How strange life can be!




As I think back to my arrival at St Thomas More almost twelve months ago, I could not have imagined the kind of year that would unfold. My first weekend was a disappointment: 30 minutes before our first Mass I received a text message saying I had to immediately isolate and get tested for COVID. Since I arrived, we have gone through 108 days of lockdown in five chunks from March to October. For a new pastor, this see-saw off and on, stop and start has been deeply frustrating and disappointing. Like so many of you have experienced these times have sapped my energy and made it harder to plan with any certainty for the future. I know it has also created barriers for parishioners in finding the confidence to return to Mass safely. Next year, I look forward to rebuilding and reconnecting with our community, building up the life and spirit of St Thomas More as we journey towards "Mission" both with our own community and inviting others to join us.

Though I have been a priest for six years, it is very different experience when you become a pastor of a community. I am honoured by the welcome and trust you have been given to me. It has been a humbling and enriching time getting to know so many of you through the Masses and gatherings we've shared together. Through our Lenten gatherings and times reflecting on films and books I have seen the deep faith and understanding that underpins our community. I've been impressed by the work done to promote justice in Mt Eliza, in our local Vinnies conference, around Australia and overseas. For a smaller community, we are diverse and I've been touched how our parishioners find such joy in welcoming visitors and newcomers to be a part of our community, each person sharing their own unique gifts. I look forward to the next year ahead and seeing what God will do in our Parish in and through each one of us.

Christmas is that time of the year when we look forward to exchanging presents with our loved ones. In our family this Kris Kringle ritual is a well-loved tradition. It turns out that what makes a good gift is not always the price tag, since value and cost are two different things. What makes a great gift is the value and worth that something will have in the hands of the receiver, and the thoughtfulness and intention of the giver. There is a sense of excitement and anticipation as the presents of all shapes and sizes beckon under the tree. At Christmas a profound exchange of gifts happens between God and us. St Irenaeus of Lyon wrote that in the incarnation, in birth of Jesus, God gives to us his divinity, and we give God our humanity. We become divine, and God becomes human. We are able to grasp the heights of heaven, and God enters into the depths of our lowliness. This beautiful exchange is revealed in Jesus, son of Mary and Son of God.

This has profound implications for our own lives. It means that no matter whether we go through good times or hard times, God is never faraway from us. As we consider the year ahead, 2022, we can already see signs that the turmoil and uncertainty of this pandemic is not over yet. Things may get worse before they get better. But whatever happens, Christmas teaches us that God is with us, and that God brings good out of every situation. From a stable in Bethlehem came the creator of the world. From our own crosses comes the joy of the resurrection. Whatever happens, we trust and hope that God is with us, sharing his life with us, and we sharing our life with him.
