Dear Friends,

Our gospel today begins after the two friends of Jesus had met him on the road to Emmaus; 'the disciples told their story of what had happened to them on the road and how they had recognised him at the breaking of the bread.'



18th April 2021

Having met Jesus they went back to Jerusalem bursting with the good news that he was alive. While they are talking, Jesus appears and repeats the words he used twice in last Sunday's gospel; 'Peace be with you.' Despite Jesus already having appeared to them, they were in state of alarm and fright, thinking they were seeing a ghost.' Jesus speaks very directly to them; 'Why are you so agitated, and why are these doubts rising in your hearts?' To calm these doubts Jesus invites them to touch him to prove that he is not a ghost. He goes further and shows them the wounds in his hands and feet. While their joy was so great, they could not believe it, and they stood (there) dumbfounded. It is obvious from this that Thomas was not the only one who doubted that Jesus had in fact risen from the dead!

We can only imagine the confusion of the disciples. They had spent three years accompanying Jesus as he preached and healed. They had eaten and prayed with him. They saw him being arrested, condemned and crucified. They knew he had died on the cross and had been buried. Now, here he is standing amongst them, talking to them and showing them the wounds he suffered while being crucified. It is any wonder that they are agitated, frightened, dumbfounded and think that that are seeing a ghost! We can almost feel their fear, confusion and doubt. Their reaction is very human and normal.

It is worth noting that while Jesus asks them why they are agitated, he doesn't condemn, dismiss or criticising them for their response and reaction to his appearance. He not only accepts them as they are, he also reassures and encourages them with his peace and his presence. As we have heard countless times over the last twelve months, because of Covid 19, this has been and sadly continues to be an unprecedented time for all of us. Our 'normal' way of life was abruptly halted. This has been a very difficult year for us. Let us not be too hard on ourselves if we too, like the disciples in the gospel, are also agitated and experience doubts in our hearts and daily lives.

As Jesus stood with his disciples in their anxiety and confusion, Jesus too stands with each of us today. He encourages and strengthens us now with the same look of love and words of support as he says, 'Peace be with you.' Jesus appeared to his disciples when they needed him the most; he didn't abandon or desert them. Now more than ever during this season of Easter, we too are asked to believe that the risen Lord is with us; Jesus has not abandoned nor deserted us.

Parishioners are invited to assist in some ministry that contributions to our weekly celebrations of the Eucharist.


The active ministries at this time are: Lector, Commentator, and AV Operators.

SOCIAL JUSTICE NEWS

'He sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal.' Lk 9:2

Catholic Social Teaching





Catholic society that is grounded in the Bible and in the wisdom gathered from experience by the Christian community as it has responded to social justice through history. Catholic Social Tradition is rooted in the Hebrew and Christian Scriptures. The Hebrew Scriptures call God's People to act justly and to care for the widows and orphans, that is those who have no one to provide for them. There is an obligation to improve the world, to 'repair' the world through the performance of good deeds, that is actions of justice.

"You shall not wrong or oppress a resident alien, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt. You shall not abuse any widow or orphan. If you do abuse them, when they cry out to me, I will surely heed their cry." Exodus 22:21-23

Jesus challenged the unjust norms of his society. When he healed people, he restored their dignity.

"When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

"The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour." (Isaiah 61:1-2)

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing." Luke 4:16-21


The formal teaching of the Church on Social Issues can be found in documents such as Statements of Bishops, Papal Bulls and Papal Encyclicals. **These articulate the principles of Catholic Social Teaching**.

PRINCIPLES OF CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

1. The foundation concept of the social teaching is the sacredness or **dignity of the human person**. The social ministry of the Church exists to protect and promote human dignity. Human dignity is the starting point and central concern of Catholic thinking about human rights.

Each person is created in the image and likeness of God and so has an inalienable, transcendent, Godgiven dignity. We are all children of the one God. Thus, we must treat each other as equals; we must regard and treat others as 'God like'! We do not lose our right to be treated with dignity as a result of race, creed, status, possessions etc. or gain this dignity through accomplishments, possessions and power etc.

In <u>Laudato Si'</u> – On Care for Our Common Home (2015) Pope Francis calls us to respect the dignity of the human person and of creation by listening to the cry of the earth, and the cry of the poor.



For many, Easter is simply the weekend that begins with Good Friday and ends with Resurrection Sunday, or for more secular people Easter Monday (simply due to when public holidays happen).

It is often forgotten, however, that the full Easter period begins with resurrection Sunday and ends with Pentecost Sunday, lasting 50 days in total.

The tradition behind Eastertide (Easter season)

Easter Sunday and Pentecost correspond to pre-existing Jewish feasts: The first day of Pesach (ספט) and the holiday of Shavu'ot (שבועות). In the Jewish tradition, the 49 days between these holidays are known as Counting of the Omer (העומר ספירת).

In Christianity it is symbolic of the days that passed for the followers of Christ from the Lord's resurrection to the Pentecost which commemorates the coming of the Holy Spirit. Nowadays, it is a time for celebration, including prayer and jubilation. A time to ponder on a crucial, yet less discussed period that defined Christianity. However, in case you were hopping on using the 50 days to fill up on even more candy then sorry you're out of luck ;)



Resurrection Sunday The day our Lord resurrected "According to his great mercy, he has caused us to be (1 Peter 1:3) born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead."



First Sunday

John 20:190

On the evening of that day, the first day of the week, the doors being locked where the disciples were for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you."

The first Sunday is known as the "Dominica in albis" or the Octave of Easter, or Low Sunday (as it is often know in the Anglican community. This day celebrates the appearance of Christ to his disciples. On the Monday after Low Sunday is celebrated the feast of the Joys or Exultation of Mary at the Resurrection of her son.

Second Sunday

In the Latin Church the second Sunday is called from its Gospel the Sunday of the Divine Mercy and from the Introit "Misericordias Domini".

Third Sunday

The third Sunday is called from the Introit "Jubilate" and the Latin Church has assigned to it the feast of the Patronage of St. Joseph.

Fourth Sunday

ACTS 2:14A, 36-41

Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice, and proclaimed: "Let the whole house of Israel know for certain that God has made both Lord and Christ, this Jesus whom you crucified.

Fifth Sunday ACTS 9:26-31

"When Saul arrived in Jerusalem he tried to join the disciples, but they were all afraid of him, not believing that he was a disciple. Then Barnabas took charge of him and brought him to the apostles, and he reported to them how he had seen the Lord, and that he had spoken to him, and how in Damascus he had spoken out boldly in the name of Jesus."

Sixth Sunday

Sunday within the octave of Ascension is called "Exaudi" from the Introit; in some dioceses it is called Feast of Our Lady, Queen of the Apostles; in Rome it was called Sunday of the Roses ("Pascha rosarum" or "rosatum"), since in the Pantheon rose-leaves were thrown from the rotunda into the church. The Sunday of the Roses drew influence from the Ancient Roman festival of Rosalia.

Pentecost

This is the final day of the Easter season when we commemorate the coming of the Holy Spirit on the early followers of Jesus.

The Acts of the Apostles. Chapter 2 begins, "And when the day of Pentecost [ten hemeran tes pentekostes] had come, [the first followers of Jesus] were all together in one place" (2:1). All of a sudden, a sound came from heaven, like a strong wind, filling the house where the people had gathered. Something like tongues of fire rested on their heads. "And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages as the Spirit gave them the ability to speak" (2:4)
