WHAT'S HAPPENING AT ST THOMAS

St Thomas the Apostle Parish Pastoral Council Establishment Team



For several months now a small team along with our three Priests have been exploring the foundation work to establish a Parish Pastoral Council, or PPC. The establishment team have discussed the role, function and composition of the PCC. Now, with this vital work done, we invite people from our St Thomas the Apostle community to consider putting their hand up themselves or recommending someone they consider having a lot to offer.

As we emerge from COVID restrictions and begin to interact face-to-face it is important to consider the fundamentals of what our community is about; people and relationships. This includes the responsibility of looking out for and engaging actively with the world around us in all that we do, where we live, work and play as well as the important issues that face our community, and communicating the love and values of Christ.

How can we rebuild or strengthen our community in a more unified approach? Angela McCarthy, Adjunct Senior Lecturer in Theology at Notre Dame University WA, reinforces this concept of 'the whole story around our parishes is about relationships, and so many of those relationships have broken down' and 'we must become missionary to each other, to restore all those relationships'.

It is really important for our school and school families to continue to maintain strong connections and seek to expand those relationships with the Parish and church and bring about more unity in what we do and how we can do things together.

This is important because this is our identity, our vision, needs and aspirations of St Thomas The Apostle community and the mutual benefit of everyone within our community.

Over the next few weeks we will be explaining more about the PPC, the role and functions and to answer any queries you may have.

Vaccination Status and 5.00pm Mass at St Mary's—As you will realise, the 5.00pm Mass at St Mary's is provided for people of unknown vaccination status. The provision of such a Mass is our pastoral response for those, who for various reasons have either not been vaccinated, or do not disclose their vaccination status. Although all are welcome to the 5.00pm Mass regardless of vaccination status, please remember that as we can only have 30 people at that Mass, we need to make sure that we have enough room there for people of unknown vaccination status. So, this notice is to encourage those of you, who have been doubly vaccinated, to come to one of our other Masses, instead.

In consideration for our people needing to go to 5.00pm Mass, which is set aside for people of unknown vaccination status – if you have booked into a Mass, especially the 5.00pm Mass, given that we can only have 30 people attend, if you change your mind – please cancel your booking. We had some people arrive who hadn't booked but because we kept spaces for people who booked and that took us to 30, we couldn't let these other people in. You can cancel your booking by going to the confirmation email that you received upon booking and following instructions.

This video is highly recommended. John Swinton is very easy to listen to and engaging.

Support Group for people experiencing anxiety during this COVID transition time Whilst, as a society, we navigate coming out of lockdown, anxiety seems heightened, for various reasons. Whether we are vaccinated or not, and for whatever reasons we make our choices, we are all human and we are all made in the dignity and likeness of God. At a time when there is a danger of judging, let us be a community of compassion. This is an invitation for anyone feeling anxious at the moment, to come along to a small support group in the parish. It isn't a therapy group. It's a support group. There will be some ground-rules, such as confidentiality and listening, but also no discussion about politics or conspiracy theories. Whilst some who are anxious hold certain beliefs about the vaccine, that others don't, this needs to be a space where we find compassion and care and support and respect – and perhaps a sense that we are not alone, and that all will be well. Dear People and Clergy of the Archdiocese,

Equal Opportunity (Religious Exceptions) Amendment Bill 2021

My prayerful greetings to you in the Lord.

It is with grave concern that I write to you about proposed new legislation, the *Equal Opportunity (Religious Exceptions) Amendment Bill 2021* from the State Government, which will impact on all faith-based organisations in Victoria.

The Victorian Government is depicting this Bill as merely a protection against discrimination in religious settings. Sadly, however, this is a seriously far-reaching law that will limit faith-based organisations from managing employment matters according to their faith, conscience and values. The legalisation is a serious overreach of the Government into the rightful freedoms of Victorian faith-based organisations.

Across all areas of society, Catholics run organisations with an open and inclusive commitment to people in their care. Our excellence in the provision of services is recognised by many – evident in the large numbers of students attending Catholic schools and educational institutions.

Currently, Catholic organisations, including our schools can freely employ those who share our religious beliefs, values and ethos. However, the Victorian Government has introduced legislation seeking to change this. If it passes, the *Equal Opportunity (Religious Exceptions) Amendment Bill 2021* will affect religious organisations all across Victoria, who will be limited in their ability to employ staff, run their schools and provide other services that adhere to their faith, values and ethos.

Under the new legislation, religious bodies and educational institutes will no longer be able to employ staff who hold the same religious beliefs and values unless they can prove that it is an 'inherent requirement' of the job. It would grant power to a government appointed commissioner or a court to ultimately determine whether particular staffing roles carried an 'inherent' religious requirement or not. This means that in places like schools, and especially where government funding is attached, employers will have an extra burden of administration placed on them, and leave them vulnerable to a decrease in the role and importance of faith in the work they do.

The example has been given that in a religious school, the only roles where religious beliefs might be an 'inherent requirement' of the job include positions of senior leadership (e.g., a principal) or religious education teachers. However, what the Government fails to understand is that faith is holistic – it affects the way we see the world and conduct our lives. Faith is part of the very make-up and fabric of each school. It is entirely reasonable and fair that religious bodies should be able to preference those who share their beliefs and values in their own private employment matters.

I do not believe it is in anyone's interest in the long term for a secular power to make such a determination for religious organisations. The role or importance of faith in a faith-based organisation cannot be relegated to a bureaucrat or a secular court. This is another sad example of people of faith and the freedom of religious organisations being unfairly targeted.

Other organisations like political parties will not have the same restrictions placed on them. In other words, the Government will impose on the staffing of faith organisations but not on the staffing of political organisations. We rightly ask, why the imbalance?

Unfortunately, we can expect the Bill to be debated in Parliament next week and the Government has given its full support to these proposals without adequate consultation in which we could have negotiated a fair and equitable outcome.

We live in a diverse and pluralistic society, and it is our democratic right and responsibility to respectfully challenge legislative proposals which are unfair and unreasonable. I encourage all people of faith and goodwill to stand up for religious freedom and ask our parliamentarians to oppose the Bill, particularly the introduction of an 'inherent requirement' test.

Attached you will find some suggestions on how to raise concerns about this important issue and I also encourage you to share this message widely.

Please continue to pray for a spirit of fairness to people of faith by our parliamentary representatives, and for good sense to prevail.

How to stand up for religious freedom

In light of the Equal Opportunity (Religious Exceptions) Amendment Bill 2021

1. Contact your local Members of Parliament in Victoria

Writing to Members of Parliament (MPs) is an effective way to communicate with them about this Bill. A short letter (emailed or mailed) respectfully expressing concerns with the legislation will help them understand what is important to people of faith.

Each Victorian has one MP representing their local **district** and six MPs who represent their wider **region**. If you're unsure who to write to, you can find out which district/region you are part of and the contact details of the MPs representing you here: www.parliament.vic.gov.au/about/electorates

2. Contact your federal Members of Parliament

Writing to federal Members of Parliament to tell them about what is happening here in Victoria is also vitally important, because religious freedom legislation is potentially being considered on a federal level. You can write to them to share your concern and ask them to act to protect the religious freedom of all Australians.

Each Victorian has one local MP representing their geographic **area** and twelve Senators who represent their **state**.

Although this is not the last Sunday of the liturgical year, the major theme found in the readings is the end of time. The events that will usher in and will take place during this time are described in apocalyptic terms. The struggles of life will culminate in a massive cosmic confrontation between the forces of good and those of evil. This last battle will be universal in scope, just like the first primordial conflict between chaos and God.

In some way, all of today's readings state that good will finally prevail over evil. In the last days Michael, the angelic warrior of God, will rise up. In the epistle, Christ is pictured seated triumphantly at the right hand of God with his enemies under his foot, a sign of conquest. Finally, in the gospel, the Son of Man, the mysterious figure from apocalyptic literature, comes in the clouds with great power and glory. All of these images are apocalyptic; each of them is quite hopeful.

We read these stories at the close of the liturgical year, because we are coming to the conclusion of our yearly telling of the story of salvation. However, apocalyptic images are timely whenever we find ourselves in the throes of the battle with evil and it appears that we will succumb. These forms will remind us that good will be able to withstand evil. From this we will conclude that we need only trust in God.

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
