Most of us don't understand the workings in the motor of a car. But we believe in the person who sells us the car or the reliable mechanic who repairs the motor.

We don't understand Einstein's Theory of Relativity. But, together with thousands of people, we believe in it and use it in countless ways.

We believe that God is perfect and without limitations, and because of this, we are not surprised that many things concerning God are beyond the understanding of our limited intellects. Our finite and limited minds cannot fully grasp the infinite and unlimited God. There was once a man who said, "I don't have anything to do with things I don't understand. "His friend asked him to explain how a black and white cow, eating green grass, could make white milk and cream which could be turned into yellow butter. The man couldn't give a reply. "Well then, "his friend said, "you had better not put butter on your morning toast, since you don't understand how a black and white cow could produce yellow butter."

In today's gospel (John 20:19-31), Jesus says to doubting Thomas, "Blest are they who have not seen and have believed."

Are there things that we don't understand about God and about his ways? Plenty. We shouldn't be surprised that no limited human man can fully understand the unlimited God.

A REFLECTION
2nd Sunday of Easter -YEAR B
15th – 16th April 2023



We so recently reflected that the Gospels of the Lenten Season took us on a Listening Journey, being invited to listen in on a series of conversations of Jesus with various women & men, to consider (& apply) their own experience of conversion. These Sundays of Easter take us on a similar Journey, though now beyond the Empty Tomb, inviting us to experience (& again apply!) Jesus' encounters with groups of apostles & disciples & truth seekers; variously incredulous, hesitant, doubting, grieving, overwhelmed, ecstatic. "He is risen, as he said! Alleluia!! Alleluia!!"

Would you, can you, believe it? Yet these stories are accounts of those who did, men & women confronted, greeted, healed, assured, challenged, inspired, by their personal or communal encounter with Jesus whom they now proclaim as the Christ – Risen & Anointed Saviour - who was & is now forever their Friend, Brother, Saviour. "He is risen indeed! Alleluia!" And each telling of the story asks me, "Who do you say that I am?" Jesus' greetings & assurances are, "Peace", "My peace I give you", "I am with you always", "You are my witnesses", "Go out & teach the Good News I have given you" "I will send My Spirit", "Some will hate you and revile you....but do not ask how or what you should say, for it is the Spirit of your Father who will speak in you".

The accounts we hear these Sundays come from the Gospels – Good News – attributed to John, Luke, Matthew, Mark, from the Acts of the Apostles (again Luke), & from the First Letter ascribed to John and Paul's to the Ephesians. These are historical reports from the different communities of Believers, telling what they witnessed in previous decades and that they wanted to pass on "to the ends of the earth": The conclusion of John's states, "There are many other signs that Jesus worked & the disciples saw, .but. not recorded in this book. These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, & that believing you may have life through his name."

This Sunday we hear especially from Thomas: "Unless I see the wounds and put my fingers in, I will not believe!" Was he miffed or feeling hoodwinked – or was it just too hard, too much hurt, as it seemed with the disciples on the road to Emmaus? Truly – practically – unbelievable!?! Thomas, whose nickname was "the Twin", went down in history as "Doubting Thomas", but I would suggest should be better named, "Believing Thomas". A Jewish proverb holds that "Doubt is the Mother of Truth" & for Thomas, doubt became a privilege, an invitation leading to deeper embrace with a blinding moment of faith realized:" My Lord & my God". And through him, our promise & assurance; "You believe because you can see me, Happy are those who do not see me & yet believe."

Which sounds very much like us, you & me. The messianic proclamation had moved from "Come & See" in the public years to "See & Touch" in affirming the Risen Lord. It affirms the Father's faithfulness to the Covenant of Mercy; the Son's fidelity to his mission of oneness with Humankind; the Holy Spirit's abiding faithfulness to being present in each of us and our community called Church. To our faithfulness in daily loving, openness & service – "Love one another as I have loved you...by this will all know you are my disciples." Thomas recognized Jesus as the Christ in the Wounds of Christ. Can I know, believe & strive to recognize that I serve Jesus the Christ in the wounds & wounded-ness of myself, of my life & of my world. And there are so many wounds awaiting the embrace of Christ, through me. And in that embrace, I am healed.
