Dear Friends,

It was about this time last year that COVID restrictions began to hit hard and Churches were closed due to the pandemic. For the first time in living memory, Churches lay silent during the solemn celebrations of Easter. This year promises to be a time of rebuilding and restoration of hearts and lives that have been disrupted by COVID-19. As we walk the final steps with Jesus on the journey to Calvary, let us try and soak in everything the Church offers us through

Calvary, let us try and soak in everything the Church offers us through the beautiful liturgies of this season.

Reflection:

The story which begins of Palm Sunday is basically a human drama; it is our drama. As Jesus enters into his final week, he takes humanity with him and continues to do so every Easter. We are not just remembering an historical event that happened over two thousand years ago. We celebrating and taking part in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus as it happens today to us and for us.

His entry in to the city begins on a huge wave of optimism, joy and hope. The people line the streets; they wave palms, they put their cloaks and garments on the ground and they shout out his name. This was an ancient Roman tradition used to welcome soldiers and armies home after their success in battle. The crowd welcome Jesus in a similar way as they shout out, *Hosanna, Hosanna, blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord*.

Yet, how quickly the crowd changed and turned on Jesus. The same people who were happy to welcome him with shouts of joy, will soon begin to shout *'Crucify him, Crucify him.'* Jesus is even betrayed and denied by his closet friends. The rest of them run and desert him. He is left alone.

There is a real danger that we can get up and lost in getting the liturgy of Palm Sunday and indeed the whole of Holy week just right. If we are not careful we can lose sight of what we remembering, celebrating and taking part in. As well as celebrating this great week with dignity and reverence, we also need to ask ourselves what it is all about and what it means to each to us.

Where am I in the unfolding drama that begins on Palm Sunday and plays out over Holy Week and which climaxes on Easter? Where am I as Jesus passes by on the donkey? Am I one of the crowd shouting out his name? Am I like Judas in any way? When have I betrayed others or Jesus? When like Peter, have I denied knowing Jesus? Am I like Pilate when I judge and condemn others? How am I like Simon or Veronica who help Jesus in his time of need? Having stood with the crowd shouting out his name and welcoming Jesus, will I stand with the same people spitting out insults as I shout '*Crucify him! Crucify him!*'

As we celebrate Palm Sunday and begin our journey through Holy Week, we are called to ask ourselves who and where we are in the crowd. This is a week to pray and then decide what kind of followers of Christ we are and are going to be. During this busy week of prayer, liturgies and ceremonies, let us not lose sight of what we are remembering, celebrating and talking part in.

As we begin this most holy of weeks, may Jesus be our constant companion. May we enter in the mystery of Jesus' life, death and resurrection with faith and hope.

Slavery-Free Easter





The sweet, but sometimes-bitter truth about Easter Chocolate

Let's Make One Change in 2021,

the International Year for the Elimination of Child Labour

Australians will purchase over \$200 million in chocolate this Easter. A 2018 report by <u>IBISWorld</u> found that Australia's chocolate spend had risen by \$26 million over the previous five years (up to 2018).

But some of this chocolate is tainted by slavery and comes at the cost of a child's health, education and sometimes his or her freedom. Much of our chocolate is made using cocoa beans harvested by children, often in the West African region. Many of these children are forced into labour. We can help change this.

Chocolate and Child Labour – A Snapshot

A 2020 Macquarie University report, <u>Not so sweet: chocolate, slavery and complicit corporations</u>, found that, "More than two million children under the age of 15 years old work in the cocoa industry in Ivory Coast and Ghana. Many are the children of farm labourers, but others are also sold to farms as bonded labourers from neighbouring Burkina Faso and Mali"

A 2021 report by the <u>International Labor Organisation (ILO)</u> found that 152 million children (64 million girls and 88 million boys) are involved in child labour – that's almost one in 10 of all children worldwide.

Change is happening –

The ILO found that in the last 20 years almost 100 million children have been removed from child labour, bringing numbers down from 246 million in 2000 to 152 million in 2021.

EAST TIMOR UPDATE -LAST CONTAINER TO ET

We are about to deliver our last container to East Timor. Over the last 21 years we have sent 40 containers filled with desks, rice, clothing and many other useful things to the parish of Laga and its surrounding villages. This joyful journey has come to an end because the pandemic has caused us to run out of money to cover freight. Also we face an uncertain prospect of generating more. Each container costs \$8000-\$9000 to send. We have just enough money to cover the last container. Of course if in the future funds arrive to cover freight we will happily fill and send more containers. For the future we will concentrate of sponsoring the education of children who but for the sponsorship would be taken out of school and sent to work in the family vegetable garden.

Currently over 30 children are being sponsored through school and university.
