The Wedding Banquet

The parable of the Wedding Banquet that makes up the Gospel, Matthew 22:1-14, is the Matthean version of a parable that appears in rather different forms in the early tradition (cf. Luke 14:15-24). Matthew has made the parable a kind of allegory of salvation history.

Brendan Byrne SJ explains that the parable in the following way:

The fullness of salvation, the bridegroom the Son of God (Jesus). The servants sent one after the other to issue invitations represent, first, the prophets sent to Israel in the Old Testament era, then Christian missionaries. These go out first to Israel once more. When again Israel fails to respond, they are told to invite those 'on the crossroads' – the Gentiles. The final scene where the king notices a guest not wearing a wedding garment and orders him to be cast out, brings the allegory to a close. It evokes the last judgment, when the mixture of good and bad in the Christian community will be sorted out.

In light of the inclusive kingdom metaphor in this parable, the final portion may be a bit troubling to readers. When a guest is not wearing a wedding garment he is cast out of the banquet. We might say that being invited at the last minute the guest was unable to find suitable clothing. It is a sign that although he has been an unlikely inclusion in the banquet, he has not made any effort to respond to the generosity of the king and take up one of the cloaks that would have been provided and thus give due honour to his host. This is symbolic of those who refuse to change their ways and do not live as followers of Jesus even when they have been included in the kingdom.

FR JOSEPH HOMILY

28th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year A, 2018

Once upon a time there was a man who was terribly disturbed by his neighbours who were gypsylike, whirling dervishes. They were forever singing and dancing wildly. He had another neighbour who did not seem to be bothered by the whirling dervishes at all.

When he asked this neighbour how he could remain so calm, the neighbour simply replied, "Oh, I just let them whirl." The neighbour did not try to adjust the environment to himself.

Rather, he adjusted himself to the environment which could not be changed.

There was another man who was terribly bothered every night by dreams of a twelve-foot dragon with three heads. He went to a psychiatrist, seeking help. The psychiatrist said that he could help the man but warned him that it might take a year and it might cost him three thousand dollars. "Three thousand dollars?" the man gasped, "Thanks, but I will just go home and make friends with the dragon." Here was another man who realized that he had to make friends with a reality which he could not change.

In today's Second Reading (Philippians 4:12-20), St Paul says to us, "I have learned how to cope with every circumstance."

St Paul is not suggesting to us a kind of stoic acceptance. He is telling us that he sees God's providence in every situation in which he has placed us and St Paul sees God's invitation for us to grow in Christ through every experience given to us. In other words, we need to make friends with reality.

Since the beginning of the Second Lockdown, I have been watching some programs and the hosts of these online video programs are some of the Chinese political dissidents who were jailed for many years because of their advocacy for freedom and their fight against the injustice and oppression by the Communist Party of China. Their brave and heroic acts have been so inspirational. At times, it has made me so sad for their tremendous suffering for the sake of justice and fairness for the oppressed people in China. Many of these dissidents have left or escaped from China and are now living in the USA and have become Christians or Catholics. We as Catholics can learn so much from them for their courage and dedication to justice and peace and how they risked their own life even in the face of imprisonment in their fight against oppression and injustice. They are my heroes and our heroes and they teach us how lucky we are to be living in a free country. Let us remember people like these Chinese political dissidents in our prayers and all those political dissidents who are still in jail in China and in various parts of the world.
