
Reconciliation

Dear Friends.

Our first ZOOM parish discussion went for 90 minutes on Wednesday night. It was attended by 19 families, around 25 parishioners altogether. The first 50 minutes entailed a presentation



Fr Patrick talked about the timeline for the rollout of "Mission" so far beginning with the Archbishop's letter in May, a meeting with all clergy, then regionally with parishes and finally with zones represented by two from St Thomas More - Jacinta Griffin and Vicki Abbatangelo. Fr Patrick spoke about some of the reactions to the implementation of this process including concerns raised by many priests and laity about its speed and direction. In terms of focus, the Mission process is meant to begin within our parish before discussions happen with neighbouring parishes. It is to be driven by our community. Based on demographics, the diocese has suggested that we form a mission with Mornington and Hastings/ Western Port. Maps and details were provided (and available in full on our website). More than a hundred priests have contacted Fr David Cartwright who shared his challenges in establishing a mission around Brighton. Fr Cartwright has provided a locus for clergy and lay to voice their concerns with about some or all of these matters. This resulted in a meeting and a summary of this discussion was sent to the Archbishop for consideration. Following this, Archbishop Peter scheduled a series of 'listening posts' to hear more from smaller groups of priests about their concerns.

Jacinta shared her experiences associated with attending the regional meetings. At the Southern Regional Meeting Jacinta noted I felt encouraged and relieved by an acknowledgement that people were overwhelmed and frustrated by the plans revealed in the first meeting- there was a sense that the end point had already been decided and we would need to follow the directions to get to that point. It was stressed by the organisers that the timeline is more of a checklist than a schedule, that any mission boundaries are nominal and might be adapted, and that it is up to each parish to drive their engagement in this process.

Jacinta observed that the Archbishop, the Vicar General and those leading and presenting this model have been surprised by the responses across the Diocesefrom priests, progressive, moderate and conservative who have all voiced strong opinions, as well as a number of laity across the Diocese who have written to the Archbishop with their concerns. A number from St. Thomas More have also done this. So, the first part of the meeting was to 'calm things down' - 'We're not closing parishes' was said loud and clear.

Jacinta recalled a number of people at this regional meeting spoke at up saying things like: Clergy need to let go; overwhelmed but a sense of inevitability; Plenary Council- shouldn't we wait; the process is too focused on logistics, we don't want to lose sight of the spiritual; we need to listen to what parishes have to tell us; we need to take time.

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Further points raised at this regional meeting include: Where does the Archbishop see religious congregations in the picture? At what point will we know how resources will be shared? How do we bring the non-church people into the discussion? What about parishes with older parishioners, how do we involve them- zoom's not the answer? How do we look after staff- if 5 parishes come together and each one employs a parish secretary what happens?

Following these observations, Jacinta invited St Thomas More Parish to come together and see how we can retain our identity as a Parish into the future and keep our history and traditions alive. Once again it was stressed that we want to hear from all parishioners via email, phone or letter and as soon as possible meetings will be organised so that all can attend and share their thoughts.

Following these presentations from Jacinta and Fr Patrick there was a discussion and several questions from our parishioners. These could be sorted into five areas. Firstly, Defining terms. What do we mean by "mission" and what do we mean by "deanery"? We need to be clear and define what we mean, as these words can mean many different things to different people. Les Harper spoke about "mission" and the work that has been supported by St Thomas More helping East Timor. He hoped this could be expanded and promoted further with co-operation among parishes at the deanery level. Secondly, there were questions raised about the impact of the Plenary Council and how this might incorporate the full participation of laity, women and respect different ecclesiology's. This should be a part of our journey. Thirdly: the importance of youth, schools, and reaching out to young people is vital. They were once a vibrant part of our Church and are now sadly underrepresented. Why is this? Fourthly, our parish has a proud history of welcome, hospitality and outreach that should be honoured and pursued in the future. Finally, there were comments that we want this process to be positive, creative and a source of new energy, not something imposed upon us which is resisted, as this will not help us or others.

Jesus was setting out on a journey when a man ran up, knelt before him and put this question to him, 'Good master, what must I do to inherit eternal life?' Jesus said to him, 'Why do you call me good? No one is good but God alone. You know

the commandments: You must not kill; You must not commit adultery; You must not steal; You must not bring false witness; You must not defraud; Honour your father and mother.' And he said to him, 'Master, I have kept all these from my earliest days.' Jesus looked steadily at him and loved him, and he said, 'There is one thing you lack. Go and sell everything you own and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me.' But his face fell at these words and he went away sad, for he was a man of great wealth.

Jesus looked round and said to his disciples, 'How hard it is for those who have riches to enter the kingdom of God!' 'In that case' they said to one another 'who can be saved?' Jesus gazed at them. 'For men' he said 'it is impossible, but not for God: because everything is possible for God.'

Peter took this up. 'What about us?' he asked him. 'We have left everything and followed you.' Jesus said, 'I tell you solemnly, there is no one who has left house, brothers, sisters, father, children or land for my sake and for the sake of the gospel who will not be repaid a hundred times over, houses, brothers, sisters, mothers, children and land – not without persecutions – now in this present time and, in the world to come, eternal life.'
