FIRST READING

A reading from the book of Wisdom What man can know the intentions of God? Who can divine the will of the Lord? The reasonings of mortals are unsure and our intentions unstable; for a perishable body presses down the soul, and this tent of clay weighs down the teeming mind. It is hard enough for us to work out what is on earth, laborious to know what lies within our reach; who, then, can discover what is in the heavens? As for your intention, who could have learnt it, had you not granted Wisdom and sent your holy spirit from above? Thus have the paths of those on earth been straightened and men been taught what pleases you, and saved, by Wisdom. The word of the Lord.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter of St Paul to Philemon 9-10.12-17 This is Paul writing, an old man now and, what is more, still a prisoner of Christ Jesus. I am appealing to you for a child of mine, whose father I became while

wearing these chains: I mean Onesimus. I am sending him back to you, and with him - I could say - a part of my own self. I should have liked to keep him with me; he could have been a substitute for you, to help me while I am in the chains that the Good News has brought me. However, I did not want to do anything without your consent; it would have been forcing your act of kindness, which should be spontaneous. I know you have been deprived of Onesimus for a time, but it was only so that you could have him back for ever, not as a slave any more, but something much better than a slave, a dear brother; especially dear to me, but how much more to you, as a blood-brother as well as a brother in the Lord. So if all that we have in common means anything to you, welcome him as you would me. *The word of the Lord*.

GOSPEL

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

14:25-33

Great crowds accompanied Jesus on his way and he turned and spoke to them. 'If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes, and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross and come after me cannot be my disciple.

'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.' *The Gospel of the Lord*.

Freedom....In many ways we are not free. We are all encased in perishable bodies; some are restricted by social and political boundaries; others entangled by possessiveness of things and people. Jesus shows us the way to escape this slavery and to be free, but his way is not cheap. It will be demanding and costly, yet its benefits in terms of life-enhancement are supreme.

Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows For Catholics, September is the month of Our Lady of Sorrows, immediately following August's devotion to the Immaculate Heart, and preceding October's devotion to Our Lady of the Rosary, September is an ideal time to strengthen our connection to Our Lady. Don't run from the sorrows of others....Really listen (when someone wants to talk about a worry, a grief, a pain, or a loneliness and offer time and empathy.

Put empathy into action... Offer to help ease the suffering of another, carrying their cross for a bit, like Simon of Cyrene. Drive a friend to the doctor, visit or telephone and spend some time with someone who is lonely or suffering.

Pray daily for someone who is suffering and let them know... "for the eyes of the Lord are on the righteous and his ears are attentive to their prayer" (1 Peter 3:12)
