Dear Friends,

Today's gospel presents us with the victorious band of apostles returning from their mission of healing and teaching brimming with excitement, "telling Jesus about all they had done and taught". But the first thing that Jesus does is call them back from this great buzz of activity and command them to go to "some lonely place all by yourselves".



Working for God is meant to be exciting! Jesus' friends had those great moments of fruitfulness, busyness and achievement. These are important experiences that motivate us and reward us. With God's grace we can do all things. But the disciple is not meant to live on the edge all the time. They must also know their limits and have times of repose, reflection perhaps even isolation; time and space away from the good things they are doing.

In the gospel, the disciples don't get much of a choice in the matter! Jesus tells them "you **must** come away ... and rest". He knew what they needed better than they did themselves. It can be hard for us to find peace and stillness in our busy lives. There are so many good things to be done, here and now. Slowing down and stepping away can feel indulgent and wasteful. Our ways of relaxing can even us more exhausted and busy than we were before.

Sometimes we need to be reminded or even forced to change gears. Perhaps the current lockdown (number 5!) could be seen in this light. Lockdowns are disruptive and we don't choose them for ourselves. Lockdowns force us to change our schedules and to slow down. It is understandable to feel frustration and disappointment at our cancelled plans, lost business revenue, the stress of having to learn and work from home. These pressures and many others can take a real toll on ourselves and our families.

But all is not lost. We also have an opportunity to make the most of these days of isolation to step away from our normal routines and to hear the voice of the Good Shepherd more clearly. We could do so with the help of the readings for this Sunday included in *Seasons*—reading them slowly and lingering on their significance for our lives. We might go for a walk and feel God's presence in the stillness of nature. We could pray the rosary, read a spiritual book or watch a solid film. We could reach out to relatives and friends we haven't spoken to in a while. Over these days of lockdown we're like the disciples in the gospel, we are called to step away from our normal lives and to change pace. Let us make the most of this difficult time by resting with The Lord.

# I 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time

### **Collect**

Show favour, O Lord, to your servants and mercifully increase the gifts of your grace, that, made fervent in hope, faith and charity, they may be ever watchful in keeping your commands. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

I will gather together the remnant of my flock and raise up shepherds for them.

I will gather together the remnant of my flock and raise up shepherds for them. 'Doom for the shepherds who allow the flock of my pasture to be destroyed and scattered – it is the Lord who speaks! This, therefore, is what the Lord, the God of Israel, says about the shepherds in charge of my people: You have let my flock be scattered and go wandering and have not taken care of them. Right, I will take care of you for your misdeeds – it is the Lord who speaks! But the remnant of my flock I myself will gather from all the countries where I have dispersed them, and will bring them back to their pastures: they shall be fruitful and increase in numbers. I will raise up shepherds to look after them and pasture them; no fear, no terror for them any more; not one shall be lost – it is the Lord who speaks!. 'See, the days are coming – it is the Lord who speaks – when I will raise a virtuous Branch for David, who will reign as true king and be wise, practising honesty and integrity in the land. In his days Judah will be saved

and Israel dwell in confidence. And this is the name he will be called: The-Lord-our-integrity.'

### Second Reading: Ephesians 2:13-18 Christ Jesus is the peace between us.

In Christ Jesus, you that used to be so far apart from us have been brought very close, by the blood of Christ. For he is the peace between us, and



has made the two into one and broken down the barrier which used to keep them apart, actually destroying in his own person the hostility caused by the rules and decrees of the Law. This was to create one single New Man in himself out of the two of them and by restoring peace through the cross, to unite them both in a single Body and reconcile them with God: in his own person he killed the hostility. Later he came to bring the good news of peace, peace to you who were far away and peace to those who were near at hand. Through him, both of us have in the one Spirit our way to come to the Father.

### Gospel: Mark 6:30-34

They were like sheep without a shepherd.

So they went off in a boat to a lonely place where they could be by themselves. But people saw them going, and many could guess where; and from every town they all hurried to the place on foot and reached it before them. So as he stepped ashore he saw a large crowd; and he took pity on them because they were like sheep without a shepherd, and he set himself to teach them at some length.
