THE MOST HOLY TRINITY YEAR A

*Glory to the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit;
to God who is, who was, and who is to come.*

Background

Pope Gregory IX instituted Trinity Sunday in 828 CE. This day is known for being the only major Christian festival that celebrates a church doctrine rather than an event in its sacred history. It is dedicated to the Christian belief in the Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – and falls on the Sunday following Pentecost each year. The belief of one God in three elements is a distinctive of the Christian faith but the early church was plagued by contrary views. Trinity Sunday spread throughout the western church around the 14th century CE.

Symbols

Images of the Trinity of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit depict that there are three elements of one God. The Trinity is sometimes symbolized by a triangular shape formed by three overlapping oval rings or loops, each featuring the one of the following images: the crown (father) within the top loop; the lamb (son) within the second loop (clockwise); and the dove (spirit) within the third loop (clockwise).

Other shapes depicting the Trinity include Borromean rings and the triquetra. The Borromean rings feature three overlapping round circles forming a triangular shape, and in the center, inside all the circles is the word "unitas". The Borromean rings are named after the crest of the Borromeo family in 15th-century Tuscany.

The triquetra symbol uses shapes similar to one of the oldest Christian symbols. In the triquetra, the three equal arches of the circle express the equality of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The union of the arches represents the unity of the Godhead. Their continuous form symbolizes eternity. Their interwoven appearance denotes the indivisibility of the Trinity. In the center of the triquetra is an equilateral triangle, one of the most ancient Trinity symbols, and each pair of arches formed an ellipse, the symbol of God's glory.

Family groups who live in the same household must sit together.

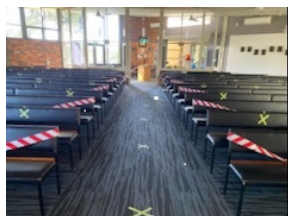
Individuals to sit where marked by a green cross on the pews.

THANKSGIVING PROGRAM

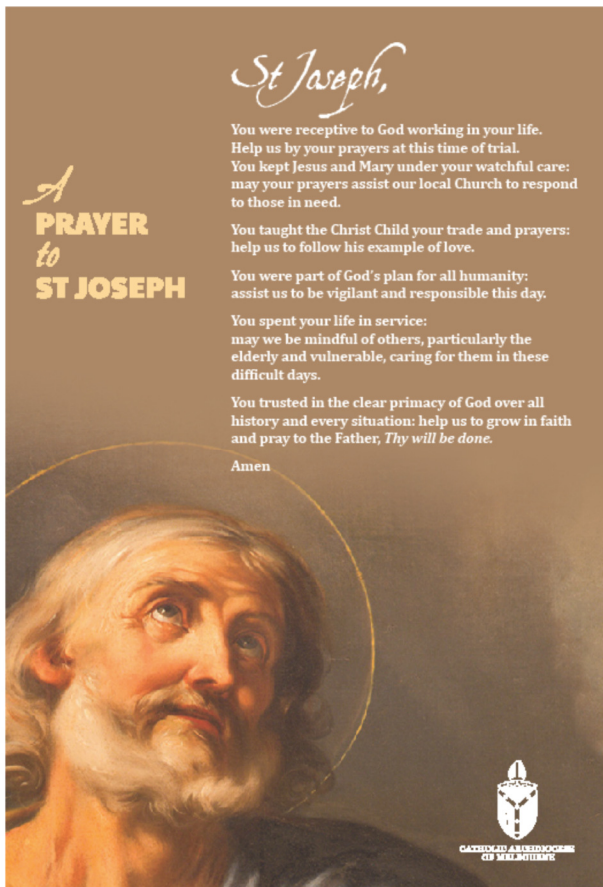
During this difficult time, parishioners are encouraged to continue to support the Parish financially. This support is essential to the ongoing weekly expenditure of our Parish.

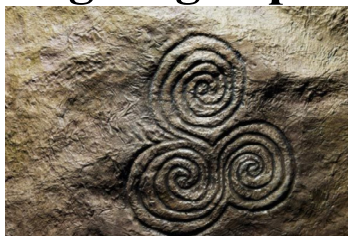
Newsletter via Email

Carved some 5200 years ago, some of these connotations include: life-death-rebirth, spirit-mind-body, **mother-father-child**, past-present-future, power-intellect-love and creation-preservation-destruction to name but a few. We can add **Father-Son-Holy Spirit**.

FR JOSEPH HOMILY

The Most Holy Trinity, Year A, 2020

Perhaps 2000 years before Christ, Abraham was called by God to be the father of the Jewish people who were to worship the one and only true God. But it took a long time for the Jewish people to learn that there was only one God. In the time of Abraham, most people believed that there were many gods. When Abraham moved to what would become the Promised Land, all his neighbours still believed in many gods.

500 years later Moses had to scold the Jewish people for falling into idol worship. The lesson of believing in one God only was a very slow one.

Sometimes the Old Testament spoke of God like a son, or like a lover spirit, but the emphasis was always on one.

Then Jesus came. Jesus was more explicit. Jesus seemed to equal himself to God (but he still spoke of God as his father) and Jesus seemed to equal his Spirit of God but he still did not say he has God's spirit. Learning and understanding of who God was came very slowly. In fact, it was not until three or four hundred years later, after much discussion and prayer, that the ecumenical councils of the Church finally made it very clear that God was three in one. Only 400 years after Jesus was the truth taught with certitude that God is Trinity. It is like saying that God is somewhat like a "family," the way God is "somewhat like a three leaf clover/shamrock" (St Patrick of Ireland). And there are three persons in this "family". But God not exactly like human family. A human family has a beginning. God has no beginning. The son in a human family comes after the family is formed. The son in God's "family" did not come later, but always was. And God's "family" was not formed - it too, always was. What does all this mean? What practical value is there in belief in one God who is a "family" of three persons?

It means that we can run to God as we would run to a father.

It means that we can confide in God as we would confide in an elder brother.

It means that we can speak to God in whispers as we might speak to a sweetheart who is one with us in spirit.
