Dear Friends,

The lockdown continues well into the coming month. Please let me know 03 9787777 if you are in need of the sacraments or any other spiritual ministry.

St Thomas More acknowledges the Traditional Land owners, the Bunurong people on which we live, work and worship. We pay our respects to the Elders, past, present and emerging.

#### Reflection:

In the book of Genesis the author identifies a burden which faced our first parents, something which the theologians call "original solitude". In the second chapter of Genesis God said "it is not good for man to be alone". As it



turns out it was not very good for woman to be alone either! So God set about remedying this problem by putting our first parents into relationship and communion with each other. The first family was a type and sign of the Church- a communion of fellowship bound by love of God and each other. Throughout his ministry Christ continued building on these early foundations – appointing twelve apostles, confidents and collaborators who would establish the Church. At the cross Jesus gave his mother, Mary to become our mother, and the Church to become our family. Even more = the Church became the tangible sign of God's communion, union and presence with us, especially through the Sacraments and the Priesthood. It is in, through and with this family that we come to love and be in relationship with God and each other.

As we now approach our sixth week of lockdown it is worthwhile to acknowledge this extended time of isolation goes against some of the powerful natural and spiritual instincts given to us by God. While media and technology can help bring people closer together, they are poor substitutes for real communion. On the other hand, media and technology can become overwhelming with their daily pilgrimage of press conferences and depressing statistics about 'cases' 'deaths' and 'spread'. In the midst of all of this, it is important we foster that virtue of Christian hope.

St Thomas Aquinas noted that hope is tied up with friendship; we hope more when "we have friends to rely on". We do not hope alone but we hope together. Christian hope doesn't promise that life will be easy, but it helps us to keep a perspective on what it truly important in our lives and what is not. Paul Wadell writes in America Magazine "Hope is imperiled not so much by the misfortunes, struggles and sometimes inconsolable losses that come our way. Rather hope diminishes—and eventually disappears—when we lose sight of who we are and where we are going. Who are we? We are pilgrims on a journey to God, making our way to God and helping others do so as well".

With the COVID-19 pandemic drawing into new phase let us conscious in how we hope and what we hope for. Christian hope is not driven by statistics about case numbers, deaths and hospitalisations. Hope is not determined by vaccination rates, effectivity or which strain of virus is able to evade the vaccine. Hope doesn't come or go with government restrictions, lockdowns or exemptions. This kind of 'hope' can appear and disappear just as quickly, as we've seen over the last eighteen months. These kinds of 'hope' can turn out to be false and fleeting.

Christian hope reminds us that we are pilgrims on a journey to God and to heaven. Christian hope gives us perspective and wisdom about who we are and where we're going. This hope validates the pain and suffering we go through here and now, and turns us back to our consolation and strength – God. It helps us to face the roller coaster of life's ups and downs with less fear and worry because God is in control and God helps us through them. Hope assures us we were not made for solitude or isolation; we can only truly hope in relationship and communion with each other, with the Church and with the Sacraments. Christian is a gift from God that we pray for and earnestly desire especially at this difficult time.



Today Archbishop Comensoli advised that the Victorian Health Department has given new information regarding the broadcast of religious services. 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#### Dear friends

Last Tuesday Jacinta Griffin from the PPLT, Vicki Abbatangelo from the Parish Office and myself represented St Thomas More Parish at a virtual meeting which discussed the Archbishop's plan 'Take the way of the Gospel'. A copy of Archbishop Peter's letter was published in Seasons on two occasions earlier in the year which outlined his vision and rationale for undertaking this review of Parishes. The Archbishop hopes for a Melbourne Church that is joyful, evangelical, pastoral and responsive to changing needs and demographics. I know there have been some good discussions about this in some of our parish groups and informally among our parishioners, and a few people have spoken with me directly about their thoughts, which has been welcomed. Owing to the lockdown and the difficulties in meeting together as one group the opportunities for further dialogue have been very limited.

On Tuesday for the first time more localised information was made available to us. Of particular note is that St Thomas More, Mount Eliza has been arranged together with St McCartan's, Mornington and Western Port Parish, Hastings & Somerville to form a proposed "Mission". Every parish in the diocese will eventually be part of a mission; for some of the larger parishes in the North and West their canonical structures will not change. However, in most cases parishes will be asked to adapt their structures, boundaries, administration and/or clergy ratios. In some cases it has been proposed that parish boundaries are radically reshaped. The modellers were asked to use the various data sources from the Census and mass counts to determine a number of "missions", now 62 across the diocese, which will have a minimum level of level of income, Masses, Priests, Parishes, Sacraments (baptisms / weddings / funerals / annointings); or combinations thereof.

The operation of a "Mission" has not been defined. It has loosely been described as a "family of parishes" but this too could have many applications. At one end, this 'family' could involve independent parishes choosing to cooperate and pool their resources for the common good. For example, this could mean a shared resourcing of a youth minister, child safety officer, secretary, administration, catechist, etc, who could work between and within parishes as mutually agreed. A 'family of parishes' could involve a deanery approach where one Priest co-ordinates and oversees the pastoral outreach of the surrounding parishes. "Family" could also operate on a partnership model where existing parishes are run by the same Parish Priest who has curates, lay staff and volunteers assisting him. In some cases clergy will live and work together in shared offices or residences, which means current buildings would be reproposed. It has been stressed that this review is not intended to amalgamate or close parishes, but it was acknowledged by Archbishop Peter that the amalgamation and merging of parishes could occur after some time of working and living together as a mission.

At the moment, we're not sure about much else! There is a proposed timeline for further discussion within the parish until the end of this year (2021), and then with neighbouring parishes beginning next year (2022). We have been assured that no concrete decisions have been made about any parish and that each existing parish community will drive this journey through prayer, dialogue and discussion. This is not an easy process. Already around the diocese letters have been authored by Parish Priests involved in nascent missions to all parishes offices and clergy with strong views speaking both for and against different models.

There are many questions we will have to explore as we consider how to respond to this as a community. It is important that every voice is heard and that the great work of building up St Thomas More Parish inspired by Father Hilton Deakin and continued by Fathers Fulton, Pearson and many others is able to continue with God's help and strength. We have so much to offer, and there are opportunities for us to be enriched and shaped by our neighbours and friends. In the next few weeks I would like to host an online discussion via ZOOM within our parish to give an opportunity for parishioners to discuss their initial thoughts and to get a sense of where we're at. Further details will be sent out in the next week or two. In the meantime let us keep each other in prayer and remain open to what God might be doing in our midst.
