FIFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME YEAR B In Service of Others

Today's Gospel (Mark 1:29-39) Jesus continues his inaugural day of ministry. He leaves the synagogue, goes to Simon Peter's house and cures Simon's mother-in-law, who is ill with a fever (vv. 29-31). before relaunching his mission on a wider scale (vv. 35-39).

Jesus' first healing is actually a rather modest one by nature. Simon's mother-in-law is in bed with a fever, a more threatening condition in those days but not necessarily something out of the ordinary. Jesus has just called the four to become 'fishers of people' (1:16-20) and having responded to his call has meant the new disciples have left both their livelihood and families behind. However these disciples quickly learn that following Jesus has its advantages. They are going to gain something as well – be drawn into the sphere of new life and healing associated with the new 'family of God'.

The language in which the healing action of Jesus is described, 'He came and took her by the hand and raised her up' echoes the language of resurrection. Upon healing Simon's mother-in-law gets up and begins to wait on them. This 'service' signals that she has fully recovered from her fever and is restored to health. At the same time her actions seem to

health. At the same time her actions seem to foreshadow the 'service' that Jesus himself will provide as the Son of Man who has come 'not to be served but to serve and give his life as a ransom for many' (10:45).

Pope Francis stated that "Love and charity are service, helping others, serving others. There are many people who spend their lives in this way, in the service of others. ...When you forget yourself and think of others, this is love! The Lord teaches us to be servants, and above all, servants as He was a servant to us."

Our Lady of Lourdes - 11th February

In southern France, Marie-Bernarde Soubirous, a 14-year-old French peasant girl, first claims to have seen the Virgin Mary, the mother of Jesus Christ and a central figure in the Roman Catholic religion. On a cold day in February 1858, Bernadette and two companions headed off to the Gave River to collect pieces of wood. The companions ran ahead and left Bernadette struggling to keep up. As Bernadette was taking off her shoes to make her way through the river, she was startled by a peculiar wind and rustling sound.

Bernadette looked up towards the grotto and the caves on the riverbank. Near the opening of the grotto, Bernadette glanced and noticed the cave was suddenly filled with golden light. Lifting up her eyes, she saw a lady of great beauty, dressed in a pure white robe with a blue sash, a veil over her head, a rosary clasped in her hands and yellow roses at her feet. These apparitions, which totalled 18 before the end of the year, occurred in a grotto of a rock promontory near Lourdes, France. Marie explained that the Virgin Mary revealed herself as the Immaculate Conception, asked that a chapel be built on the site of the vision, and told the girl to drink from a fountain in the grotto, which Marie subsequently discovered by digging into the earth. The concept of the Immaculate Conception, in which the Virgin Mary is regarded free from original sin from the moment of her conception, had been accepted just four years previous by Pope Pius IX. Marie's claims garnered widespread attention, but sceptical church authorities subjected her to severe examinations and refused to accept her visions. After years of mistreatment at the hands of the authorities and the curious public, she was finally allowed to enter the convent of Notre-Dame de Nevers, where she spent her remaining years in prayer and seclusion. She died of ill health at the age of 35. The sight of her manifestations subsequently became the most famous modern shrine of the Virgin Mary, and in 1933 Marie-Bernarde Soubirous was canonised as St. Bernadette by the Roman Catholic Church. Today, millions travel to Lourdes every year to visit St. Bernadette's grotto, whose waters supposedly have curative powers.
