
Welcome friends, to the **Season of Creation** which starts each year on 1 September, the <u>World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation</u>, and ends on 4 October, the Feast of St Francis of Assisi, patron saint of ecology. The Season of Creation is a time to "put right" our relationship with our Creator and all creation through celebration, conversion and change of lifestyle. It is a global ecumenical celebration where we pray and act together as a Christian family for our common home.

The symbol for 2024 is **the firstfruits of hope** (Rom 8:19-25). Hope is given to us by God as a protection and guard against futility. Only through hope may we realise the gift of freedom in fullness. Freedom to act not only to achieve enjoyment and prosperity, but to reach the stage in which we are free <u>and</u> responsible. ## STANDING, SITTING AND KNEELING DURING MASS

For anyone who is new in recent years to the parishes of St Thomas or Sacred Heart or a visitor, you will have noticed that people in our congregations adopt different postures during the Eucharistic Prayer. Some stand, some kneel and some sit. We thought it would be of interest to explain the history within our parishes of these differences.


We remember the first celebration of the Eucharist was at the Last Supper, with Jesus saying to the apostles: "Do this in memory of me". In the early church the Eucharist was initially celebrated as a common meal among believers. Before long the liturgy around the core of the Eucharist developed, with readings from scripture and remembrance of the words and acts of Jesus. This came out of the tradition from the Old Testament of praying in the synagogue or temple. People stood during the celebration of the Eucharist. It was only in the Middle Ages that kneeling was introduced.

During the 20th century enormous change occurred in the ways we celebrated the Mass, coinciding with the Second Vatican Council. The priest faced the congregation from the altar. The Mass was said in the local language of the people. These changes enabled the people to see and understand the liturgy, to visibly connect them with the priest and to be more actively involved. The Communion rail was taken away, removing a perceived separation between the people and the priest. People received Communion standing up. Three new Eucharistic Prayers were approved. The music changed and new instruments were heard. New churches from the 1960s and 1970s were designed differently from the older style. The congregation often sat in a semi-circular arrangement facing the altar as the central focus for the Mass, where the bread and wine became the Body and Blood of Christ. The shape of this gathering space encouraged the congregation to be reminded that they were a community of faith and that they gathered together to express that faith. The design of the churches of St Thomas and Sacred Heart sits within this new style.

In keeping with the new thinking about liturgy, the first parish priest of St Thomas, Father Kevin McIntosh, brought in a change to practice during the Eucharist Prayer. He proposed that the congregation should stand during the whole Prayer. He believed that this would enable full, conscious and active participation during this most sacred part of the Mass. When we stand, we engage directly with the priest standing at the altar. We do not pray personally at this time: we look up and bear witness, fully connected with the words and actions of the priest, who stands in the place of Jesus. There was also a practical reason for the change. Members of the congregation were sitting on individual chairs, without kneelers, making kneeling more difficult and providing the unsafe possibility of chairs moving when people leant on them to assist standing. The change was accepted and standing became the accepted practice at St Thomas for many years. Sacred Heart Parish adopted the same practice independently after moving into their newly completed church in the late 1990s. The children in our primary schools have also followed this practice.

Over time some people have chosen to sit or kneel during the Eucharistic Prayer, for various reasons. We recognise the physical needs of those who are frail, elderly or incapacitated, who may find it difficult to stand, particularly for long periods. Other people may come from different backgrounds and traditions where kneeling is the norm. Some may hold to the traditions of the past when people knelt during this time of the Mass. Standing during the Eucharistic Prayer will continue to be the practice at St Thomas and Sacred Heart and we invite all members of the congregation to join this practice. When we move together it is a sign of unity as a community before God. However, we believe that all members of the congregation should feel comfortable to choose when to stand, sit or kneel during the Mass. The important nature of the posture is that it is reverent before God. This reverence comes not from any rules but from our hearts.





Jesus confounds the pretensions of his disciples by an appeal to the heart when he affectionately hugs the child to himself.

## **First Reading** Wis 2:12, 17-20

Let us condemn him to a most shameful death.

The godless say to themselves,

'Let us lie in wait for the virtuous man, since he annoys us and opposes our way of life, reproaches us for our breaches of the law

and accuses us of playing false to our upbringing.

Let us see if what he says is true, let us observe what kind of end he himself will have.

If the virtuous man is God's son, God will take his part

and rescue him from the clutches of his enemies.

Let us test him with cruelty and with torture,

and thus explore this gentleness of his and put his endurance to the proof.

Let us condemn him to a shameful death since he will be looked after – we have his word for it.'

#### Second Reading Jas 3:16-4:3

Justice is the harvest of peacemakers from seeds sown in a spirit of peace.

Wherever you find jealousy and ambition, you find disharmony, and wicked things of every kind being done; whereas the wisdom that comes down from above is essentially something pure; it also makes for peace, and is kindly and considerate; it is full of compassion and shows itself by doing good; nor is there any trace of partiality or hypocrisy in it. Peacemakers, when they

work for peace, sow the seeds which will bear fruit in holiness.

Where do these wars and battles between yourselves first start? Isn't it precisely in the desires fighting inside your own selves? You want something and you haven't got it; so you are prepared to kill. You have an ambition that you cannot satisfy; so you fight to get your way by force. Why you don't have what you want is because you don't pray for it; when you do pray and don't get it, it is because you have not prayed properly, you have prayed for something to indulge your own desires.

#### **Gospel** Mk 9:30-37


The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of humanity ... All who wish to be first must make themselves the servants of all

After leaving the mountain Jesus and his disciples made their way through Galilee; and he did not want anyone to know, because he was instructing his disciples; he was telling them, 'The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of men; they will put him to death; and three days after he has been put to death he will rise again.' But they did not understand what he said and were afraid to ask him.

They came to Capernaum, and when he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the road?' They said nothing because they had been arguing which of them was the greatest. So he sat down, called the Twelve to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all.' He then took a little child, set him in front of them, put his arms round him, and said to them, 'Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.'

#### Reflection by Nick Brodie

Today's Gospel reveals a fearfulness in the disciples' response to Jesus. Afraid of asking too many questions, they almost seem to prefer being ignorant rather than admit the limits of their own understanding. Strangely, this self-imposed ignorance does not prevent them from posturing for position. What a warning for the Church this episode seems to offer!

While this excerpt of Mark's Gospel is often interpreted in terms of the virtue of humility, the other aspect of Jesus' point is easily overlooked. Every Christian is called to be 'last of all and servant of all'. Ours is a faith of humble service.

The scriptures repeatedly make the point that faith is always embedded in creation. A mountain, a road, a town, and a house all frame the action in this episode. Because the Church exists wherever its members go our beliefs and prayers are not restricted to church buildings. We take our faith on roads, into our homes and towns, and even up mountains.

Given this, our faith compels us to have a special care for all of creation. As Jesus clearly intimates, by humbly serving created things we express our love of the Creator who made them all.
