Dear Friends.

This Tuesday we celebrate the Feast of our Patron Saint, Thomas More. In the morning I will celebrate Mass with the whole school community and at 7PM there will be a Parish Mass which all are invited to attend. As was the case last week, there is **no need to book for Mass either on Weekdays or Weekends**. You only need to sign in at the foyer either with your own phone, through the electronic kiosk on the table to the left, or with one of the volunteers seated on the right. All are very welcome.

While on holidays I had the opportunity to finish reading the biography of St Thomas More written by Peter Ackroyd. The story begins slowly, painting a detailed picture of life in Catholic England, on the eve of the Reformation. At times the detail seems a little overwhelming and superfluous. Ultimately though, the author carefully weaves all the threads together into a satisfying finale which faithfully portrays More's humanity, courage (and sense of humour!) It comes with my stamp of approval.

Our founding Parish Priest, then Fr Hilton Deakin, had a great personal devotion to affection for St Thomas. Many of the statues and relics around the Church were obtained from different Churches and Holy Sites through Fr Deakin's efforts. Perhaps Fr Hilton and Thomas More became friends through their shared interest in the humanities: culture, language, literature, art. It was what Thomas understood as *humanism*, and what Fr Hilton might have called *anthropology*. They each share a deep interest and respect for the lived experience and dignity of each person and their background.

Defending these truths makes a real impact in people's lives. St Thomas was a pioneer and advocate for the education of women. In what was unusual for 16th century England, More provided for the holistic education of his daughters in his home school so that they would reach their full potential as contributing members to Christian society. His most famous work, *Utopia*, imagines a society where the common good is underpinned by a deep respect for each person.

Thomas was a firm defender of conscience, freedom and justice. He had a deep devotional life, he loved the Mass and the Sacraments. He would spend some time after meals making his thanksgiving or meditating on the scriptures. He prayed often for his family, and his letters reveal a gentle and loving husband and father.

The Story of St Thomas More has shaped the story of our Parish. Over the years it seems that many of the same ideas and truths that Thomas worked for and believed in have been realised in our faith community through the hard work and dedication of many parishioners. There is much to celebrate on our Feast Day.

As we reflect on the anniversary of our Patron Saint, we remember with gratitude the many years of fruitful mission, ministry, community and outreach at St Thomas More. We give thanks to God for the many Priests, Deacons and committed parishioners who have continued this mission of the Church. We pray for the souls of our faithful departed who have worshipped with us, and we ask almighty God that this work would continue to inspire many and to bear fruit.

PRINCIPLES OF CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

10. The Principle of Human Equality and the Universal Destination of Goods

There is a radical equality among all human beings as everyone is entitled to respect and dignity because she/ he has been created in the image and likeness of God. God intends the goods of creation for the use of all. Everyone has the right to access these goods to meet their needs. People and nations have no right to squander resources when others are in need.

We need to be conscious that we do not exploit resources and so impoverish others or deprive them of necessary goods. Pacific island nations and the rising level of the waters of the ocean are an issue.

This week's gospel (Mark 4:35-41) reveals the lack of faith of the disciples. They misunderstood what Jesus was doing. In their eyes he was not concerned for them as they faced the dangerous storm. "Do you not care that we are perishing?" Jesus is concerned at their lack of faith; they do not trust that he loves them. "Why are you afraid? Have you still no faith?"

Our trust in God may involve doing something to reverse the effects of the human-induced climate crisis. Our hope and trust are in a God who moves us to action directed towards ensuring that the goods of creation are for the use of all.

QR CODES New regulations from the State Government mean that when we reopen for Mass next week, all parishioners will need to be registered before entering the Church by scanning a QR CODE through the Service Victoria app.

In practice, this wont make much difference for parishioners who have already been scanning the QR code on their phones. As all organisations now require signing in via this app, eg supermarkets, petrol stations, cafes, etc, it is likely that the majority of Victorians will be end up needing feature on their phone.
