Over the last few weeks the Proclaim Office at the Archdiocese has been hosting a number of events focussed on Parish renewal, evangelisation and outreach. Mr Ron Huntley was invited to address participants at the proclaim conference and run workshops and seminars in Parishes. Ron visited St Thomas More Parish last Sunday and spoke with the Parish Pastoral



Leadership Team and Parish Staff. During the last hour we met with the leaders and representatives of different school and parish groups- altogether around twenty people.

Ron's message is drawn from his experience working at Saint Benedict Parish in Nova Scotia, with Fr James Mallon. Ron shared a number of insights into how addressing the challenges facing St Benedict (e.g. dwindling congregation) by engagement with youth / young people, equipping parishioners for leadership and service, collaboration with clergy and a powerful vision, transformed the parish.

During the meeting a number of opportunities were identified for further discussion and discernment at St Thomas More Parish. A key message that we heard drew on Jesus's teaching on fruitfulness. Where something is working well, we should expect to see the fruit of that growing. Where something is not apparently producing much fruit, it may need pruning or replanting in order to continue to grow.

Reflection from Loyola Press:

Today we begin the season of Advent, which marks the start of a new liturgical year for the Church. The readings for Sunday Mass are arranged on a three-year cycle. Each year features a different Gospel—Matthew, Mark, or Luke. Readings from the Gospel of John are interspersed throughout all three years. With this year's first Sunday of Advent, we begin Cycle B of the Lectionary, which focuses our attention on the Gospel of Mark. This week and next week, our readings from Mark's Gospel present two important Advent themes: the Lord's return at the end of time and John the Baptist's preparation for Jesus.

Today's Gospel is taken from the end of Mark's Gospel, the chapter that immediately precedes Mark's account of Jesus' Passion. Having been questioned repeatedly by the scribes and the Pharisees, Jesus is now questioned by his disciples—Peter, James, John, and Andrew—who want details about his prediction of the destruction of the Temple. Jesus answers with many warnings about the difficulties that the disciples will face.

Today's passage comes at the conclusion of Jesus' warnings to his disciples. Jesus emphasizes the need for watchfulness. The Son of Man will come without warning; only the Father knows the exact hour. The disciples must not be caught unprepared when this time comes.

Anytime access to the Church for Private Prayer

"Because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat. Jesus said to them, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest" (Mk 6:31).

In our busy lives we can find it hard to find the time to spend with God. The wisdom of the monastic tradition suggests that our physical environment has a big part to play in removing distractions and being focussed in prayer. The environment, our posture, lighting and noise all have an impact.

Anytime access to the Church for private prayer is possible via the electronic keypad. Access is initially granted by completing an application form and registering your contact details with the Parish Office. Your thumbprint will be taken which will grant access via the side door. This system ensures the safety of visitors as only authorised users can access the Church, and all movements in and out of the side door are monitored. Inside the Church, Parishioners can find a range of spiritual resources to help with prayer. In the white stand on the left hand side of the gathering space as you walk in, you will find a range of brochures, booklets and leaflets which offer formation on prayer, the Mass, the Sacraments and more. Near this stand is also a small library which contains a selection of bibles and spiritual reading available for use while in the Church. If you are a St Thomas More Parishioner and would like to have anytime access to the Church, please contact the Parish Office for an application form. You can find these on our website, print out and return to the Parish Office for processing. Alternatively you can approach Fr Patrick after Mass.

Scholars believe that Mark's Gospel was written around the time of the destruction of Jerusalem by the Romans in A.D. 70. Mark's audience consisted of Christians who were living in difficult social and political times, times of conflict. They were likely beginning to face persecution as followers of Jesus. In this difficult time, it helped to recall that Jesus had foretold of such difficulties. Early Christian communities took courage from Jesus' warning to remain alert and watchful, and they found in his words a way to persevere through suffering.

Today's Gospel reminds us that Advent is about more than our preparation for the Church's celebration of Christ's birth at Christmas. Advent is also about preparing ourselves for Christ's return in glory at the end of time. Like the disciples and the faithful in Mark's community, we must also stay alert and watchful. Our faithfulness to God, through the good times as well as the difficult times, shows us to be ready for the coming of the Son of Man.

Many will have noticed a black terminal which is fixed to the wall on the left side of the main doors as you exit the church. As we move to become a "cashless" society, this device accepts credit card donations which exclusively support the Church account.

This account facilitates regular parish expenses like staffing, utilities, insurance, liturgical costs, and more. If you wish to donate you will find four preset donation amounts, or you can choose

"other" and type in any amount up to \$100. Simply touch the denomination you wish to donate, then you will be prompted to wave your card on the top of the unit. It will "beep" when processed.
