Dear Friends.

The "Roadmap to Freedom" was revealed by Premier Daniel
Andrews on Sunday. Restrictions are likely to remain well into
2022. At 70% vaccination, the majority of permitted activities are
limited to 50 people outdoors. Even at 80%, there is still a limit of
150 people and 1 person per 2 square metres in most indoor
settings, including Churches. It seems likely that our reopening at St Thomas
More will begin in late October with outdoor Masses for small numbers of people.
Later this year, perhaps November, we may be allowed 65 people indoors. At this
stage, there is no timeline or threshold as to when those numbers might be lifted
further. The Archdiocese is in urgent discussions with the State Government
seeking further clarity about the impact of these decisions on reopening
Churches and access to the Sacraments for all of our people.

We are a Church for all people, and universality of the Church can be traced back to its earliest days. The Church has always taken seriously the mandate from Christ to minister and care for the spiritual and temporal needs of our neighbour as taught by Christ in the parable of the Good Samaritan. These two needs-spiritual and physical - go hand in hand. St Thomas More Parish has continued this apostolate through the efforts of our parishioners working for affordable housing, education and development in East Timor and to be more welcoming to refugees and migrants, to name a few.

The Church's preferential option for the poor was affirmed by Pope John Paul II in his 1991 encyclical Centissimus Annus – itself written one hundred years after Leo XIII's important letter on Social Teaching named *Rerum Novarum*. Pope John Paul II wrote somewhat prophetically "There are many forms of poverty, especially in modern society – not only economic but cultural and spiritual poverty as well... In the countries of the West, different forms of poverty are being experienced by groups which live on the margins of society"

A growing margin within our society is emerging in line with increasing vaccination rates — namely that which is associated with vaccination status. At one level there seems to be a good foundation for this. Epidemiologists tell us that unvaccinated people are more likely to catch COVID, more likely to pass this on to others, and much more likely to get seriously unwell as a result. Vaccinated people are less likely to catch COVID and less likely to end up in hospital. The public policy decisions associated with managing these risks are not straightforward as they attempt to balance the rights of personal freedom around medical treatment with the responsibility to the health of society and the common good. The Government wants to protect our hospital system from being overwhelmed and from preventing illness. These are noble and worthy goals. For this reason, Catholics are being encouraged by Pope Francis, by Archbishop Comensoli and myself to carefully evaluate the facts, to speak with their GP and to make an informed decision about getting a COVID-19 vaccination for their health and the good of society.

On the other hand, there are a small number of people who have sought such advice and for different reasons are not able to receive a COVID-19 vaccine at this time. Many of these people have approached me for advice and support.

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Their decision is not made lightly, as the State Government has indicated their ability to participate in civic life will be severely restricted for the foreseeable future.

Keeping all of this in mind, I believe Catholics have two important responsibilities.

Firstly, to be aware of the important issues facing our society, to inform our conscience with reliable information and to constructively participate in the debates of civic life. Our faith can help us to keep good perspective on these issues and not to fall into extremes. The teachings of Christ and his Church help us to hold the different claims upon human dignity, the common good, proportionality and freedom in tension. Our rights correspond with responsibilities. Solidarity teaches us that every person has a place within society. We should defend the poor and vulnerable wherever we find them excluded. This is part of our civic responsibility as Catholics.

Secondly and following from this, our Church must remain a place of welcome for all. We need to find a way to manage and minimise any health risks posed by the unvaccinated and to welcome all people to Mass and the Sacraments. We do not want to see parishes divided. On a practical level the proposed policy of restricting church access to the fully vaccinated would put parish volunteers and clergy in an impossible situation of having to determine who can and cannot be allowed into church to practice their faith and to receive spiritual nourishment. It raises serious questions about freedom of conscience. It would draw a line within and between families; it would separate and segregate our parish groups. It would further isolate a group who often have other underlying health issues; who need our support and encouragement.

Every Catholic should have the same opportunity to receive the Sacraments, to worship God and to gather together in person (United Nations Declaration on Freedom, 1948). This argument was taken up by Archbishop Peter and is being pursued with the State Government together with the leaders from other faiths and Christian denominations. This intention deserves our eager prayer and support. Pope Francis has said that the Church is like "a field hospital, one that takes in the weakest people". Catholics should not tolerate the promotion of physical health at the expense of spiritual health. The rights to both must be balanced and protected.

Current government restrictions allow for limited outdoor social interaction between two people in public when certain other conditions are met.

Up to four people from the same household could meet if further conditions are also observed. While our ability to celebrate the Mass remains restricted, I know many of you are feeling the separation from the Church and Sacraments keenly.

Each Thursday and Sunday morning I have set aside time to meet around the Memorial Garden near the entrance to the Church and school ground. The prevailing health advice around masks, time limits and social distancing

will need to be observed.
