She also received counselling, emotional support, and learnt sewing skills to help her earn an income.


Jamila now feels less alone, with a sense of community around her. She is able to 'Be More' to her little family. "Thank you, and thanks Caritas Australia," Jamila says.

LENTEN THEME 2021- 'God has come near'

The world has experienced a great upheaval because of the coronavirus which has shaken our sense of certainty and expectations of the future; all of our lives have been disrupted and changed; our livelihoods may have been adversely affected, our health and those we love may have been compromised; we may have suffered loss and grief, periods of time filled with fear, anxiety and uncertainty; we may have been challenged to find hope and peace in our lives. This theme reaches out of each of us, to remind us that God is always with us, offering us a way back from the wilderness into God's love and care and a way to live, through the teachings of Jesus in the Gospel. Let us embrace God and each other and allow the love and peace of God to fill our hearts.

Week 4 Beauty in Truth

In a world where truth has lost its virtue and is used and abused by many for their own ends, the value and beauty of truth cannot be overstated. In our daily lives we may live the truth of being a parent, son or daughter, relative, friend, work mate, support person, parishioner, activist, hobbyist and so on. Being truthful to ourselves and our moral code and to those around us provides a solid foundation for a good life. As Catholics we state our truth through the words of the Creed: we believe in the Holy Trinity; we believe

in Jesus as the Son of God who was born, died and was buried and rose again; we believe in the dignity of each person, made in the image of God; we believe in the Church as the body of Christ of which we are members. There is beauty in this truth which brings peace and contentment.

ACCOMMODATION SOUGHT: A lovely caring Christian woman and her daughter (aged 30) came to Australia from Cairo after the death of the husband/father, in January 2020. This was to be a time of healing for them. They were to stay with family for three months and then return, but COVID meant that they could not return. In order to be allowed to stay the daughter had to study so she could be on a student visa. So the daughter is studying and working 20 hours and the mother is working two half days a week in a \$2 shop. Wanting to have some independence, after relying on family for over 12 months, they are looking for some accommodation, a room, or two rooms, or a bungalow. They cannot afford to pay rent but would willingly contribute to the household by providing cleaning, ironing, cooking and driving people to appointments of shopping. The woman's sister and a friend are trying to assist them financially, including finding a car for them to use whilst here. Would you be interested in such an arrangement? The two women come with high recommendation as wonderful caring women, who would be very competent in whatever they provide for the household, as mentioned. Of course, this would need to be an arrangement where goodwill and generosity prevail from all involved. VICTORIA'S HOUSEHOLD ENERGY SAVING PACKAGE

The Victorian Government is investing \$797 million to help Victorians reduce cost of their power bills and make homes more energy efficient. This includes the biggest household energy efficiency package in any state's history in Australia, creating thousands of jobs, while also reducing greenhouse gas emissions. Announced in the Victorian Budget 2020/21

- \$335 million to deliver new high efficiency heating and cooling systems for low income households
- \$112 million for energy upgrades of social housing properties

 \$128 million for one-off \$250 Power Saving Bonus payments to help concession card holders with their bills.
The Victorian Energy Upgrades program is also being expanded so that all Victorian households can continue to access discounted energy efficient products and services that will help save money on bills, including for emerging energy saving technologies.
The government is also introducing minimum efficiency standards for rental properties, benefitting renters living in around The government is also introducing minimum efficiency standards for rental properties, benefitting renters living in around 350,000 homes, and working to establish 7-star efficiency standards for new homes.

This package will create jobs, lower energy bills, increase Victoria's renewable energy supply and improve the living standards of vulnerable households – ensuring that no Victorians are left behind in the state's energy transition.

Fourth Sunday of Lent, Year B

First Reading 2 Chr 36:14-16. 19-23

The wrath and the mercy of the Lord are revealed in the exile and liberation of his people.

All the heads of the priesthood, and the people too, added infidelity to infidelity, copying all the shameful practices of the nations and defiling the Temple that the Lord had consecrated for himself in Jerusalem. The Lord, the God of their ancestors, tirelessly sent them messenger after messenger, since he wished to spare his people and his house. But they ridiculed the messengers of God, they despised his words, they laughed at his prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against his people that there was no further remedy.

Their enemies burned down the Temple of God, demolished the walls of Jerusalem, set fire to all its palaces, and destroyed everything of value in it. The survivors were deported by Nebuchadnezzar to Babylon; they were to serve him and his sons until the kingdom of Persia came to power. This is how the word of the Lord was fulfilled that he spoke: through Jeremiah, 'Until this land has enjoyed its Sabbath rest, until seventy years have gone by, it will keep Sabbath throughout the days of its desolation.'

And in the first year of Cyrus king of Persia, to fulfil the word of the Lord that was spoken through Jeremiah, the Lord roused the spirit of Cyrus king of Persia to issue a proclamation and to have it publicly displayed throughout his kingdom: 'Thus speaks Cyrus king of Persia, "The Lord, the God of heaven, has given me all the kingdoms of the earth: he has ordered me to build him a Temple in Jerusalem, in Judah. Whoever there is among you of all his people, may his God be with him! Let him go up."

When we were dead through sins, he brought us to life.

God loved us with so much love that he was generous with his mercy: when we were dead through our sins, he brought us to life with Christ - it is through grace that you have been saved and raised us up with him and gave us a place with him in heaven, in Christ Jesus.

This was to show for all ages to come, through his goodness towards us in Christ Jesus, how infinitely rich he is in grace. Because it is by grace that you have been saved, through faith; not by anything of your own, but by a gift from God; not by anything that you have done, so that nobody can claim the credit. We are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus to live the good life as from the beginning he had meant us to live it.

Reflection by Fr Michael Tate

How does God picture us? St Paul reveals one of God's favourite ways of regarding us.

'We are God's work of art, created in Christ Jesus, to live the good life as from the beginning He had intended us to live it.'

Just as an artist respects the medium he or she is working in, whether it be oils or crayon, so too God respects us as human beings with free will. Which is why His works of art don't always look the way He intended!

Now, if one has a work of art in the house, a picture or print that means a lot to you, or perhaps the first sketch by a child, do you put it in the darkest corner of the room? Or do you allow just enough light to fall on it so as to reveal how terrific it is, why it gives you pleasure? Of course, the latter.

Now, if you and I are God's work of art, God wants exactly the same. He wants us to be revealed in the light. What sort of light? Christ our Light.

Of course, it might be necessary for the Light to dispel some darkness, some shadow dimension of our lives. In this regard Christ is a healing Light, but this is so that he might illuminate us in a way which more clearly reveals the love which the Divine Artist has for His creation.

We might take a moment to pray for the courage to expose ourselves to Christ's healing light this Lent to be more beautifully illuminated at Easter.
