The Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross celebrates two historical events: the discovery of the True Cross by Saint Helena, the mother of the Emperor Constantine, in 320 under the temple of Venus in Jerusalem, and the dedication in 335 of the basilica and shrine built on Calvary

by Constantine, which mark the site of the Crucifixion.

The basilica, named the Martyrium, and the shrine, named the Calvarium, were destroyed by the Persians in 614. The Church of the Holy sepulchre which now stands on the site was built by the crusaders in 1149.

The cross is today the universal image of Christian belief. It's easy to understand that the Cross is special because Christ used it as the instrument of our salvation. For Christians, it is a celebration and commemoration of God's greatest work: his salvific death on the Cross and His Resurrection, through which death was defeated and the doors to Heaven opened.

Christianity without the Cross is meaningless: Christ said: "If any man will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow me" (Luke 9:23). Only by uniting ourselves to Christ's Sacrifice on the Cross can we enter into eternal life.



MEMORIAL OF OUR LADY OF SORROWS 15 SEPTEMBER

Devotion to the Seven Sorrows of Our Lady has its roots in Sacred Scripture and in Christian piety, which always associates the Blessed Mother with her suffering Son . The title, Our Lady of Sorrows, focuses on our Blessed Mother's intense suffering and grief during the passion and death of our Lord. Traditionally, this suffering was not limited to the passion and death event; rather, it comprised the seven dolors or seven sorrows of Mary. As Mary stood at the foot of the Cross on which Jesus hung, the sword of

sorrow, which the priest Simeon had foretold, pierced her soul. For this reason, Mary is sometimes depicted with her heart exposed and with seven swords piercing it. Below are the seven sorrows of Mary:

- 1. The prophecy of Simeon (*Luke 2:25-35*)
- 2. The flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13-15)
- 3. Loss of the Child Jesus for three days (Luke 2:41-50)
- 4. Mary meets Jesus on his way to Calvary (Luke 23:27-31; John 19:17)
- 5. Crucifixion and Death of Jesus (John 19:25-30)
- 6. The body of Jesus being taken from the Cross (Psalm 130; Luke 23:50-54; John 19:31-37)
- 7. The burial of Jesus (Isaiah 53:8; Luke 23:50-56; John 19:38-42; Mark 15:40-47)

Focusing on the compassion of our Blessed Mother, our Holy Father, Pope John Paul II, reminded the faithful: ...Mary Most Holy goes on being the loving consoler of those touched by the many physical and moral sorrows which afflict and torment humanity. She knows our sorrows and our pains, because she too suffered, from Bethlehem to Calvary. 'And thy soul too a sword shall pierce.' Mary is our Spiritual Mother, and the mother always understands her children and consoles them in their troubles... REFLECTION... Unless we forgive, we shall not be forgiven.

The theme for this week's readings is forgiveness, urging us to forgive others just as God forgives us.

In his homily at the Holy Mass at the Casa Santa Marta on September 2015, Pope Francis said....

..This is the right path: Forgive one another! As the Lord has forgiven you, so should you do! Forgive one another! And some good advice for forgiving each other: forbear one another at home, in your neighbourhood, at work.... Bear with each other, without resorting to whispering: "He did that...". It's important to forbear, because he too bears with me". In short, it takes Christian patience.

This, then, is the Christian way: it is not arrogance, it is not condemnation, it is not speaking ill of others. The Christian way is compassion, kindness, lowliness, meekness, and patience. Ultimately, it is the way of Jesus, the way by which Jesus made peace and reconciliation, until the end. Indeed, at the end, in the final yearnings of life, he managed to hear something that the thief said: 'Yes, yes, yes, come with me, dear one, come to Paradise'.

Let us ask the Lord to give each of us the grace to forbear others, to forgive, to be merciful, as the Lord is merciful with us; and to have this Christian way of compassion, kindness, lowliness, meekness, and patience.
