I am mindful that in the midst of lockdown a number of us will not be able to attend this meeting. This meeting is not intended to be exclusive. Gospel Reflection for 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Jesus and the Young People

In his three short years of his public activity and ministry Jesus went of out his way to seek out and find those who were ignored, rejected and often despised by others. He sat and ate with those others called sinners; he literally reached out to touch those who were deaf, dumb and blind.

The sinners, tax collectors and prostitutes where among his closest friends and followers. In the second part of the gospel this Sunday, we see Jesus as he meets and encounters a group of young people.

Jesus is speaking to the crowd and teaching them about the ancient Law and what is says about marriage and divorce. While he is speaking some adults bring children and young people to Jesus so that he can lay his hands on them and bless them.

However, his disciples seem to have a taken on the role of body-guards trying to protect Jesus while keeping people away from him. They actually tried to turn them away. Imagine the disappointments on the faces of these parents and their children as they are deliberately stopped from meeting Jesus. However, Jesus sees his followers are doing and he is indignant. This literally means that Jesus was displeased, angry and even furious with his disciples. Clearly, not their best moment with Jesus.

Why would Jesus make a very deliberate point of highlighting the presence of children to his followers? In another gospel when the disciples were fighting over who was more important, again, Jesus told them that they needed to adapt the mind and heart of a child. At the time of Jesus, children had little or worth or value. There were seen as having no more worth or value than that of a slave. The meaning of these comments and actions of Jesus would not have been lost on his disciples. They would have been deeply challenged by what Jesus said to them.

Let us be very clear and not overly romantic; there is nothing simplistic about being a child. A child knows who to trust and love by the way they are treated and respected. Childlike faith is never tired, cynical or indifferent. The faith of a child is anything but 'childish.' It is this faith that Jesus asks us to embrace; a faith that does not separate words from actions. This is a faith that is focused on God and others without condition or expectation.

Parish Works

Earlier this year the Archdiocesan building office conducted a review of our Parish site.

They recommended that fencing be installed to more clearly demarcate the public oval and grassed areas from the private areas of the parish.

This fence would help us to comply with Archdiocesan policy on safety as well as professional standards protocols. The existing wire fence running along the parish side of the oval has become structurally unsafe, as it has exposed nails and wire which could become a hazard especially around children. Stronger fencing would help to bolster security as the oval is open to the public and has been becoming more popular lately, both day and the night.

A lower profile colorbond fence would run from the Parish Community Centre down the hill to the "Hilton Deakin Oval" sign, then a higher fence will run from that point along the base of the rock wall to connect back to the garage at the presbytery. This proposal for fencing was discussed at two finance committee meetings and three PPLT meetings this year where there was broad recognition and support for this work to proceed. The Parish and School will share these costs. Work will commence within the next two weeks.

Second reading Hebrews 2:9-11 The one who sanctifies is the brother of those who are sanctified

We see in Jesus one who was for a short while made lower than the angels and is now crowned with glory and splendour because he submitted to death; by God's grace he had to experience death for all mankind.

As it was his purpose to bring a great many of his sons into glory, it was appropriate that God, for whom everything exists and through whom everything exists, should make perfect, through suffering, the leader who would take them to their salvation. For the one who sanctifies, and the ones who are sanctified, are of the same stock; that is why he openly calls them brothers.

Gospel Mark 10:2-16 What God has united, man must not divide

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.
