Dear friends, on Thursday we celebrated the feast of St Mary Mackillop—Australia's patron saint and our first declared saint. Below is a biography of her incredible life.

Saint Mary MacKillop were alive today, she would be a household name. It's not that she sought the limelight. On the contrary, she simply wanted to serve the poor wherever she found them in her native Australia. Born in Melbourne in 1842, to parents who had emigrated from Scotland, Mary grew up in a family that faced constant financial struggles. As a young woman she was drawn to religious life but could not find an existing order of Sisters that met her needs. In 1860, she met Father Julian Woods, who became her spiritual director. Together they founded a new community of women—the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart, also known as the Josephite Sisters. Its members were to staff schools especially for poor children, as well as orphanages, and do other works of charity. Father Julian Tennison Woods, concerned about the lack of Catholic education in South Australia, invited MacKillop and her sisters to open a Catholic school in Penola. Together, they successfully opened the school in a stable. Woods was appointed director of education and he and MacKillop were named founders of the school. Following renovations completed by their brother, the MacKillops started teaching more than 50 children. At this time, MacKillop formally declared her dedication to God and began wearing black.

In November 1866, Mary MacKillop and her sisters were joined by several other women. MacKillop, who now took on the religious name "Sister Mary of the Cross," began wearing simple religious habits. The group of women began calling themselves the Sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart and moved to a new house in Adelaide.

By the end of 1867, ten more women joined the Josephites. Due to their plain brown habits and name, the Josephite nuns became informally known as the "Brown Joeys." In December 1869, MacKillop and several other nuns travelled to Brisbane to establish their order in Queensland. Two years later, MacKillop travelled to Port Augusta, South Australia for the same purpose. The Sisters of St. Joseph of the Sacred Heart expanded rapidly and, by 1871, 130 sisters were working in more than 40 schools and charitable institutions across South Australia and Queensland. In 1873, Mary MacKillop sought papal approval for the religious congregation. Pope Pius IX encouraged her with the congregation. The authorities in Rome did make changes to the way Josephites lived in poverty and declared the Superior General and her council were the authorities in charge of the order. MacKillop was assured the congregation and their rule of life would receive final approval after a trial period. The Josephites began expanding their operations into New South Wales and New Zealand, but in 1883, MacKillop relocated to Sydney on the instruction of Bishop Reynolds of Adelaide. Mary insisted that her congregation should be governed by an elected mother general answerable to Rome, not to the local bishop. There also were disputes about whether or not the congregation could own property. In the end, Rome proved to be Mary's best source of support. After a long wait official approval of the congregation—and how it was to be governed—came from Pope Leo XIII. By the time Mary was approaching the end of her life, the congregation was thriving. She died in 1909 at the age of 67. Pope John Paul II beatified her in 1995. In 2010, when Pope Benedict XVI canonized her, she became Australia's first saint. Her liturgical feast is celebrated on August 8.In 1925, the Mother Superior of the Sisters of St Joseph, Mother Laurence, began the process to have MacKillop declared a saint. MacKillop's "heroic virtue" was declared in 1992.

Discussion about the operation of the overhead projector- Volunteers could be sought for this role for parish Mases (following the volunteer drive). Until we can reliably staff the projector at all masses, printed hymn sheets will continue to be provided.

Cabrini Movie Night- Friday, May 31st 7:00-9:30 pm

A free-of-charge movie night is held on Friday, May 31st in the Undercroft commencing at 7:00 pm. (nibbles provided) The movie will screen from 7:30-9:30 pm.

How Can the Parish and School Further Support Visitors Attending Sacramental and Special Event Masses?

How can attendees be informed of the expectations and reminded to remain reverent throughout the Mass? We need to give clearer advice to visitors about appropriate and expected. Considerations regarding the worship venues and context (ie, Mass or liturgy) were discussed. Further consideration of the church capacity and attendance numbers needs to be given for large sacramental Masses in the future, and clearer messaging to families before major events eg Confirmation, Mothers Day Masses etc.

Piety Stall: Parishioners are hoping to reintroduce this in the near future.

PPL Meeting Continued

Welcoming New Parishioners: Welcome event to welcome new parishioners is being considered.

Volunteer Roles & Positions: A volunteer drive is planned for the near future.

Finance: A second collection has been proposed to further support the parish in these times of rising living costs, also affecting the parish. Those who have pledged but are not yet contributing will be contacted.

Alpha- What next for Alpha: Jacquie for the Archdiocese came to speak to the leaders of the Alpha on Thursday, May 16th. An encounter opportunity was provided to participants on Saturday, May 18th. Some participants will now move into RCIA, along with several others. RCIA/ Faith Formation will commence weekly in July until the end of November.

Baptisms- Some changes will be made to the Baptism preparation program for the later part of 2024 to make it both more welcoming to families but also more in depth in content

Social Gatherings: A volunteer to lead the Social Committee is still needed, or members to lead individual events. Members to look into a parish screening of 'Unsung Hero' in the near future.

Christmas Family Mass and Easter Mass Review- it was wonderful to have so many children and parents involved in the Christmas Eve Choir. This was a highly valued school and parish partnership activity. A meeting was held in May to review the Mass, and a future meeting is scheduled for in October to advance plan this year's Christmas Eve Mass.

Confirmation- Bishop Tony Ireland (Principal Celebrant) confirmed the STM Parish and school Confirmation, and was celebrated at Pentecost on Sunday, May 19th.

Other Matters Arising: New members of the PPLT will be considered as the 2-year commitment for most current members is approaching or has passed.
