The celebration of Easter is always a great joy for Christians around the world, and for us here at St Thomas More. Good Friday is just one of two days in Australia where the busyness of buying and selling, shopping, eating out and entertainment take a short break. As an ancient homily from the

Office of Readings says "Something strange is happening today - there is a great silence on earth today, a great silence and stillness. The whole earth keeps silence because the King is asleep". With the frenetic pace of life that we seems to be speeding up it is appropriate that we take some time to process the magnitude of what God has done for us, and how we might respond to this incredible act of love.

On Holy Thursday we see Jesus offering himself and lowering himself to the position of a slave and washing the disciples feet. At the Last Supper Jesus establishes the Mass, the Eucharist as the way for us to come close to him and become more and more like him each time we participate. In was at the last supper that Jesus began the Church and charged his apostles with the responsibility to continue to "do this in memory of me". In the garden of Gethsemane Jesus suffers in solidarity with us, he struggles with temptation but does not give in to fear or selfishness. He shows us what is possible for us when we turn to God in our times of trial. Like us, the disciples don't fully understand what is going on and they discover that with just their own strength they cannot follow the Lord. Peter's denial led to his profound sorrow, repentance and forgiveness. He reminds us that the Church is made up of wounded healers who are called to help each other build up the Christ's body and to "feed my sheep" – to encourage and support each other on our faith journey. On Good Friday we see the brutality of a world that is separated from love, a world driven by pragmatism and the mob. Jesus' trial draws us back to the teaching of St Augustine - that each of us has a part to play in building up the City of God, the new Jerusalem, God's Kingdom here on earth. Jesus confronts the kingdom of fear and coercion with non-violence and the Truth. Our Lord trusts and believes that his Father will bring good out of evil, order out of chaos and light from darkness, even though he feels the weight of the cross and on behalf of every weary soul cries out "my God my God, why have you forsaken me?". At the foot of the Cross Jesus find the consoling presence of his mother, Mary and gives her to the Church to become our mother, our refuge, our consolation in time of difficulty.

On Holy Saturday the Easter Fire signifies a deep transformation. The light begins with a small flame, barely enough to overcome the darkness surrounding it but in time the light of Christ spreads among God's people until at last the Church awash with light and sound. We sing "Alleluia" and "Glory to God in the Highest". The resurrection changed everything for Jesus passion and the lives of his disciples It transformed Jesus story of betrayal, arrest and execution from a terrible tragedy to a profound victory. The resurrection destroys the power of death over each one us. It tells us that God is more powerful than anything that life can throw at us. The resurrection enables Jesus to ascend to his

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Archbishop Comensoli's Easter Message

Easter 2023: 'Recognised, healed and sent'

Three things flow from the resurrection of Jesus Christ; three things that matter. In his resurrection, Jesus *recognises us* personally; he *invites us* to peace; and he *sends us* out.

The very first word Jesus spoke following his resurrection was a name: Mary. He saw his friend, and although she could not yet recognise him, he called her by name.

Similarly, Jesus personally recognised his friends, to whom he appeared. There was something intimate, and tender, and hospitable about the risen Lord. He draws us into his own resurrected life.

Jesus, in his resurrection, also offered an invitation to peace. 'Peace be with you' was his first—and repeated declaration. It was an invitation to a share in his forgiveness, and to be healed. Jesus reconciled all creation to himself on the cross; now, he offers us a share in his healing peace.

Finally, through his resurrection, Jesus sends forth his friends. Jesus charged his followers to share the Good News of redemption, and our life in his.

Mary: Go and tell the others.

Peter: Go and feed my sheep.

Friends: Go and make disciples.

Jesus gave out this task so that the gift of his death and resurrection would not be only for the few.

These same three things from Jesus' resurrection—his recognising, his inviting, his sending—all belong to us now; they are ours to share in.

The risen Jesus recognises each of us personally by name.

The risen Jesus invites each of us to share in his healing gift of peace.

The risen Jesus sends each of us out in his name, with the gift of life.

He says to us, 'Follow me,' that we might live each day illumined by his resurrection, as the reason for our hope.

So, may our lives be filled with the energy, joy and youthfulness of the risen Jesus, knowing that, in him, I am recognised, I am healed, and I am sent.
