WEEKLY REFLECTIONS

Today is the sixth weekend of Lent and we pause to reflect.

On Palm Sunday we remember Jesus entering Jerusalem, moving towards his passion, death and resurrection. At the Passover meal Jesus makes a new covenant with the apostles, giving them his body and blood in remembrance of his ultimate sacrifice to come. During his agony in the Garden of Gethsemane no-one keeps him company and throughout his passion, the brutal beatings and humiliation of his journey to Golgotha, he is deserted by most of his followers. He looks to his Father and fulfills his mission with his death on the cross and his resurrection.

Create in us a new heart, to feel the power of this sacrifice over death and to embrace the salvation and grace that flows to all who have faith.

"We wait in hope for the Lord; he is our help and our shield. In him our hearts rejoice, for we trust in his holy name. May your unfailing love be with us, Lord, even as we put our hope in you". (Psalm 33:20-22)

6TH SUNDAY OF LENT - HOLY WEEK WEEKEND OF 23-24 MARCH 2024

REFLECTION

We see images of the cross everywhere from school uniforms to hospital buildings. Perhaps it is so commonplace that it doesn't stop us in our tracks the way it should. The cross of Jesus is the best key we have for understanding the mystery of God's love. God's compassion for the human family took Jesus to a lonely and brutal execution. Jesus was the victim of appalling injustice and degradation. His experience asks us to try to make the world more just and to revere the dignity of every person. 'Whatsoever you do to the least of my sisters and brothers, you do to me.' This is part of the reason why Project Compassion has, for 60 years, been part of our Lenten observance.

This year, Holy Week begins with the reading of the passion story from Mark's Gospel. Even in busy lives, we should try to set time aside to spend with this extraordinary story, not to rush it. Gently take a little at a time and ask for the grace to be close to Jesus. In the Spiritual Exercises, St Ignatius asks us 'to consider how the divinity hides itself.' In other words, this is humanity stripped bare.

One way to spend time with the passion story is to take a different character each week and quietly ponder what it looked like to them and what they may have felt. Here is a suggestion:

Sunday Judas Iscariot Monday Simon Peter Tuesday The high priest Wednesday Pontius Pilate Thursday Simon of Cyrene Friday The centurion Saturday Mary of Magdala

Let us remember a beautiful prayer of just seven words that was taught to Pope Francis by his grandmother: Jesus, make my heart more like yours.

WAY OF THE CROSS BY POPE FRANCIS

Lord Jesus, help us to see in your Cross all the crosses of the world:

the cross of people hungry for bread and for love;

the cross of people alone and abandoned even by their children and kin:

the cross of people thirsty for justice and for peace;

the cross of people who lack the comfort of faith:

the cross of the elderly who struggle under the weight of years and of loneliness:

the cross of migrants who find doors closed in fear and hearts armoured by political calculations;

the cross of little ones, wounded in their innocence and their purity;

the cross of humanity that wanders in the darkness of uncertainty and in the obscurity of temporary culture;

the cross of families split by betrayal, by the seductions of the evil one or by homicidal levity and selfishness;

the cross of consecrated people who tirelessly seek to bring your light into the world and feel rejected, derided and humiliated:

the cross of consecrated people who, along the way, have forgotten their first love:

the cross of your children who, while believing in you and seeking to live according to your word, find themselves marginalised and rejected even by their families and their peers;

the cross of our weaknesses, of our hypocrisy, of our betrayals, of our sins and of our many broken promises;

the cross of your Church that, faithful to your Gospel, struggles to spread your love even among the baptized themselves;

the cross of the Church, your Bride, that feels constantly assailed from within and without:

the cross of our common home that is gravely withering before our selfish eyes, blinded by greed and by power.

Lord Jesus, revive in us the hope of resurrection and of your definitive victory over all evil and all death.

PALM SUNDAY 23/24 March All Palm Sunday Masses will commence on the verandah outside the Gathering Space (weather permitting) with the blessing of branches and procession into the church. Please bring your own branches to these Masses. <u>MINISTERS OF COMMUNION TO THE SICK</u> A blessing service will be held in the church on Holy Thursday 28 March at 9.30am for ministers who are taking Communion to the sick and housebound of our parish. No Communion will be available on Good Friday.

<u>OUR LENTEN ENVIRONMENT</u> During Lent, our worship space is simplified with no flowers or greenery in the church or gathering space representing the barren desert where Jesus fasted for 40 days and 40 nights. This is symbolic of the Lenten Season when we are encouraged to pare our lives back to the basics and look into the depths of our hearts with honesty - only then can we truly see our need for repentance and change.


STATIONS OF THE CROSS DURING LENT Three Stations of the Cross services are available: one based on the *Gospel of St Mark,* another *Mary's Stations*, and a video *Way of the Cross* with images of the Stations at Our Lady of Good Counsel Church in Deepdene carved by Austrian immigrant Leopoldine Mimovich.

HOLY ROSARY is recited every Thursday morning after 9.15am Mass.

THE SACRED PASCHAL TRIDUUM is one continuing liturgy over 3 days which marks the end of the forty days of Lent. It begins with the celebration of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday instituting the celebration of the Eucharist, continues through the Passion of the Lord on Good Friday, and culminates with the Easter Vigil and Easter Sunday celebrations of Christ's resurrection. The Fathers of the Second Vatican Council reminded us of the extraordinary significance of the Triduum: "Christ redeemed us all and gave perfect glory to God principally through his paschal mystery: dying he destroyed our death and rising he restored our life. Therefore, the Easter Triduum of the passion and resurrection of Christ is the culmination of the entire liturgical year." (General Norms for the Liturgical Year and the Calendar, # 18)

Lectionary Art and Reflection by Jenny Close For Jesus, his entry into Jerusalem was a triumph that had a seriously sinister side: this was the city in which he was both totally defeated and yet utterly triumphant. Jerusalem was a hub of trade and political intrigue. It was a sophisticated city and Herod's grand Temple was not only a religious and cultural symbol, it was also political. Its stones spoke of permanence, power and dignity. Even so, its destruction overshadowed it, just as the cross overshadowed Jesus. Watch for the temple motif recurring in the drawings for the Triduum.

Gospel Mk 11:1-10

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord.

When they drew near to Jerusalem, to Bethphage and Bethany, at the Mount of Olives,

Jesus sent two of his disciples, and said to them,

'Go into the village opposite you,

and immediately as you enter it

you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever sat; untie it and bring it.

Christ became obedient for us even to death dying on the cross.

Therefore God raised him on high and gave him a name above all other names. Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ, king of endless glory!

Gospel Mk 14:1-15:47

- N It was two days before the Passover and the feast of Unleavened Bread, and the chief priests and scribes were looking for a way to arrest Jesus by some trick and have him put to death. For they said,
- C It must not be during the festivities, or there will be a disturbance among the people.
- Jesus was at Bethany in the house of Simon the leper; he was at dinner when a woman came in with an alabaster jar of very costly ointment, pure nard. She broke the jar and poured the ointment on his head. Some who were there said to one another indignantly,
- C Why this waste of ointment? Ointment like this could have been sold for over three hundred denarii and the money given to the poor;
- N and they were angry with her. But Jesus said,
- Leave her alone. Why are you upsetting her? What she has done for me is one of the good works. You have the poor with you always and you can be kind to them whenever you wish, but you will not always have me. She has done what was in her power to do; she has anointed my body beforehand for its burial. I tell you solemnly, wherever throughout all the world the Good News is proclaimed, what she has done will be told also, in remembrance of her.
- N Judas Iscariot, one of the Twelve, approached the chief priests with an offer to hand Jesus over to them. They were delighted to hear it, and promised to give him money; and he looked for a way of betraying him when the opportunity should occur.
 - On the first day of Unleavened Bread, when the Passover lamb was sacrificed, his disciples said to him,
- C Where do you want us to go and make the preparations for you to eat the Passover?
- N So he sent two of his disciples, saying to them,

- J Go into the city and you will meet a man carrying a pitcher of water. Follow him, and say to the owner of the house which he enters, 'The Master says: Where is my dining room in which I can eat the Passover with my disciples?' He will show you a large upper room furnished with couches, all prepared. Make the preparations for us there.
- **N** The disciples set out and went to the city and found everything as he had told them, and prepared the Passover.
 - When evening came he arrived with the Twelve. And while they were at table eating, Jesus said,
- I tell you solemnly, one of you is about to betray me, one of you eating with me.
- N They were distressed and asked him, one after
- O Not I, surely?
- N He said to them,
- It is one of the Twelve, one who is dipping into the same dish with me. Yes, the Son of Man is going to his fate, as the scriptures say he will, but alas for that man by whom the Son of Man is betrayed! Better for that man if he had never been born!
- N And as they were eating he took some bread, and when he had said the blessing he broke it and gave it to them saying,
- Take it; this is my body.
- N Then he took a cup, and when he had returned thanks he gave it do them, and all drank from it, and he said to them,
- This is my blood, the blood of the covenant, which is to be poured out for many. I tell you solemnly. I shall not drink any more wine until the day I drink the new wine in the kingdom of God.
- \boldsymbol{N} After the psalms had been sung they left for the Mount of Olives. And Jesus said to them,
- You will all lose faith, for the scripture says, 'I shall strike the shepherd and the sheep will be scattered.' However after my resurrection I shall go before you to Galilee.
- N Peter said,
- O Even if all lose faith, I will not.
- N And Jesus said to him.
- I tell you solemnly, this day, this very night, before the cock crows twice, you will have disowned me three times.
- N But he repeated still more earnestly,
- **0** If I have to die with you, I will never disown you.
- N And they all said the same. They came to a small estate called Gethsemane. and Jesus said to his disciples,
- Stay here while I pray.
- Then he took Peter and James and John with him. And a sudden fear came over him, and great distress. And he said to them,
- My soul is sorrowful to the point of death. Wait here, and keep awake.
- N And going on a little further he threw himself on the ground and prayed that, if it were possible, this hour might pass him by. He said,
- Abba (Father)! Everything is possible for you. Take this cup away from me. But let it be as you, not I, would have it.
- N He came back and found them sleeping, and he said to Peter,
- Simon, are you asleep? Had you not the strength to keep awake for one hour? You should be awake, and praying not to be put to the test. The spirit is willing but the flesh is weak.
- N Again he went away and prayed, saying the same words. And once more he came back and found them sleeping, their eyes were so heavy; and they could find no answer for him. He came back a third time and said to them.
- You can sleep on now and take your rest. It is all over. The hour has come. Now the Son of Man is to be betraved into the hands of sinners. Get up! Let us go! My betrayer is close at hand already.
- Even while he was still speaking, Judas, one of the Twelve, came up with a number of men armed with swords and clubs, sent by the chief

priests and the scribes and the elders. Now the traitor had arranged a signal with them. He had said,

- **0** 'The one I kiss, he is the man. Take him in charge, and see he is well guarded when you lead him away.'
- ${\bf N}$ So when the traitor came, he went straight up to Jesus and said.
- O Rabbi!
- N and kissed him. The others seized him and took him in charge. Then one of the bystanders drew his sword and struck out at the high priest's servant, and cut off his ear.

Then Jesus spoke

- J Am I a brigand that you had to set out to capture me with swords and clubs? I was among you teaching in the Temple day after day and you never laid hands on me. But this is to fulfil the scriptures.
- N And they all deserted him and ran away. A young man who followed him had nothing on but a linen cloth. They caught hold of him, but he left the cloth in their hands and ran away naked.

They led Jesus off to the high priest; and all the chief priests and the elders and the scribes assembled there. Peter had followed him at a distance, right into the high priest's palace, and was sitting with the attendants warming himself at the fire.

The chief priests and the whole Sanhedrin were looking for evidence against Jesus on which they might pass the death sentence. But they could not find any. Several, indeed, brought false evidence against him, but their evidence was conflicting. Some stood up and submitted this false evidence against him,

- **C** We heard him say, 'I am going to destroy this Temple made by human hands, and in three days build another, not made by human hands.'
- **N** But even on this point their evidence was conflicting. The high priest then stood up before the whole assembly and put this question to Jesus,
- O Have you no answer to that? What is this evidence these men are bringing against you?

 N But he was silent and made no answer at all. The high
- **N** But he was silent and made no answer at all. The high priest put a second question to him,
- **O** Are you the Christ the Son of the Blessed One?
- N Jesus said,
- J I am, and you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of the Power and coming with the clouds of heaven.
- $\boldsymbol{N}\,$ The high priest tore his robes, and said,
- **0** What need of witnesses have we now? You heard the blasphemy. What is your finding?
- N And they all gave their verdict: he deserved to die. Some of them started spitting at him and, blindfolding him, began hitting him with their fists and shouting,
- **C** Play the prophet!
- N And the attendants rained blows on him.

While Peter was down below in the courtyard, one of the high-priest's servant-girls came up. She saw Peter warming himself there, stared at him and said,

- O You too were with Jesus, the man from Nazareth.
- N But he denied it, saying
- O I do not know, I do not understand what you are talking about.
- **N** And he went out into the forecourt. The servant-girl saw him and again started telling the bystanders,
- **0** This fellow is one of them.
- **N** But he again denied if. A little later the bystanders themselves said to Peter,
- C You are one of them for sure! Why, you are a Galilean.
- **N** But he started calling curses on himself and swearing,
- $\boldsymbol{0}\,$ I do not know the man you speak of.
- N At that moment the cock crew for the second time, and Peter recalled how Jesus had said to him, 'Before the cock crows twice, you will have disowned me three times.' And he burst into tears.

First thing in the morning, the chief priest together with the elders and scribes, in short the whole Sanhedrin, had their plan ready. They had Jesus bound and took him away and handed him over to Pilate.

Pilate questioned him,

- O Are you the king of the Jews?
- N He answered,
- J It is you who say it.
- **N** And the chief priests brought many accusations against him. Pilate questioned him again,
- O Have you no reply at all? See how many accusations they are bringing against you!
- **N** But to Pilate's amazement, Jesus made no further reply.

At festival time Pilate used to release a prisoner for them, anyone they asked for. Now a man called Barabbas was then in prison with the rioters who

- had committed murder during the uprising. When the crowds went up and began to ask Pilate the customary favour, Pilate answered them,
- O Do you want me to release for you the king of the Jews?
- **N** For he realised it was out of jealousy that the chief priests had handed Jesus over. The chief priests, however, had incited the crowd to demand that he should release Barabbas for them instead. Then Pilate spoke again.
- **0** But in that case, what am I to do with the man you call king of the Jews?
- N They shouted back.
- **C** Crucify him!
- N Pilate asked them,
- O Why? What harm has he done?
- N But they shouted all the louder,
- C Crucify him!
- **N** So Pilate, anxious to placate the crowd, released Barabbas for them and having ordered Jesus to be scourged, handed him over to be crucified.

The soldiers led him away to the inner part of the palace, that is, the Praetorium, and called the whole cohort together. They dressed him up in purple, twisted some thorns into a crown and put it on him. And they began saluting him,

- C Hail, king of the Jews!
- N They struck his head with a reed and spat on him; and they went down on their knees to do him homage. And when they had finished making fun of him, they took off the purple and dressed him in his own clothes.

They led him out to crucify him. They enlisted a passerby, Simon of Cyrene, father of Alexander and Rufus, who was coming in from the country, to carry his cross. They brought Jesus to the place called Golgotha, which means the place of the skull.

They offered him wine mixed with myrrh, but he refused it. Then they crucified him, and shared out his clothing, casting lots to decide what each should get. It was the third hour when they crucified him. The inscription giving the charge against him read: 'The king of the Jews.' And they crucified two robbers with him, one on his right and one on his left.

The passers-by jeered at him; they shook their hands and said

- C Aha! So you would destroy the Temple and rebuild it in three days! Then save yourself: come down from the cross!
- **N** The chief priests and the scribes mocked him among themselves in the same way. They said,
- C He saved others, he cannot save himself. Let the Christ, the king of Israel, come down from the cross now, for us to see it and believe.
- **N** Even those who were crucified with him taunted him. When the sixth hour came there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried out in a loud voice,
- J Eloi, Eloi, lama sabachthani?
- N This means, 'My God, my God, why have you deserted me?' When some of those who stood by heard this, they said,
- C Listen he is calling on Elijah.
- **N** Someone ran and soaked a sponge in vinegar and, putting it on a reed, gave it him to drink, saying,
- **0** Wait and see if Elijah will come to take him down.
- $\boldsymbol{N}\,$ But Jesus gave a loud cry and breathed his last.

All kneel and pause a moment.

And the veil of the Temple was torn in two from top to bottom. The centurion, who was standing in front of him, had seen how he died, and he said,

- O In truth this man was a son of God.
- N There were some women watching from a distance. Among them were Mary of Magdala, Mary who was the mother of James the younger, and Joset, and Salome. These used to follow him and look after him when he was in Galilee. And there were many other women there who had come up to Jerusalem with him.

It was now evening, and since it was Preparation day (that is the vigil of the Sabbath), there came Joseph of Arimathaea, a prominent member of the Council, who himself lived in hope of seeing the kingdom of God, and he boldly went to Pilate and asked for the body of Jesus. Pilate, astonished that he should have died so soon, summoned the centurion and enquired if he was already dead. Having been assured of this by the centurion, he granted the corpse to Joseph who brought a shroud, took Jesus down from the cross, wrapped him in the shroud and laid him in a tomb which had been hewn out of the rock. He then rolled a stone against the entrance of the tomb. Mary of Magdala and Mary the mother of Joset were watching and took note of where he was laid.

Jesus entered Jerusalem, not as a warrior in the tradition of King David as many had hoped for, but riding simply on a donkey. The disciples and the crowd applauded him, but they proved fickle in their support.

On the other hand, Jesus remained steadfast in his commitment to *non-violent* revolutionary change of the religious and political systems so as to establish the reign of God. Why did he renounce marshalling human and angelic warriors to further his cause?

First, Jesus embodied God-for-us, and God does not want the destruction of those he has created out of love. Second, Jesus had a premonition that an armed revolt would lead to the destruction of Jerusalem and the dispersal of the Jewish people (as occurred in 70AD).

Third, another Gospel (Luke) recounts that as Jesus laboured up Mount Calvary he turned to some wailing women and said, 'Daughters of Jerusalem, do not weep for me, weep rather for yourselves and for your children.' He knew that they suffer grievously in armed uprising. This is seen in barbaric reality in our own time with women being tortured and raped in campaigns of terror, trafficked into sexual slavery, suffering the loss of sons, husband and lovers.

We could take a moment to pray that the Church of the 21st century, successor of the pacifist Church of the first three centuries, may enter on a new period of reflection on these issues, grappling with the desire to protect the innocent, yet always challenged by the man on a donkey, Divine Prince of Peace.

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
