This weekend we welcome Bishop Tony Ireland who will be visiting St Thomas More Parish. While our Archdiocese of Melbourne is enormous – over 200 parishes and schools, the Archbishop intends to have each parish personally visited by a



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bishop every five years. Bishop Ireland's visit is a tangible reminder of two things. Firstly, that St Thomas More Parish is not one piece, but an important part of a whole body. What we do as parishioners, volunteers, clergy and staff impacts on our own community but also impacts on the mission of the wider Church in Melbourne. Secondly, the pastoral visitation is an exercise in dialogue, where the Archbishop will carefully listen to the joys and challenges of our community, and we carefully listen to his hopes, dreams and expectations for our Parish. The schedule for the bishop's visit is posted in Seasons, and there will be opportunities for parishioners to catch up with him throughout the weekend, especially around the Mass times.

A Lenten reflection from The Catholic Life:

At that time Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the devil. He fasted for forty days and forty nights, and afterwards he was hungry. Matthew 4:1–2 "Forty" is a significant number. In Scripture, it is used more than 145 different times. For example, the rain during the Great Flood lasted forty days and forty nights. Each time Moses went up Mount Sinai, he remained there for forty days and nights. The Israelites wandered in the desert for forty years. After His resurrection, Jesus appeared to His disciples for forty days before ascending into Heaven. And there are many other uses of "forty" throughout the Bible. Interestingly, forty is even significant within human nature, in that we develop within our mother's womb for forty weeks before being born.

The "forty" that we commemorate today is the forty days and forty nights that our Lord spent in the desert being tempted by the devil while He fasted and prayed. Forty is used to symbolize a time of testing, purification, trial or probation. For that reason, it should also be seen as a symbol of your entire life here on earth. In Saint Matthew's version of Jesus' temptation in the desert, he specifically uses the wording "forty days and forty nights." Saint Bede, in commenting upon this, points out that this period of time not only symbolizes our entire lives, but the "days" represent the many graces and blessings we receive, while the "nights" represent the crosses we endure.

As we begin our Lenten journey, it is important to once again apply the lessons of Jesus' time in the desert to our entire lives. Let's consider two lessons we can take from the passage quoted above. First, we see that Jesus was "led by the Spirit into the desert to be tempted by the devil." This teaches us that Jesus not only endured temptation, He confronted it. He was not afraid of the devil and did not fear his attacks. Instead, He willingly faced those temptations, being led by the Spirit, so as to not only overcome them in His life but also to enable us to confront, in our lives, every temptation by the power and initiative of the Holy Spirit. We must never be afraid to confront temptations directly and confidently when the Holy Spirit is in the lead.



Payment terminal in the Foyer of the Church

Many will have noticed a black terminal which is fixed to the wall on the left side of the main doors as you exit the church. As we move to become a "cashless" society, this device accepts credit card donations which exclusively support the Church account.

This account facilitates regular parish expenses like staffing, utilities, insurance, liturgical costs, and more. If you wish to donate you will find four preset donation amounts, or you can choose "other" and type in any amount up to \$100. Simply touch the denomination you wish to donate, then you will be prompted to wave your card on the top of the unit. It will "beep" when processed. It is possible to request a printed receipt. If you have any difficulties please approach Fr Patrick or any of the welcomers for assistance.

Children are to be supervised by a parent/guardian at all times.

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A second important lesson is that Jesus voluntarily fasted during this time in the desert. This illustrates the importance of the virtue of temperance in life. If we see this period of forty as a symbol of our whole lives, then we will understand that temperance must always be part of our lives. When we experience the joys and blessings of life (the forty days), we must certainly celebrate them. But we must always do so with a certain self-denial, in that we must never allow the passing things of this world to become the primary satisfaction we seek. Saint John of the Cross teaches that we can even become overly attached to spiritual consolations. Conversely, when we experience the crosses of life (the forty nights), we must also practice a certain self-denial, in that we must not allow the difficulties we endure to discourage us or to distract us from seeking out and fulfilling the will of God. Fasting, meaning our acquisition of the virtue of temperance, must lead us always through the ups and downs of life, helping us to keep our eyes on the truths God has revealed to us and rejecting the lies of the devil.

Reflect, today, upon the importance of embracing the virtue of temperance with courage throughout life. Throughout life's many ups and downs, joys and sorrows, blessings and crosses, we must allow ourselves to be led by the Spirit, confronting every circumstance with courage and self-control.

Alpha Program

Commencing 7th March 2024, 7pm

The PPLT warmly invites parishioners, members of the school community and anyone from our local community to join us for Alpha. The Alpha programme has attracted nearly 22 million people to learn more deeply about their faith and to explore belief in a non judgemental, no pressure setting. The programme looks at who is Jesus? Why did he die? How can I have faith, understand the bible and pray? What is the Holy Spirit? What about evil, the Church, being a follower of Christ today?

Sessions are scheduled for Thursday evenings from 7pm until around 8:30pm. The meetings will run from 7th of March, taking a break for Easter then running each week from the 18th of April until we finish on 30th of May. There is no charge nor any obligation to attend particular sessions.

Alpha is also the pathway for anyone in the community who is interested in becoming a Catholic. Once completing the Alpha series, RCIA / Catechism classes will commence in July for those adults and older children who have not yet been baptised Catholic, or for those adults who are baptised Catholic and would like to receive their first communion, reconciliation and confirmation.
