interest Justice Action Group

Our Justice Action Group arose 3 years ago, from a group of parishioners concerned about global and local injustices including the plight of asylum seekers and refugees, the need for sustainable living, trafficking of women and children, the tragedy of sexual abuse, domestic violence and homelessness.

This enthusiastic group of about 25 members of various ages meets monthly to discuss these issues, work out ways of educating ourselves and the parish community and to make decisions about meaningful and appropriate action.

Our focus has been the unjust treatment of refugees by supporting the Brigidine Asylum Seekers Project. Through this organization, we have endeavored to keep ourselves informed of current government policies and their impact on people worthy of our respect and compassion.

Some of our members have adopted refugee's families to visit and befriend as well as helping them to develop language skills and get work.



Each year we've organized a picnic day for refugee families. An outing for them to enjoy with lunch and fun activities for the children. It provides an opportunity for us to meet refugees face to face and has been greatly enjoyed by all.

Such events enable us to involve the whole parish community who have responded generously.

Our group grows from time to time with new members eager to work against injustices – more members are welcome.

St Brigid's

'Turning Orange for Orang-utans's was a special day organised by Zoos Victoria. The aim of the day was to complete an activity and send letters, poems, posters and photos to encourage our politicians to vote for clearer product labelling, with a vote to take place at the end of Nov/ Dec.

Currently over 50% of the products on our shelves use palm oil. Natural forests and habitats of the orangutans are destroyed and replaced with palm oil producing trees. This is having a devastating impact on the orangutan population.

On Tuesday 8th November our staff and students came dressed in something orange and each level completed an activity which was sent to the politicians.

Preps made an orang-utan mask. Year 1/2s composed a song, poem and wrote a story, whilst Year 3/4s created posters to encourage people to reduce their buying of products with palm oil. Year 5/6s wrote letters to the ministers in our state who are voting on this important issue.

**We were thrilled to hear this week that the State Government has now passed legislation that will require companies to list Palm Oil on product labelling.

Parishioners and school families are very supportive and donate items to help fill these hampers and also generously donate funds through special collections at Masses at Christmas and also at Easter time.

Each year the two St Vincent de Paul Groups in our Parish visit over 300 homes. During these visits they can assist struggling families by providing food, supermarket vouchers, furniture, vouchers for clothing, assistance with bills, advice and referrals to other organisations and most importantly by offering friendship and support at times when it is greatly needed. Members also regularly help out on Vinnies Soup Vans and in our local Vinnies Stores, plus they run our 'Let's Do Lunches'. reflect Father Andrew's Word

Where has the year gone?

Christmas time is an opportune time to stop and look back on the year. When I do so, I realise that life in the parish has been incredibly busy. Remember Fr. Nick, Fr. Mike and Sr. Joan who came and spent one week with us during our Mission week in April? They were an absolute gift to us as they shared their wisdom and assisted us in deepening our faith in Jesus. Then we renewed our support to prayer, our involvement in parish life and our financial support all through the Stewardship program.

There have been the ongoing improvements to our churches with a significant renovation to St. Brigid's. As the altar top was lifted off so that the base could move forward to its new position, an exciting discovery awaited us. A time capsule. It contained a few pieces that were crudely thrown together and placed into the altar cavity. A newspaper dated back to 1957, some coins (one pre-decimal and the other post decimal), some rosary beads and Fr. Jim English's calling card, listing the parish phone number as XY 1018. Some of these items were placed into the time capsule when it was built in 1957 and further items included when the altar moved in 1967 in accordance with the Vatican Council requirements.

We continued the tradition with a new time capsule including items such as the parish newsletter and directory along with my calling card. I wonder who will discover them (and when)?

Advent reminds us that Christmas is not far away and that we are to hold close to our hearts the first ever Christmas, the time when God has taken on our humanity and has come into our world. We name this new born child Emmanuel which means "God is with us". We take the time to ponder over the reality of this name because it reminds us of how valued and loved all of humanity is in God's eyes. God came into our world and our lives so that we are never to be on our own, so that we know that we can call on God at any time, and that God will hear and answer our prayers. We may not receive the Christmas presents that we have asked Santa to give, but God will present us with what we need. We just need to be open to the gifts that come our way.

So, as we gather around our Christmas trees this year, I invite you to take the time to see the evergreen tree as a symbol that Jesus is ever-present and he is the "Tree of Life" as well as the Christmas lights to remind us that the Christ child came to earth as the "Light of the World".
