Managing our 'Sick List'

Following feedback from parishioners, we are intending to make some changes to the administration and publication of our weekly "sick list" in the Parish bulletin.

Caring for the sick is one of the seven works of mercy, and an important outreach of St Thomas More Parish. The current practice is that anyone can contact the Parish Office and nominate a loved one to be included on this list. However, as we do not collect any contact details, there is often no way for us to keep this lists accurate and up to date. Unfortunately, there have been occasions where we have been praying for someone on the sick list who has since passed away; other times we are praying for someone on the sick list who has since fully recovered!

It is important that we offer care for the sick and housebound in our community through our prayer, personal contact and the ministry of the Sacraments. Going forward, if there is someone you would like to be named on this list in the Parish bulletin you will be asked if they would like a visit from Fr Patrick to administer the Sacraments. You will also be asked to give at least an email address or phone number so that each month the Parish Office can review the lists and ensure that the sick are not only being prayed for at Mass, but also receiving any ongoing spiritual and pastoral care they may need.

From 2024, the sick list will be actively monitored and it will be amended (ie names removed) if we can't ascertain the status of someone listed. We welcome the names of sick or housebound parishioners to be emailed or phoned in to the Parish Office.

If you prefer, we can of course keep names off the published sick list but continue to pray and keep in contact.

End of Year Review

As we reflect on the year that has passed, and the many good things that have happened, it seems to me that 2023 has been a year of consolidation and renewal for St Thomas More Parish. In these pages, I wanted to share with you all some of the highlights of the year that has passed, and some thoughts as to where we might go into 2024.

Sacraments and Worship

At the heart of every Catholic Parish is the Eucharist, the Sacraments of initiation, healing and mission, and the powerful experience of personal prayer. It is encouraging that our Sunday Mass count continues to increase as parishioners return to Mass following the lockdowns and other recent challenges. We are working to build on this momentum and ensure that new families are intentionally welcomed and initiated into our Parish—this insight has been driven by learnings from the Parish Census. Throughout the year there have been significant Masses celebrated with the school community, notably the Mothers and Fathers day Masses on Friday, First Holy Communions with the Parish community on Sundays, St Thomas More's Feast Day. Dur-

ing lent we prayed the stations of the Cross and celebrated the beautiful Easter liturgies with reverence and joy. Beginning this December, the Parish hosted an extended time of adoration on the first Fridays and Saturdays of the month, which will resume in February 2024. This year the PPLT suggested the school community could join the regular parish Friday Mass at 10am — which has been well received. These Masses will continue next year on alternating Fridays during term time. In 2023 we had 27 infant baptisms. Families meet with me and are prepared for the Sacrament the month before the ceremony. This year we also welcome two adult converts into the Church, which was a great joy. There were seven funerals celebrated at St Thomas More.

Works and Maintenance

In February our electrician completed the upgrade of the lighting around the Church and Parish Community Centre. These fixtures light up the driveway outside the Church across to the carparks near the school. The Church is automatically lit each night by sensor lights, which greatly improves security and safety onsite. We have also completed a security upgrade including cameras and digital locks which make it easier to secure the Church and Parish buildings. In September the parish installed Café blinds and three x 2.5kw heaters to provide shelter and warmth to those who gather for refreshments after Mass, especially during the winter months. Total cost of these works: \$11,700. The remaining shipping container which belonged to the Friends of East Timor was generously donated by the Harper family to St Thomas More School. The container now sits on the oval providing easier access to sporting and other play equipment.

Events

In February we had the first of two Parish Working Bees. These are fun events where people share their time and talent clearing up and restoring our Parish site. In February we also began the first Parish Census and Thanksgiving renewal that we've had since 2015. The programme was run by the Philanthropy Office at the Archdiocese, as we were a pilot parish we received this valuable programme free of charge! The census provided us with up to date records for around 140 families, who were then invited to consider their financial support for the Parish. The campaign resulted in a 55% increase in pledged income- thankyou so much for this generous support.

In June we we welcomed Archbishop Peter for the PP Installation Mass, followed by a light supper. It was wonderful to have this personal support for our Parish from Archbishop Peter and for him to spend time meeting and chatting with parishioners. In July we had a fundraising event at 1001 nights restaurant hosted by Mr John Canavan. This dinner and the several donations received raised around \$5,000 to support Matthew and Charles Sayah who travelled with around 600 pilgrims from Melbourne to the World Youth Day Festival with Pope Francis. They returned in August with a powerful personal testimony of how those days had strengthened their faith and experience of the Universal Church.

In September St Thomas More Parish hosted John Pridmore for a three day Parish Mission. John has had a profound conversion experience which has helped him to reach millions of people. John spoke about God's love, God's mercy and God's healing. He also spoke with around 600 school youth at our local schools and community.

We continue to see much good fruit from his visit since then. In November the Catholic leadership coach Ron Huntley spent time working with PPLT and Parish Leaders to help collaborate more closely in leadership around a clearer vision to make our parish a welcoming centre for evangelisation and worship – this work continues. In December we finished the year with a BBQ on the Parish grounds following the 10am Mass. It was suggested this becomes a regular event which allows our people to build community and a place to welcome new parishioners into the fold, and give thanks to God for the year's blessings.

Groups

The Parish hosted a number of regular events throughout the year. This year in collaboration with St Thomas More School the Parish Under croft hosted weekly playgroup each Tuesday for families in the area. This is jointly advertised in Parish and School bulletins. Our Vinnies Conference headed by Marilyn Moloney does magnificent work visiting the isolated and needy in the area, and providing much needed support in what has been a very challenging year of high inflation, rising rents and cost pressures facing so many families. Vinnies are always looking for more volunteers to help with this work.

This year we have solidified the welcoming and hospitality rosters which support the 10am Mass. It is hoped this will be expanded to other Masses in 2024. The Altar Society led by Caroline Goble has welcomed three new members this year, who together look after the flowers and altar requisites in the Church, and over Christmas and Easter beautify the Church for these special feasts- thankyou for this work. The Parish advertised a number of social events throughout the year run by active parishioners which included meals together, special Masses, presentations and tours. These events are a great chance to meet new people and form new friendships. Throughout 2023 the women's group met regularly on the first Fridays of the month for prayer and discussion. This group has grown in faith (and numbers) since it began last year. New members are always welcome – details will be published from February onwards in our bulletin.

On the first Sunday of the Month the Filipino community meet at the Church for a Mass, followed by refreshments – anyone is welcome to join. In the youth space we have been trialling different ways of engagement with our young people. This year we offered young people aged 12+ to experience "Youth Alpha" – an introduction to the big questions of life through videos, food and discussion. Following this course, some of the children continued on to prepare for the Sacrament of Confirmation. My thanks to our catechist, Faye Melhem for her tireless work in this area.

This year I was grateful for the opportunity to receive some leadership coaching which was offered through the Archdiocese. Over six weeks I met online with a group of clergy and leadership coach Ron Huntley looking at different models of leadership and collaboration in the Parish. This has fed through the Parish Council which we are working to focus our energies on the more "strategic" and less "operational" matters. We have found there is a powerful gravity which pulls us back to the urgent everyday needs of the Parish, which are important, but which can leave little time to plan and

strategise for the future, as it is important we not only do things but do things that make an impact. This will be a priority next year. This year I attended the Melbourne and ACCC Clergy Conferences where the topics of liturgy, worship, priesthood and spiritual care were very helpful for my ministry, along with the support and friendship of many great priests. In September I made my annual retreat at Galong with Fr Joseph Carola SJ, who teaches theology at the Gregorian University in Rome. During the retreat we looked at the Cure of Ars – Fr John Vianney, and learnt how to balance the demands of prayer, ministry and leadership with his example and learnings. There was ample time to pray with the scriptures and spend silent time with the other priests. It was a great booster for me.

2024

In mid February we will welcome Bishop Tony Ireland who is in the process of visiting the Parishes in the Southern Region on behalf of Archbishop Peter. A comprehensive report will be sent ahead of his visit, which will form the basis of his discussions with myself and key groups in the Parish. Parishioners will also have the opportunity to talk with him, Bishop Ireland will celebrate the weekend Masses on the 17th and 18th of February. Details will be published in Seasons. Following his visit a report will be sent to the Archbishop and the Parish for our consideration. Next year, apart from all the important work that is already happening, there will be some new initiatives that I can share with you. The local clergy, myself included are making steps to be more available to support the faith of Padua College students, particularly building on the momentum of those who attended World Youth Day. We also plan to offer more support to Padua teachers in teaching the Catholic faith following the recommendations from the Education Review recently published by Professor John Haldane.

Next year the PPLT are focussed on these areas: 1. Drawing our people more deeply into relationship with God and each other through our worship, our welcome and "intentional discipleship". As part of this we plan to launch the Alpha programme which is a tool to deepen faith and community. 2. We plan to run a "volunteering drive" where parishioners will hear about the different ministries running in the Parish and be encouraged to pick an area where they can share their time and talent. 3. Youth and young adults: Are there other ways to bring about spiritual fruit in their lives? Could we do more to help them experience the beauty, truth and goodness of the Mass and the other Sacraments beyond the initial sacramental celebration? 4. Baptism. This year, 27 infants and younger children were baptised at St Thomas More. Could we put more resources into supporting parents and families to grow in their faith and understand what this commitment means for them? Are there ways to translate their desire for baptism into a deeper personal faith and experience of the Mass? Our committees will also continue to find ways to resource our Parish mission in sustainable ways against the backdrop of rising costs and the need to grow our parish so that it is vital, viable and vibrant.

As we conclude 2023 I would like to sincerely thank our parishioners for their ongoing generosity, commitment and for your support and encouragement of me. Together we look forward to the blessings and challenges that The Lord has in store for us in 2024. Fr Patrick
