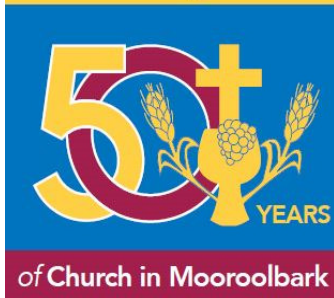

Reflection



The theme of today's readings is "Peace" or, in Hebrew, "Shalom," but what do we mean by Peace? In the examples we have in the Readings, Peace means a certain inner "calmness" of spirit that tells us, "Everything will turn out alright." However, that implies Trust. The word Shalom goes even further in its meaning by wishing one Prosperity and Good Health. The great gift of divine Peace, as in these examples, requires Trust. If you were told to go on a business trip or vacation without money, extra clothing or reservations, you would obviously decline with haste. But that is exactly what Jesus is asking of His disciples in this story. Of course, the times and social customs were different; but nevertheless, it required great trust in Jesus - and look at the results! The seventy-two returned rejoicing, but Jesus cautions them against bragging and commends them for their trust in Him. "What is the difference between Faith and Trust?" The only answer that is possible is "Action!" Faith is an interior belief or assurance, whereas Trust is the manifestation of that faith in action. When exercised by the grace of the Holy Spirit, the result is a certain calmness that we can only describe as Peace. So, "Is your mind and heart truly at Peace? Shalom!" Something to think about during your prayer time this week!

The six National Themes for Discernment invite people to reflect, to pray and to consider how God is calling the People of God to be a Christ-centred Church in Australia that is:

- Missionary and Evangelising
- Inclusive, Participatory and Synodal
- Prayerful and Eucharistic
- Humble, Healing and Merciful
- A Joyful, Hope-Filled and Servant Community
- Open to Conversion, Renewal and Reform.

We Care

Responding to the Voluntary Assisted Dying Act.

From the earliest times, Christ's followers have set
themselves apart by their care of the vulnerable
(Acts 4:34). On 19 June 2019, the *Voluntary
Assisted Dying Act* (VAD) comes into effect. It
legalises euthanasia and assisted suicide.

Despite what the law may say, our Christian
tradition affirms that every life, including those of
the sick and suffering, is sacred.

Euthanasia and assisted suicide are never part of
end of life care.

Pope Francis has encouraged ordinary Catholics
everywhere to resist euthanasia and to protect the
old, the young and the vulnerable from being cast
aside in a "throw-away culture." We are called to
follow Christ by accompanying people with
compassion, sharing hope not fear.

The Bishops of the Catholic dioceses of
Melbourne, Ballarat, Sale and Sandhurst, echoing
Pope Francis, have published a pastoral letter
including practical guidance on ways we can be
conscientious objectors to euthanasia.

SOCIAL JUSTICE ACTION GROUP

Our 2018 Advent Appeal, raised funds for the building of Oznam House, a multimillion dollar project of Vincent Care. The new Oznam House provides sanctuary for 134 homeless people. . The article below gives an update on the use of your generous donations.

I can't help but think of the words of Jesus, "When I was homeless, you gave me rest."

Damien Chandler spent many years as a rough sleeper, often pulling things out of charity bins, to use as blankets in parks. When he found crisis accommodation, it was hardly a restful place.

"I'd go to a homeless service to sleep when it was bad weather on the way," he said. "It's so depressing, you're sleeping with your sneakers, everything you own, because it will be stolen.

"They're nothing like this at all."

*Damien is referring to **Ozanam House**, the new 10-level homelessness supercentre on Flemington Road in North Melbourne. It will be Australia's largest accommodation service for rough sleepers, when it opens its doors in the coming weeks.*

Around 25,000 people experience homelessness in Victoria, including almost 400 in the city and inner suburbs.

It began in 1953 as a night shelter for single men, but the redeveloped Ozanam House will welcome women for the first time. It will also be a one stop centre for support services.

As well as housing for 134 people, including 60 short-term crisis accommodation units, the building will have a range of drop-in health services, including dentistry, optometry and alcohol and drug intervention.

There is also a tech hub, with free wi-fi, cloud storage and a place to recharge phones. A gym, laundry and library are also available, while a cafe will provide meals.

Design choices were made to project a calm environment, with lots of natural light, timber panelling and warm colours.

After doing his barista training, Damien will volunteer making coffees at Ozanam House. Even a well-made cuppa can be a big deal for those who don't have much, he says. "Other places have a bucket of coffee in the corner, it is what it is, it's better than nothing," he says. "We get their names and when you bring out the coffee and say 'here John', it's that extra layer of personalisation." Housing minister Richard Wynne toured Ozanam House yesterday. "This is really the future of homeless intervention going forward, this is a spectacular building and the residents who will be living here deserve the best," he said.

Vincent Care CEO, Quinn Pawson, said, "the new centre had been designed through consultation with clients. Feedback around noise levels led to the use sound reduction materials," he said.

"Really the benchmark for us is," would we want to live here? If we could answer yes to that question, then I think we got it about right," he said.

It's the rooms themselves that will be the big difference, according to Damien.

He recalled staying at Matthew Talbot Hostel in Sydney, in one big dormitory full of beds. There was no privacy, including in the showers, and the syringe bins were overflowing .

Each of the apartments at Ozanam House is lockable and has an ensuite. There are large windows with views of nearby Royal Park and the city. "You've got your own room, with a door that locks, your own shower and toilet," he said. "Anyone sleeping in the park right now, coming in and having that, it really stood out for me."

ABORIGINAL SUNDAY

A day to recognise and pray for the traditional people of our land.

We share a common human nature regardless of our ethnic background. We share fundamental needs. This includes the desire to belong, to be happy, to find fulfilment, to be safe, to be appreciated.

The whole of Australian society is going through massive change. The present rate of change is possibly unprecedented in human history ever. It is affecting all of us in many ways. Many think that you cannot be sure of anything anymore. This has many implications in our search for meaning in life and values

This massive rate of change is also of course affecting our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander brothers and sisters. When this is combined with the practical challenges that they face, the effect can be very far reaching. As spiritual beings we need spiritual nourishment. When we are not nourished spiritually we can become spiritually sick. *Australian society as a whole is challenged of how to nourish ourselves spiritually.*

Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people have a deep faith. We can all learn from them. Like all of us they are often challenged as to how to pass on their traditions to the younger generations. Many are deeply concerned about the challenges which their young people face. The tragedy of the large number of suicides among our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people, especially the young, calls us to action! This is a sad and unacceptable reality. There are many groups working with our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. These include various layers of government, community and Church organisations, and others. We need to avoid the trap of trying to 'resolve' issues for them. We must safeguard the principle of self-determination. We can walk alongside in loving support but avoid any temptation to come in with quick solutions imposed from outside. Suicide is often the last straw in a build up of unhappiness and pain. There is often a desire for the pain to go and often not focusing on the permanent consequences of taking one's life. Our Australian Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples have suffered dispossession, displacement, violence of various types and much more. So often others have determined for them what they considered to be the best for them. The challenges facing communities are multifold. Many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people recognize that this challenge also applies to them, all be it often in somewhat different ways.

As Catholics we know that our hearts are restless until they rest in God. Our Christian faith gives us energy and good reasons for living. There is such a vast history of deep spirituality in our First Nations People in Australia. Pope John Paul II in his famous message which he gave in the Australian heartland when he addressed the Aboriginal peoples, stated that the Catholic Church will be lacking in its full expression if it does not embrace the spirituality of our Aboriginal people.

While there has been many disproportionate numbers of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander young people taking their lives, no society is immune from this sad reality. We all need to remember that Jesus who laughs and cries with us is 'The Way, the Truth and THE LIFE'
