people in one of the churches entrusted to their care." [166.]

To reinforce the centrality of Eucharist and the Sunday Celebration; the Lord's Day as the principle celebration for the community, the Australian Catholic Bishops' Guidelines stress the importance of only having Communion with Celebrations of Liturgy of the Word in the Absence of a Priest, on a Sunday and only when necessary. Sunday, or its vigil, is the day on which the community of faith gathers. Weekday Masses are the privilege we have because we still have enough priests. That has not always been the case, especially in generations past in Australia and it is certainly still the case in many countries. We don't have a right to the Eucharist. It is a gift. We come to the Eucharist in humility, to remember, to give thanks, to become the body of Christ and to be sent into the world with God's mission.

Finally, it is foreseen that at the end of the celebration of the Liturgy of the Word, ministers of communion to the sick may take hosts from the tabernacle to distribute them to the sick and elderly who cannot participate in the liturgy in the church. The purpose of the tabernacle is primarily for the reservation of the Blessed Sacrament for devotion and prayer in the church, but equally important is that the reserved Blessed Sacrament be available for distribution of communion to the sick and elderly at any time.

It is the commitment of the priests of the parish to celebrate the Mass on most weekdays, however that is not always possible. When a priest is not available, the community is asked to gather to celebrate the Liturgy of the Word without distribution of communion. Please come and join those who gather for our celebrations of Liturgy of the Word. Truly, Christ is present in his Word when we gather in prayer.





- Review of the mission and functions of the PPC in the light of a framework from the archdiocese on parish renewal look at how the Partnered Parishes Pastoral Council conducted their review for guidance for next steps.
- Support for the various parish groups currently operating future meetings proposed with the groups to discuss their roles and what support would be appropriate and helpful.
- Vacancies on the PPC coming up due to a regular turnover in membership. Advertising to come and encouragement to all parishioners to consider nominating.
- Safeguarding Risk Assessment Workshops in September for those in parish groups.
- Artist in Residence grants possible application in 2025.
- New parish website nearly ready to launch.
- Proposed building of kindergarten on St Thomas parish land no word yet from the Council regarding approval.
 Consideration of a few objections regarding height of privacy screens and traffic.
- Parish School report children and staff involved in 25th anniversary activity and subsequent presentation of framed art piece to the parish. School also involved in the Peace and Hope liturgy a coordinated activity with Sacred Heart and St Mary's primary schools in September.
- Report received from the Partnered Parishes Pastoral Council on their work.
- Decision to cancel next PPC meeting on 18 September as this conflicts with the Peace and Hope Service to be held at St Thomas Church on the same night.

Second Reading Jas 2:14-18

Faith without good works is dead.

Take the case, my brothers, of someone who has never done a single good act but claims that he has faith. Will that faith save him? If one of the brothers or one of the sisters is in need of clothes and has not enough food to live on, and one of you says to them, 'I wish you well; keep yourself warm and eat plenty,' without giving them these bare necessities of life, then what good is that? Faith is like that: if good works do not go with it, it is quite dead.

This is the way to talk to people of that kind: 'You say you have faith and I have good deeds; I will prove to you that I have faith by showing you my good deeds – now you prove to me that you have faith without any good deeds to show.'

Gospel Mk 8:27-35

You are the Christ ... the Son of Man was destined to suffer much.

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said, 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked, 'who do you say I am?' Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him.

And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.'



Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

There are several messianic traditions, each one characterising the anointed one of the future in a unique way. Do we expect a prophetic figure who will enter our world and reform the structures of society, or a strong leader who will overturn these structures and establish a new order? Are we waiting for a teacher who will transform our minds and hearts, or a judge who will punish us for our infidelities? Are we expecting someone who will renew the face of the earth, or someone who will come in fire and brimstone to destroy it? What kind of a messiah do we expect? For what kind of a change are we preparing ourselves?

Jesus seems tο overturn Our expectations. We look for one who will save us from the predicaments in which we find ourselves, and he comes to us as one who seems to be a victim of his own predicament. God's thinking seems to be the reverse of ours: Those who save their lives, lose them: those who lose their lives, save them; the seed must die before it can bear fruit; Jesus will be killed, but will then be raised from the dead.

Can we claim to understand Jesus? Or are we more like the people in James' community: people who profess faith in Jesus, but who do not live it out; people who speak pleasant words to others, who say the right things, but who do not back up their words with good works? Is our faith really living?
