Dear Friends,

As I write these words I do so on the Feast of the Sacred Heart, 11^{th} of June.



The origins of the Sacred Heart go back a long way to the early Church Fathers: Ambrose, Jerome and Augustine. Yet it was only in the 16th and 17th centuries that this Feast became a devotion. These centuries were a tumultuous time in the Church's history. The Reformation was well and truly underway along with its emphasis on sola fide (faith alone) and sola scripture (scripture alone). God seemed to become more remote and impersonal. Only the very good could be saved, and there was not much someone could do to change God's judgement on them. Many faithful Christians began to lose hope and to fear for their salvation. Some fell into despair.

St John Eudes and Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque began to change the tide by inviting people to consider to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the heart of God who burns with love, mercy and forgiveness. Drawing the gaze of people away from themselves: their weakness, failures and sins allowed them to begin noticing the loving gaze of Christ towards them. It made God a real person, someone who loves us and that we are drawn to love in return. It reconnected people back with a God who could, at times, seemed so far away.

As we emerge from our fourth lockdown since the beginning of COVID-19, we can find ourselves feeling lost and isolated from each other, and from the Church. In these times of uncertainty, we can lose hope and feel overwhelmed by our fears and doubts. When will things go back to normal? When will I be able to see my family and loved ones again? How long will this cycle of up and down continue? These are worthwhile feelings to acknowledge and bring before the Lord.

The Feast of the Sacred Heart reminds us that Jesus is not passive in the face of our struggles. In these days his face is turned towards ours. He feels our pain, suffering, doubt and fear. He feels that with a heart that is like ours – but even more gentle, compassionate, open. Meditating on the image of the Sacred Heart has brought many encouragement and consolation in times of trouble. May we find the heart of Christ beating with ours in these trying times.

It is great news that Masses and Sacraments have resumed at St Thomas More and we're now back to our normal schedule. While there's no need to pre-register attendance, you will notice the Church has a limited capacity with seating more spread out with new rules around mask wearing. We are strictly required to check each person into the Church via the Victorian Government's "QR Code". The easiest way to do this is to download the software to your phone and scan the QR picture as you enter the Church. If this not possible a welcomer can do this for you in the foyer; you need to give your first & last name with your phone number. Please speak to me or Vicki if you have any questions.

After some weeks apart it's wonderful to able for me to able to celebrate Mass with you again. Let us continue to support and pray for each other, mindful of the ongoing impact that recent events have on the emotional, spiritual and practical lives of so many among us.



PRINCIPLES OF CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

9. The Principle of Preferential Option for the Poor and Vulnerable In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition recalls the story of the judgement of the nations (Mt 25: 31-46) and instructs us to put the needs of the poor and vulnerable first.

We are called to corporal works of mercy.

- 1 Feed the Hungry
- 2 Give drink to the thirsty 4 Visit the imprisoned
- 3 Clothe the naked 5 Shelter the homeless

6 visit the sick

7 Bury the dead

This week's gospel reveals aspects of the teaching of Jesus relating to the Kingdom of God, a kingdom of justice for all where all people share the goods of the world. Matthew's Gospel 25:31-46 refers to the Final Judgement in which the King welcomes the righteous, that is those who performed the corporal works of mercy, into eternal life.

Many encyclicals reinforce this teaching with Rerum Novarum (1891) 'On the Condition of the Working Person' referring to the worker's right to a just wage and to decent working conditions.

Octogesima adveniens (1971) - A Call to Action stated; "The function of the rulers of the State is to watch over the community and its parts; but in protecting private individuals in their rights, chief consideration ought to be given to the weak and the poor." (#25)

Centesimus Annus (1991) – 'The Hundredth Year' stated; "A change of mentality is needed, no longer seeing the poor as a burden, or as intruders trying to profit from others, but as people seeking to share the goods of the world so that we can create a just and prosperous world for all". (#28).

QR CODES New regulations from the State Government mean that when we reopen for Mass next week, all parishioners will need to be registered before entering the Church by scanning a QR CODE through the Service Victoria app.

In practice, this wont make much difference for parishioners who have already been scanning the QR code on their phones. As all organisations now require signing in via this app, eg supermarkets, petrol stations, cafes, etc, it is likely that the majority of Victorians will be end up needing feature on their phone. If you have not yet downloaded the app, you can do so via the Service Victoria Website: www.vic.gov.au

We are aware there will be a few parishioners who may need assistance to register their entry to Church. We will ensure that welcomers will be able to register your visit through a parish device within the foyer. Once we've worked out all the details, we will let you know how this will work in practice - Fr Patrick
