Our Lord Jesus Christ King of the Universe

Reflection

Matthew 25:31-46

Jesus teaches that when the Son of Man comes in glory, he will judge the nations, separating the sheep from the goats.

In today's Gospel, Jesus teaches us that we will be judged on only one thing: the acts of mercy we have shown to the least among us. Jesus identifies with the least ones; thus we serve Jesus whenever we serve one of the least ones. The Church calls the actions that Jesus described in today's Gospel the Corporal Works of Mercy. These works are to feed the hungry, to clothe the naked, to bury the dead, to shelter the homeless, to visit the sick and imprisoned, and to give alms to the poor. In these actions we show God's compassion and mercy to those in need.

Why does Jesus say we ought to do these works of mercy? Because whenever we show mercy to another person, we show mercy to Jesus himself.

When we read today's Gospel in the context of the chapters that follow in Matthew's Gospel, we learn the extent to which Jesus identifies with the least ones. In accepting death on the cross, Jesus shows himself to be one of the hungry, the naked, the ill, and the imprisoned. To accept Jesus is to accept him who suffered and died on the Cross as one of the least ones.

Masses

We will require our parishioners to be flexible to ensure that we do not breach the guidelines for outdoor religious worshipping.

Masses will be held at the Undercroft at SPJE School with access via the school carpark in Reay Road. You can enter the carpark and veer left towards the basketball courts. There will be a person there to direct you to car spaces. **Strictly no parking is allowed on any of the soft court surfaces.**

A COVID Safe Plan will be displayed at all Masses and attendees are required to adhere to this plan. **MASKS MUST BE WORN AT ALL TIMES** and sanitising stations will be set up with recording of contact details for tracing purposes, if required.

With regards to the distribution of Holy Eucharist, The Archbishop asks that Holy Eucharist is received by hand only (and not directly on the tongue), as a precautionary step to protect against COVID-19. This is not done lightly, because in normal circumstances the Church in Australia does not limit reception of the Sacrament to one way or another. This is not a permanent situation and will be reviewed at each significant change in the Victorian Roadmap. The Archbishop will lift this requirement at the earliest opportunity. We trust that you will understand and adhere to this guideline.

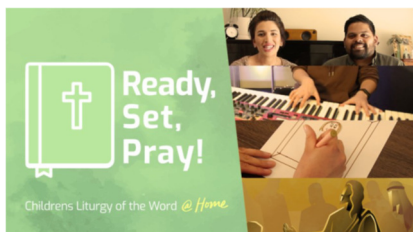

The **Ready, Set, Pray!** Children's Liturgy of the Word @ Home video series has been created to provide an engaging space for families to encounter Jesus through the Sunday gospel.



Each week includes an invitation for families to gather in their own prayer space, to sing, hear the Gospel, pray and respond creatively through an activity.

This weekly resource follows the familiar Children's Liturgy of the Word format provided in many parishes – but moved to an online setting. It can be used by families in their homes, and also by teachers and catechists.

The series consists of 10 weekly sessions of 15-20 minutes duration, which commenced from Sunday 18th October and continues each Sunday until

AFFECTS ON OUR COMMUNITIES FROM COVID – THE FUTURE OF THE CHURCH

In times of crisis and social and economic disruption, people tend to reflect more deeply on what really matters. Half of Australians say they have thought more about the meaning of life and their own mortality this year. This deepening of the inner life has seen an increase in spiritual and faith activities, with one in four Australians saying they have engaged in more spiritual conversations and 28% reporting they have been praying more.

Here's a quick snapshot -

Australians are disillusioned with the Church but are spiritually hungry - Christian leaders feel Australians have become disillusioned with the church as an institution. They point to public breaches of trust from church leadership and church culture often being detached from the everyday Australian experience as key causes of this disillusionment and apathy.

The Church needs to engage the community - While Australia is full of churches large and small, leaders believe the size of a church is of less importance than whether a church is seeking to truly understand and engage their own local community and bring a unique contribution to their neighbourhood.

The Church needs to embrace digital disruption - Just as Australians have shifted to virtual meetings for business and social occasions, churches too have been forced to adapt to new digital technologies. Many have been using platforms like Zoom and livestreams for their services to operate 'church online', and this has presented opportunities to engage new audiences such as those who may not be comfortable entering a physical church building, or those in new geographic areas who can now engage in a digital form of community. Much like the future of office space and large public events, there is broad recognition that the Church of the future will be hybrid, combining a physical gathering with digital platforms to engage as many people as possible.

The Church may be seeing a 'new reformation' moment - The Protestant Reformation in the 16th Century was enabled by the invention of the printing press, putting scripture into the hands of church members for the first time. Church leaders now sense we are seeing a similar 'reformation' moment, with COVID-19 acting as a catalyst for people taking more responsibility for things like evangelisation and community-building.

The Church is raising up diverse leaders - Church leaders agree there is work to do in improving diversity among church leadership. As Australia becomes increasingly diverse, the Church needs to reflect the diversity of age, gender and culture in the community it seeks to serve. Females and indigenous people are specific groups that are currently under-represented in Church leadership, and we've seen efforts over the last few years to ensure that role models exist to inspire new generations that there is a place for them in the Church. The Church is in a unique position to meet the spiritual and social needs of Australians, providing community and purpose in a context of increasing social isolation. An effective Church of the future will be one united in vision, authentic in approach and adaptable to change.

Fr Joseph's Homily

Thirty-Fourth Sunday (Christ the King) Year A, 2020

In the year 337, Martin of Tours was a Roman soldier. One cold winter day a beggar asked him for alms. Martin of Tours had no money but he took off his worn soldier's cloak. He cut it in half and he gave half of his cloak to the beggar.

That night Martin had a dream and he saw Jesus wearing half of a Roman soldier's cloak. In the dream, one of the angels said to Jesus. :”Master, why are you wearing that worn-out thing? Who gave it to you?” “My friend Martin gave it to me,” said Jesus.

After this experience, Martin of Tours became a Christian and a saint. Is this story true?

We can't be sure, but we are sure of Jesus's words in today's gospel (Matthew 25:31-46), “Whatsoever you do to the least of my brothers or sisters, you do unto me.”

Mother Teresa of Calcutta founded her flourishing congregation on these words. She didn't require that applicants to her congregation had a college degree because you do not need a college degree to understand these words of Jesus. But you do need a strong faith. And plenty of it, to believe that in bathing the diseased you are bathing Jesus, that in watching over the dying in their last moments you are watching over Jesus, and in ministering to someone frightened and resentful, you are ministering to Jesus. In the past 4 month's strict lockdown, there have been some parishioners who have shown great kindness and generosity to the parish and me. They have been Jesus to the parish and me.

I am extremely grateful for that and I have been so touched by their kindness and charity.

They are the grace of God to this parish and me.

Thank you all for your ongoing support of the Mooroolbark Conference of St. Vincent de Paul, your generosity helps us to continue our very important work of helping those in need.

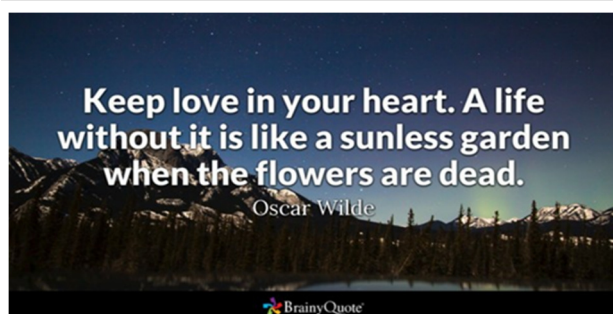
