FEASTDAY OF ST.LUKE - 18th October

Luke the Evangelist (Latin: Lūcās, Ancient

Greek: Λουκᾶς, Loukâs, Hebrew: לוקאס, $L\bar{u}g\bar{a}s$, Aramaic: / ביקא, $L\bar{u}g\bar{a}s$) is one of the Four Evangelists—the four traditionally ascribed authors of the canonical gospels. The Early Church Fathers ascribed to him authorship of both the Gospel of Luke and the Acts of the Apostles, which would mean Luke contributed over a quarter of the text of the New Testament, more than any other author. Prominent figures in early Christianity such as Jerome and Eusebius later reaffirmed his authorship, although a lack of conclusive evidence as to the identity of the author of the works has led to discussion in scholarly circles, both secular and religious.

The New Testament mentions Luke briefly a few times, and

the Pauline Epistle to the Colossians (Col 4:14) refers to him as a physician

(from Greek for 'one who heals'); thus he is thought to have been both a physician and a disciple of Paul. Since the early years of the faith, Christians have regarded him as a saint. He is believed to have been a martyr, reportedly having been hanged from an olive tree, though some believe otherwise. [2] St. Luke is quite special. Not only was he the only Gentile to write books of the Bible, but he was a close companion of St. Paul. If St. Paul succeeded in evangelising the western Roman empire, Luke may have had more to do with it than we know. It is likely that God used his medical skills to keep St. Paul alive some of those times when he was beaten, stoned, or half-drowned.

Luke pulled back the curtain on the young Jesus more than any other gospel writer. Without him we would not know anything about the boy Jesus's thinking. It is a pretty safe bet that Luke interviewed the Blessed Virgin Mary and got most of the details from her. Perhaps he even heard the Magnificat, recorded in his gospel alone, from her very own lips.

The Roman Catholic Church and other major denominations venerate him as Saint Luke the **Evangelist** and as a patron saint of artists, physicians, bachelors, surgeons, students and butchers; his feast day is 18 October.^[3]



FR JOSEPH HOMILY

29th Sunday of Year A, 2020

A young man had been studying the violin under a well-known violinist. The time came when his mentor thought that he was ready for a public recital. After the first number of the recital, the audience gave the young man a nice applause. But the young man was not greatly impressed. After the second number, the applause had increased. Still, the young man wasn't greatly impressed.

Then he looked up at his mentor, in the balcony, who was enthusiastically applauding and giving him special signs of approval. The young man was overwhelmingly impressed. We all need the approval of someone very special to us. Without this approval we will not be able to do our very best. With this approval we will be able to do well, even if the approval of others is less than enthusiastic. Even if we receive the opposite of approval we will be able to continue doing well.

In today's gospel (Matthew 22:15-21), we see one instance, among many other instances, when Jesus was attacked by the Pharisees. Did these many attacks stop Jesus from the mission of his Father? No, because he was absolutely certain that he had the love and approval of his Father.

Even we, with our many weaknesses and limitations, should be assured that God loves us more than any mother or father could love a child. For he has said to us, "I have loved you with an everlasting love." (Jeremiah 31:13)

Recently, I have bumped into some parishioners in Chirnside Park shopping centre. I had the opportunities to chat with them and I am so grateful and inspired by their concerns about the wellbeing of the parish and myself. They have made contacts with our parish secretary Adriana De Leo and are supporting the parish financially in this challenging time. These acts of charity and kindness once again remind me of the Chinese saying: "When you drink the water from the Well, do not forget the ones who dug the Well." As I have said to our parish leaders and staff in the past, we have got some beautiful people in our parish and these are the grace and blessing of God, because it was God who has prompted them to act in charity, kindness and generosity.



Our sister, our saint: Memories of Mary's Canonisation

It was a sunny Spring Sunday – 17 October 2010 – and we were celebrating the canonisation of our first Australian saint, St Mary of the Cross MacKillop. I was the standin for Archbishop Hart, who was in Rome for the occasion. St Patrick's Cathedral was packed. People were even crouched around the bishop's chair. In pride of place were the Josephite Sisters, wearing blue scarves for the joyous occasion.

After Mass on the day of her canonisation, many of us gathered near the site of her birth to walk in procession down Brunswick Street and Gertrude Street to the Exhibition Buildings. Here the civic event was celebrated outdoors, in the presence of then Prime Minister Julia Gillard and presided over by Bishop Les Tomlinson. The message was clear: St Mary belongs to all Australians.

Her sisters in the brown habit went out to find those in need, in the bush, in the cities and towns: children in schools, women, especially unmarried mothers and prostitutes, poor families and Indigenous Australians. She said, "Never see a need without doing something about it."

Not only did she establish schools across this archdiocese, but she set up a refuge for women in the worst part of the city, Latrobe Street, and a foundling home at Surrey Hills. Behind the cathedral, in Albert Street, she opened the convent that is now the Mary MacKillop Heritage Centre.
