"Then Peter said, 'It is wonderful for us to be here – Let us make three tents.....' Then a cloud came... and they heard a voice from the cloud...'This is my Son, the Beloved, listen to Him'". Then when they looked round.... they saw only Jesus".

How often have you thought or heard others say, "If only we could see Jesus, hear his voice, speak with him"? Well - Peter, James & John heard, saw & spoke - but did they readily learn and trust? No way, they had a long way to go; this was another teaching time,

"You are my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased' (Mark 1.11) - Jesus' commission & call to mission. It is now repeated as commission & call to mission to those whom Jesus has invited to follow him, "This is my Son, the Beloved, listen to him". But it was to be a long, long slow learning for them – as, so often, for us. We recall Jesus rebuking Peter, "Get behind me, Satan..."

even in the verse following Peter's affirmation "You are the Messiah". Then his later fear-filled denials, "I do not know the man"; "when the rooster crows twice, you will have betrayed me thrice". We remember the unnamed disciples walking *away* from Jerusalem, the climactic end-point of Jesus' long missionary

journey marked by teachings, healings & promises & charism of care & appeal for the people; as well as enmity, suspicion and political plotting, the place, above all, of Jesus' arrest, trial and execution. And his Rising; '...oh, how foolish you are...& so slow to believe".

Does that sound very or any different to us in our discipleship, our witnessing & learning? our following & doing - whether individually or as a community of disciples called Parish? We're still believers & followers mostly struggling to get our individual & communal act together. And also often blocked by fear or embarrassment; of wanting to be accepted; or not thought of as out of step or totally weird. Or even puzzling if it is all worthwhile. No different to Peter, James & John.

But so to our Lenten journey, our chance & challenge to get our Good News act together; to again speak to & for those of our society who are on the margins & advocate for their right to a full life: to represent those whom politicians treat as not worthy of just recognition & adequate care: to support & speak out for families in distress or suffering violence & marginalization: for children whose growth into the world is being distorted by skewed representations of relationship & sexuality, along with dangerous expectations and loss of personal respect & integrity.

This is some of what it means to be Good News in our time & place; pandemic & all. Yet we keep falling down...right!? Right!! But while the Gospel story reports the falling down, it focuses on the Rising, our getting up again. Each time. With Jesus & the disciples who get up again. And again. That is Good News.

Thank you Michael McLindon, parishioner, another ever-struggling & ever rejoicing disciple.

Second Sunday of Lent

Our Week 2 story this year, focuses on Margret, a 39 year old teacher at a vocational school for deaf students in the Solomon Islands. Last year, Margret's school faced a triple threat – no access to clean water, devastation from Tropical Cyclone Harold and the Covid-19 pandemic. With Caritas's support, Margret's school and community now has access to water tanks on-site and has received much needed assistance to rebuild after the cyclone. Pope Francis: 'Pass on the fire of Jesus' merciful love'

Pope Francis says we are called to pass on "the fire of Jesus' mercy", in a letter marking the 90th anniversary of the first apparition to St Maria Faustina Kowalska in Płock, Poland.

Pope Francis has written a letter to the Bishop and Church of Płock, Poland, on the occasion of the 90th anniversary of the first apparition of the Merciful Jesus to St Maria Faustina Kowalska, a Polish nun. The apparitions to St Faustina formed the basis of the Divine Mercy devotion.

In his letter, Pope Francis recalls the words heard by St Faustina on 22 February 1931: "Paint a picture according to the pattern you see, with the caption: Jesus, I trust in You. I desire that this image be venerated first in your chapel and then throughout the world." The image of the Divine Mercy has subsequently spread around the globe.

"I share the joy of the Church of Płock that this special event is already known throughout the world and remains alive in the hearts of the faithful," Pope Francis writes

"Ask Jesus for the gift of mercy"

The Holy Father encourages the faithful to "ask Christ for the gift of mercy," to allow Christ's mercy "to embrace us and penetrate us," to have "the courage to return to Jesus, to encounter His love and mercy in the Sacraments," and to "feel His closeness and tenderness," so that we "might be more capable of mercy, patience, forgiveness, and love."

He notes that his predecessor, St John Paul II, whom he calls "the Apostle of Mercy," "wanted the message of God's merciful love to reach everyone in the world."

In 2002, during a <u>visit to the Divine Mercy Shrine</u> in Krakow, the Polish Pope said, "This fire of mercy needs to be passed on to the world. In the mercy of God the world will find peace and mankind will find happiness!"

Pope Francis in his turn insists, "This is a special challenge for the Church of Płock, marked by this revelation"; for Sister Faustina's community, the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy; for the city of Płock, "and for each one of you."

"Pass on the fire of Jesus' merciful love," Pope Francis writes in conclusion. "Be for everyone a sign of His presence among you."
