The Ready, Set, Pray! Children's Liturgy of the Word @ Home video series has been created to provide an



engaging space for families to encounter Jesus through the Sunday gospel.

Each week includes an invitation for families to gather in their own prayer space, to sing, hear the Gospel, pray and respond creatively through an activity.

This weekly resource follows the familiar Children's Liturgy of the Word format provided in many parishes – but moved to an online setting. It can

be used by families in their homes, and also by teachers and catechists.

The series consists of 10 weekly sessions of 15-20 minutes duration, which commenced from Sunday 18th October and continues each Sunday until Christmas. We hope this experience of gathering for prayer will encourage families in this time when they cannot gather for parish celebrations of Eucharist. It is produced by Proclaim: The Office for Mission Renewal at the Archdiocese of Melbourne.

• Faith communities:

Outdoor religious ceremonies permitted up to 20 people, in addition to those required for the service.

Indoor religious ceremonies can be held with up to 10. There has been no indication that the faith leader is additional here and we need to get confirmation on this.

(Note: Indoor and Outdoor services are not to be held concurrently, it is an either or, or alternating, for example).

- Weddings permitted up to ten people outdoors.
- **Funerals** permitted up to 20 mourners. This limit doesn't include babies under 12 months of age, or the people required to conduct the funeral.

REGIONAL VICTORIA:

As of 11.59pm, Tuesday 27 October

• Faith communities:

Outdoor religious ceremonies can be held near a place of worship with up to 50 people plus a faith leader, in addition to those required for the service.

Indoor religious ceremonies can be held with up to 10 people per group (plus a faith leader), and maximum 20 people per facility

(Note: Indoor and Outdoor services are not to be held concurrently, it is an either or, or alternating, for example).

- **Private worship** is also allowed for a household and up to two other people plus a faith leader.
- **Weddings** permitted up to 10 people. This limit includes the couple and two witnesses. The celebrant is in addition to this number.
- **Funerals** permitted up to 50 people if held outdoors. This limit doesn't include babies under 12 months of age, or the people required to conduct the funeral. If held indoors, the limit remains at 20 mourners plus those required for the service.

FR JOSEPH HOMILY Feast Day of All Saints, Year A, 2020

Are saints not all-holy and without human defects? With all our weaknesses, failures, sins, and shortcomings, becoming saints seems impossible for us. Saints are not made of wax and plaster, but are mortal like us.

Saints are not born with a halo. Saint Peter was a coward when he denied the Lord; Saint Paul persecuted the Church; Saint Augustine was a playboy who seemingly mocked heaven when he called his illegitimate son Adeodatus (Given by God); Saint Therese of the Child Jesus was a very stubborn kid. And so the list goes on.

What then made them saints? Their struggle! When they sinned, they went to confession, seriously determined not to commit the same sin again. When they fell, they stood up without giving up. Like those known saints, we cannot avoid struggling and, like them, conquering our weaknesses in the end. "For every fall, God leaves us glimpses or signs of hope." That is good news for us.

St Paul wrote, "God wants everybody to become holy." God desires everybody to go to Heaven. Those people who have become saints because of the grace of God were open to this grace and to making positive changes in themselves. That is what we are told by Jesus.

Change of Heart, what does it mean?

Changing our attitude, our pride, our self-righteousness, our stubbornness, and our biases and so on. Seeing the enemy within. Ask ourselves: Do I recognise my faults when I have problems with others? Or do I always blame others when I have problems with them. Am I too blinded or too defensive of myself or my children or grandchildren? Does my faith in God only dwell on the practice of superficial piety or it does lead me to self-reflection and a change of heart.

Today, we honour all those unknown saints who were never canonised (recognised by the church officially) but reached the joys of heaven. They never gave up in their struggle but tried to live out Christ's values in daily life. May November 1 also become your feast day and mine!



THE HISTORY OF ALL SAINTS' AND ALL SOULS' DAY

Christians have been honouring their virtuous dead from the earliest days of the religion. In traditional Roman Catholicism, exceedingly virtuous men and women may be canonised as saints in the afterlife. Since they are endowed with holiness, saints are close to God, and may perform miracles on earth. Roman Catholics, and some other Christians, honour saints and ask them for guidance in daily life. -Catholics commemorate many saints on their own "saints day," often the anniversary of their death. But with thousands of canonized saints, only a small percentage are recognized regularly. In the seventh century, Pope Boniface IV officially established All Saints' Day in order to honour all the saints at one time. History records such a sacred day before Boniface's time, but it wasn't widely observed.

Originally, Christians observed All Saints' Day on May 13. But in the eighth century, Pope Gregory III moved it to November 1. Officially, the Church chose this new date to mark the papal dedication of a church honouring the saints. But many historians believe the Church really moved the observance to correspond with Samhain and other pagan fall festivals.

The Catholic Church had a long-standing policy of incorporating non-Christian traditions into its holidays in order to bring people into the Catholic faith. This included moving the dates of Christian holidays to those of established non-Christian occasions. Many historians believe, for example, that the church set Christmas on December 25 so that it would correspond with pagan winter solstice festivals.

In any case, when All Saints' Day moved to November 1, the church did begin to incorporate Samhain traditions into the holy day's activities. This helped bring descendants of the ancient Celts into Christianity, but it posed some problems for the church. Much of the Samhain traditions centered on the supernatural and spirit world, ideas that don't have much of a place in Christianity.

Despite some unease in the church, many supernatural ideas persisted in All Saints' Day Eve celebrations, making the occasion a remarkable combination of Christian and pagan beliefs. At the end of the 10th century, the church tried to give these traditions a little more direction by establishing **All Souls' Day**, an occasion to recognise all Christian dead.
