The first Easter Sunday was a strange experience for the first christians. The women who went to the tomb of Jesus to mourn his death were met with a confounding



experience, something they could not quite understand or put into words. Everything they thought they knew about their faith was transformed in a flash. Their lives would never be the same. The resurrection of Jesus Christ changed not only the lives of those first disciples, but has changed the course of human history. Suffering, fear, worry, sickness, anxiety, sickness and death – have all been transformed. While we must still go through these things – we no longer have to do so on our own. We do so with the assurance and confidence that God has entered into our lives and is ready to lead us through the other side. This is the good news of our faith. Jesus resurrection is the final great sign – as St John calls it – the final proof that Jesus was not just another man but is God in human flesh. Jesus offers us a different way of living- with meaning, purpose and direction. Jesus powerful teaching on the importance of love, sacrifice, living a life of faith and trusting in God are made possible for us by his own personal witness. Jesus didn't just talk about these things, he did them.

For us living in Mount Eliza in 2024, Jesus resurrection still has great power. We live in a world and society that runs at a great pace, where we are told that we can achieve anything. We live in a world where medicine and technology offer the dream of a life with few limits. The world says that we can solve any problem as long as we have the right political, financial and technical expertise. The world offers fun, excitement and happiness. Jesus kingdom is different. With the risen Lord at our side, and the Holy Spirit dwelling within us, God's world transforms our world. We no longer live in fear. We face our challenges with trust. We approach our families and relationships with love, patience and conviction. We face our death with hope and acceptance, knowing that a kingdom awaits those whom Jesus has given his life for. Easter Sunday changed the lives of Jesus friends, and it changes our lives too. May we all experience in a personal way this victory, and take some time over these days to celebrate not just with chocolates and easter bunnies (which are important!) but with our living faith which is made alive by Jesus Christ.

To observe Divine Mercy Sunday fittingly, we should precede the feast by a nine-day novena of reciting the Divine Mercy Chaplet, beginning on Good Friday (privately said).

Jesus asked Saint Faustina: "Gather all sinners from the entire world and immerse them in the abyss of My mercy... On the day of my feast, the Feast of Mercy, you will go through the whole world and bring fainting souls to the spring of My mercy. I shall heal and strengthen them." (Diary 206)

"The soul that will go to Confession and receive Holy Communion shall obtain complete forgiveness of sins and punishment." (Diary 699)

"When you approach the confessional, know this, that I Myself am waiting there for you. I am only hidden by the priest, but I Myself act in your soul." (Diary 1602)






Jesus said to Saint Faustina:

"I desire that the Feast of Mercy be a refuge and shelter for all souls, and especially for poor sinners. On that day, the very depths of My mercy are open. The Feast of Mercy emerged from My very depths of tenderness. It is My desire that it be solemnly celebrated on the first Sunday after Easter. Mankind will not have peace until it turns to the Fount of My Mercy." (Diary 699)
