St Thomas More acknowledges the Traditional Land owners, the Bunurong people on which we live, work and worship. We pay our respects to the Elders, past, present and emerging. St Thomas More's feast day will be celebrated this Wednesday, June 22nd. More is remembered as a great English statesman, humanist and scholar who refused to submit to Henry VIII and suffered death on the scaffold rather than compromise his belief in the spiritual supremacy of the Pope. It was a unique act of commitment to the Faith at a time when practically the entire English hierarchy, together with 'all the best learned men of the realm', fell one by one almost without a fight. The news of More's execution sent shock waves all across Europe. He was



the most highly respected scholar-humanist of his day and a statesman with an international reputation. His death was an exceptionally barbarous act, an event which even the most prejudiced of historians have never been able adequately to explain away. The life and personality of More have always proved attractive even to the casual reader of history because of his talents, the values he stood for and the exceptional richness of his humanity. It is not surprising that as we pass the five-hundreth anniversary year of his birth, we see in all different ways and parts of the world a saint who has been described as 'a man for all seasons'. With the capitulation of the hierarchy in 1532, More realised that he could no longer continue as Lord Chancellor if he were to remain faithful to his conscience. He may have been Henry's 'good servant', but there was no doubt that when confronted with the great challenge of his life, his first loyalty was unswervingly to God. More's imprisonment, his subsequent trial and execution — eloquent testimony to his love for the Church and loyalty to conscience — are events which have inspired and to encourage a more generous commitment to the

More's convictions came out of his deep interior life and his prayer. He once said "The things, good Lord, that I pray for, give me thy grace to labour for". Thomas did not expect God to help him without helping himself. While he was an incredibly hard worker, his competence and success could not take the place of prayer. He said his morning and evening prayers. At night he also had the practice of saying the seven penitential psalms and the litany of the saints. More recommended the practice of meditation, of mental prayer. Erasmus tell us that 'at definite hours he addressed his prayers to God, not in set phrases, but in words that came straight from the heart.

In the Dialogue of Comfort Thomas suggests how we might pray. After making an act of presence the of God, a person should open his heart in acts of sorrow for his sins, and acts of thanksgiving for gifts received both for himself and for others. This familiar conversation with God should also include talking to him about our difficulties and temptations, and about our weakness in resisting and withstanding temptation. We have, however, to pray with full confidence that God hears us and will gladly grant our requests.

Like all of us, More had times when his prayer was difficult. He once said 'take from me, good Lord, this lukewarm fashion of meditation, and this dullness in praying unto Thee. And give me the grace to long for thy holy sacraments and especially to rejoice in the presence of thy Blessed Body sweet Saviour Christ, in the holy sacrament of the Altar'.

Thomas had arid moments when the whole idea of prayer seemed pointless to him. Yet he persevered, encouraged particularly by his anticipation of the strength and support which he would derive from the reception of the Holy Eucharist.

More's devotion to the Eucharist was central to his spiritual life. While he was imprisoned in the Tower, More wrote this prayer to help himself prepare to receive Holy Communion.

We firmly believe that this blessed sacrament is not a bare sign, or a figure, or a token of that holy body of Christ but that it is the selfsame precious blood of Christ.

His prayer reveals his worries about the emerging protestant ideas from Europe which emphasised the Eucharist as a sign and symbol but not a real presence something which transforms our whole life during and after Mass. More saw the connection between hosting a guest at home, and welcoming the Lord in communion. More often entertained the king, princes and dignitaries to his home in Chelsea. He wonders if we would make s big fuss for the visit of an earthly prince to our house, how much more prepared should we not be for a visit from the king of kings.

More's prayer of thanksgiving after Communion was composed during his time in prison speaks of his deep communion with Christ even in trials and struggles. He encourages us to use this time after Communion well and not allow ourselves be distracted by other cares or worries:

'Let us not lose this special time of prayer for we can little tell whether we shall ever get it again. Let us endeavour to keep him still, and let us say with his two disciples on the road to Emmaus "Tarry with us, good Lord", and then we shall be sure that he shall not go from us'.

That More could write with such feeling about the Eucharist is another reflection of his deep devotion to the humanity of Christ. 'Lord', he wrote in prison in his last work before death, 'how hard a matter it is to love and not to disclose it'. If we really love someone this shows itself in our actions. Thomas's love for the Eucharist strenghtened his soul to love through his words and deeds. As we celebrate these feasts of Corpus Christi and Thomas More we pray his faith, courage and devotion will inspire each of us at St Thomas More Parish.
